KILLED AFTER MASS.

Workmen's Parade Followed By Rioting.

Razon, Russian Poland, Dec. 27. After midday mass at the Roman Catholic cathedral a crowd of workmen paraded the streets carrying red flags. The military authorities in trying to disperse them were received with shots and a serious encounter followed, in which the commander of the 26th Regiment was killed and a gendarme was wounded. One of the demonstrators was killed.

## MOVED AHEAD

Enemy's Advanced Positions Taken by Japs.

## AN OFFER MADE

BUT GEN. NOGI HERETOFORE REFUSED TERMS.

Kuropatkin Told His Men to Never Allow Themselves To Retreat—He Reports a Late Success—The General Situation Is Regarded as Quiet.

sed the counter attacks of two battalions of Japanese with great loss, the Japanese leaving nine prisoners in the hands of the Russians. The Russian losses were three officers and six men killed and three officers and sixty-one men wounded.

The night of December 23rd, Gen. Kuropatkin adds, was quiet.

Kuropatkin's Orders.

Mukden, Dec. 27.—Gen. Kuropatkin, addressing his men, said: "Let us not allow ourselves to retreat. Even in the case of the smallest detachment having once forced a plan it must be carried out to the end."

Doing More Damage.

St. Petersburg, Dec. 27.—There are further reports of the Japanese attacking at Rudoon, a railway bridge, between Mukden and Col. Ditzky was killed. From Chonchits comes the report of an attempt to destroy the statue of Alexander II. Riots caused by strikers have occurred in Riga and Baku.

Getting Ready For Turning.

Mukden, Dec. 27.—A number of soldiers who crossed the Shui river on Friday, surprised the forces of the enemy killing about 100 and taking fifteen prisoners. The Russian losses were trifling. A Japanese battery fire, December 24th, on Iohanchin, and two men were wounded by shells. A Japanese column advanced, but was soon driven back by the Russian fire. The general situation is quiet, though Chinese report that the Japanese are strengthening their left flank as though in contemplation of a turning movement.

TRIED TO KILL WIFE.

By Pouring Carbolic Acid Down Her Throat.

Rochester, N.Y., Dec. 27.—Crazed by jealousy, William Crowley, a married house keeper, on Saturday morning killed his wife, formerly Miss Minnie Beatrice Hadley, of Peterboro, Ont., poisoning a cup full of carbolic acid down her throat, after which he drank a quantity of the acid, dying at once.

Mrs. Crowley is in a critical condition. If she recovers she will be even disfigured. Mrs. Crowley's maid, now Mrs. Wilder, came home from Peterboro three months ago. Crowley, a few days ago threatened to kill his wife with a razor.

LIFT LOCK CONTRACT.

Awarded To Bridge Company Of Montreal?

Peterboro, Ont., Dec. 27.—The contract for the erection of the new lift lock at Kirkfield on the Trent canal, has been awarded to the Dominion Bridge company, of Montreal. The bridge is to be 100 feet long and will differ from the lock his.

It is likely that work will begin on the new contract immediately, to be completed by a year from next spring. The Dominion Bridge company built the steel superstructure of the Peterboro lift lock.

SAVED CRUCIFIX.

At The Risk Of Life—A Ghurah Destroyed.

Syracuse, Dec. 27.—Following the destruction by fire of the Icelandic Lutheran church, on Friday, the German Lutheran church fell prey to the devouring element, yesterday. The fire was caused by the falling of the steeple pipes while the organ was being heated during the morning service.

The loss is about \$8,000, partly insured. While the fire was at its height John Zoller rushed into the building and, at the risk of his life rescued the crucifix.

MANY KILLED.

In a Conflict Of Revolutionary Bulgarians.

Belgrade, Dec. 27.—Revolutionary Bulgarians, to-day, attacked a village near Levadevo and in the fighting thirty persons were killed. There are continual disorders around the town of Velen, near Lerina, and so far six Greeks and three Bulgarians have been killed.

New York, Dec. 27.—After having been exhibited for more than a month object of the curiosity of the Times quotes foreign correspondents, who have just come from Port Arthur, as saying that this is the strongest place that has ever been besieged. ## YUKON'S HEAD.

CANADA LEADS IN THE TRADE OUT THERE.

FIVE YEARS AGO THE REVERSE WAS THE CASE—TO SECOND ADDRESS MEMBER-ELECT FOR MONTMORIEN OFFERED HONOR—BROUGHT OUT SIXTY SERVANTS.

Ottawa, Dec. 27.—The resignation of James A. Smart as deputy minister of the interior has caused a rumor that he will succeed Mr. Congdon as governor of the Yukon. He is regarded as a fairly capable administrator and is a shrewd politician and has the happy faculty of being familiar with Mr. Sifton's policy, and ideas in connection with the development of the Yukon.

Canada now controls the bulk of the trade to the Yukon. Five years ago the reverse was the case, and the total importations amounted to 35,468 tons of which the foreign trade was only 12,602 tons. For the past three fiscal years there has been a large annual increasing balance of trade. Canada's favorite in the case of goods entering northern British Columbia and Yukon via the White Pass and Yukon route, amounted in 1901-2, to \$1,916,850; in 1902-3, \$1,994,639, and in 1903-4, \$2,645,022. In the case of imports, entering via Alaska, there was a balance of trade in Canada's favor of \$49,578 in 1902-3, and of \$80,560 in 1903-4.

George Parent, M.P. for Mountmore, has been asked to second the address in reply to the speech from the throne. Mr. Parent has just celebrated his twenty-fifth birthday.

Earl Grey brought sixty servants with him to Rideau Hall. This is the first time that such a large retinue has accompanied a governor-general.

ELEPHANTS DELAY WORK.

Charge Workmen In Cape To Cairo Line.

Cape Town, Dec. 27.—Huge herds of elephants are obstructing and delaying the progress of the construction of the Cape-to-Cairo railroad. This railway, which is to link the Mediterranean with the Indian ocean, is being built from the north and south.

IS O'BRIEN DEAD?

Report That Notorious Confidence-Man Has Passed Away.

New York, Dec. 27.—A report has reached this city that Thomas O'Brien, the notorious confidence man and alleged inventor of the "gold brick" swindle, is dead in the French penal settlement at Cayenne, where he had been serving a life sentence for the murder of his partner, "Old" Will. O'Brien's career was remarkable one. He was born fifty-three years ago in Chicago, and, aided by an attractive personality, managed to make an enviable record, and was mugged in prison.

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
