New York, Dec. 30.—A romance which reaches half around the world and which recalls the days when the Bostonians had their money, was revealed yesterday by the engagement of Miss Gertrude Carter, daughter of the Rev. and Mrs. Frederick Carter, of Montreal, N.J., to Rev. Alfred Gilman, of the American Mission in China.

Miss Carter's parents made the engagement public. In addition to her post of duty at Hankow, China, and Dr. Gilman is at La Plata, N.Y.

The announcement was not an entire surprise to those who knew the bride, and that it was likely to be made by whom it has been associated in the foreign missionary field.

Miss Carter has been in China but a short while, but Dr. Gilman has been identified with missionary labors in that part of the world for many years. He comes of a family of missionaries, and one of his near relatives, Gertrude Gilman, was a member of those who were in Peking during the siege and was given up for dead.

After the allied armies had taken Peking, Miss Gilman was brought to Tien-Tsin, where she remained until she was permitted to return to the scenes of her labors.

No date has been set for the wedding and it is not yet decided whether Miss Carter will return to this country or if the wedding will take place when Dr. Gilman has gone back to his post in China.
