PETITIONS CAN BE SUBMITTED FOR
LOCAL OPTION.

Toronto, Nov. 23.—The resolution
on prohibition presented to the lib-
eral convention on Thursday afternoon
was as follows:—
"That this convention desires to
place on record its unqualified con-
viction that intemperance is an evil with
which there should be no compromise;
that the temperance sentiment of the
community as evidenced by votes tak-
en from time to time has shown that
the people are prepared for advanced
legislation, and without receding any-
where amendments to the license act
on which there should be no difference
of opinion, this convention declares
that an legislation which affords a
well-grounded hope of being effective in
curtailing and restraining the treat-
ing habit, in reducing the consumption
of intoxicating liquors, in closing drink-
ing resorts, and preventing the sale of
liquors on Sundays and during prohib-
ited hours, and the most vigorous
enforcement of the license law in every
particular would meet with the ap-
proval as in the interests of public
morals, the domestic comfort, and the
material wealth of the people of On-
tario.

"That this convention further be-
lieves that the power given to munici-
palities to close bars and shops un-
der what is known as local option if
generally exercised would greatly tend
to remove the cause of intemperance,
and this convention would approve of
legislation whereby the vote of a mu-
nicipality must be taken under local
option on the petition of twenty-five
per cent. of the ratepayers without re-
ference to the municipal council, and
further, that in any case of submis-
sion under the local option system
there be provision made for offering
the alternative of government control
or for the acceptance by the people of
restrictions, such as further shorten-
ing the hours, reduction of license, or
government control of business now
carried on under shop licenses or oth-
erwise.

"That in each municipality a vote
be taken at the municipal elections of
1906 on the two questions, of aboli-
tion of the bar and abolition of shop
licenses, the result to be decisive, and
to go into effect at the expiration of
the then outstanding licenses, and that
all necessary legislation be introduced
in the meantime to enable this to be
done. In municipalities in which li-
censes are continued a similar vote
may be taken at any time after three
years.

"That no new licenses shall be
granted in unorganized New Ontario for
all time to come. The government
should take charge of the necessary
sales for medicinal purposes, etc. In
granting land for hotel sites it should
be stipulated that no liquor is to be
sold there.

Too Much Gold Lace.
Ottawa, Nov. 25.—It has just be-
come known that the character of the uni-
form worn by Hon. James Snowball,
lieutenant-governor of New Brunswick
was called in question by an officer
of Lord Minto's household. The offi-
cer in question claimed that the gov-
ernor's uniform was one which only
the governor-general or an imperial
privy councillor had the right to
wear. The governor asserted that he
had his London tailor's authority for
the statement that the uniform was
of the right class, and refused to
change it. The grades of official uni-
form are five in number, viz.: (1),
governor-general and imperial privy
councillor; (2), lieutenant-governor;
(3), privy councillor and soldier;
(4), deputy minister; (5), secre-
tary to the governor-general. This
uniform is the same in all cases ex-
cept that the higher the rank the
greater the amount of gold lace worn.

Cigarettes Killed Him.
Niagara Falls, Nov. 25.—Alfred Cul-
len, better known as "English Albert,"
one of the best known hotel keepers
on the Canadian side of the river,
died last night at Niagara Falls, Ont.
While the attending physician states
that pneumonia was the cause of his
death, it is stated that his end was
brought on by excessive cigarette
smoking. It was nothing unusual for
him to get away with fifty "cotton
nails" a day and sometimes his con-
sumption of cigarettes was in excess
of this number. He was taken ill ab-
out a week ago. He was a well known
character on the Canadian side of the
river. Cullen was about thirty-five
years of age.

Said He Took Strychnine.

Arden, Ont., Nov. 24.—News has just
reached the village of the death of
Manson Boomhower. It is said he took
strychnine about eight o'clock last
evening, and died immediately. De-
ceased was a farmer of Boomhower
township. He leaves a wife and fam-
ily. It is expected an inquest will be
held.

Elmira, N.Y., Nov. 25.—The largest
verdict ever rendered in this county
was awarded Mrs. Carrie Book Peters
in supreme court here, when a jury
found for her in the sum of \$12,000 in
a breach of promise action against Dr.
Jay R. Pratt.
