

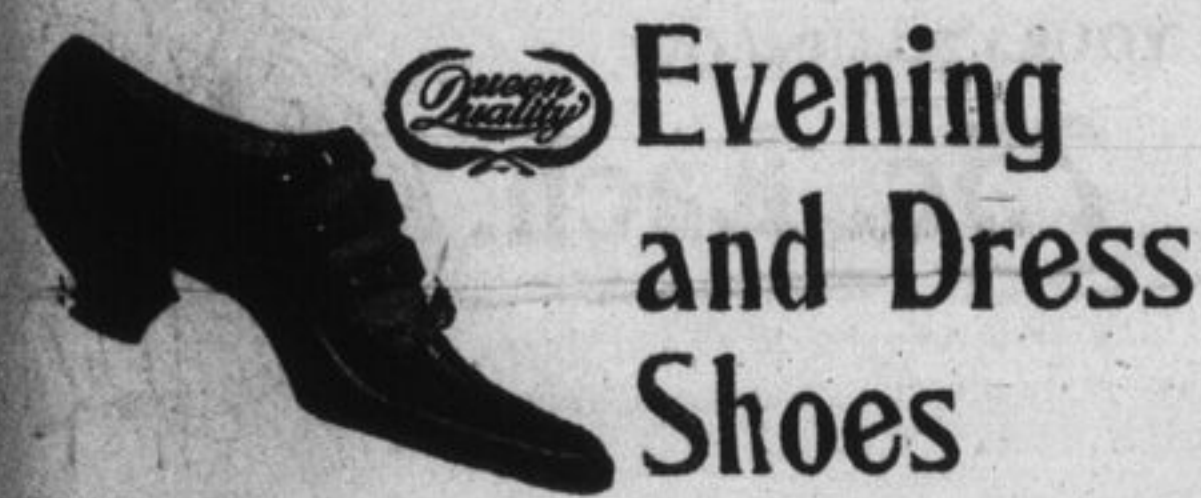

## OUR LETTER BOX.

### ALD. KING TELLS HIS SIDE OF THE CASE.

The By-law in regard to O'Kill Sewer Should Be Considered by the Electors—How the Matter Was Handled.

Kingston, Dec. 29.—(To the Editor): I am pleased to see in your columns, on Thursday evening, a reference to the by-law in connection with the proposed extension of the O'Kill sewer. It is unfortunate that more has not been published before this to enable the electors to vote intelligently on the question. One point should be made clear. The council's duty, when their own judgment coincides, is to carry out the recommendation of the board of health and to adopt the plan proposed by the engineer. Granting that, if the by-law to carry the proposed cost by debentures is not adopted by the ratepayers, the council of 1907 will have to provide the amount in the budget and raise it as part of the 1908 taxes. It is wise to impose that burden in one year instead of distributing it in the annual payments of \$207 called for by the by-law. The majority of the board of health are in favour of the present by-law. You need not credit Ald. Bassam, "the energetic representative of Victoria Ward," with a leading part in the matter and you can claim for him the gratitude of the electors. Now far be it from me to make light of the energetic work done by my good friend, Ald. Bassam in any direction. But are you quite fair to me?

The fact is in the first place that the engineer's estimate was prepared at my instance, and with my assistance on the spot in 1907. The board of works of that year, however (of which I was not a member), considered the cost, \$2,500, prohibitive, and deferred action. It is true that subsequent councils have not reopened the question and the expense has been the reason. Let us see how the present situation arises. The question was revived by a petition presented this year to council. On June 20th, 1907, the board of works, (of which once more I am not a member), presented a report of which clause 7, was as follows: "On the communication of William and R. J. Robinson in reference to the O'Kill sewer, your committee beg leave to submit herewith a communication from the city auditor and to report that it is unable to recommend the necessary extension of the sewer unless council provides the funds for the same, estimated by the city engineer at \$2,500." The auditor's report was to the effect that the money could be raised as now proposed or paid out of the ordinary taxes. The report was signed by five aldermen, including "the energetic representative of Victoria Ward" above named. If adopted this would have effectually buried the whole question again, but I quote from the minutes that in a motion amended by Ald. King, seconded by Ald. Meek, that in place of clause 7, of the board of works report the following be substituted: "That the communication of this council, the improvement of the mouth of the O'Kill sewer recommended by the city engineer, is proper and should be immediately undertaken and that the finance report at the next meeting of council making provision for the necessary cost. Carried. The report as amended was adopted. At the next meeting on July 4th, the finance committee had not yet fully considered the matter, but at the meeting on July 18th, they recommended and council adopted the proposal for the present by-law. ## PROF. SHORT

### Speaks on Preferential Tariff

Before American Economic Association at Chicago This Afternoon—Declares That Canadian Preference Will Not Increase British Exports.

Prof. Adam Shortt, of Queen's University, read a paper on "Preferential Trade Between Britain and Canada," before the American Economic Association, in Chicago, this afternoon. He first pointed out that this preferential trade is one into which theory enters mostly as one of the factors in a concrete situation. At first sight, he pointed out, it might seem strange that Canada should have any difficulties about preferential trade with Britain when she apparently originated the scheme, first put it into practice and still, substantially, stands by it, even in modifying forms and with strong opposition on the part of special interests.

### THE VERY LATEST NEWS CALLED FROM ALL OVER THE WORLD.

M. Marafiev, Russian minister of education, has resigned. Hon. James Sutherland, minister of public works, is improved in health. Hon. George Shea and J. A. Cliff have been appointed to the Newfoundland executive council.

Ottawa winds up the year with a deficit of \$2,000 in general funds, and \$17,000 in water works funds. The stores of the new Canadian Pacific hotel at Winnipeg are on strike over the use of "stone planks."

W. Egan is appointed superintendent of the western division of the G.T.R., with office at Detroit, Mich., vice Mr. Brownlee, transferred. William O'Brien, New York, who gave testimony against Policeman Mallon, who shot Robert Brennan, last May, has been shot in revenge; he may die.

Senator Baker, Sweetburg, has taken a \$10,000 libel action against Hon. Mr. McCaskill, for alleging bribery and corruption in the Bromie election trial.

The United States senatorship for New York state has been settled, and the name of Senator Dewey will be the only one that is presented to the republican caucus.

S. A. Alexandrovsky, former Russian commissioner-general to the St. Louis exposition, has resigned his position as head of the Red Cross in the field on account of criticism.

The Toronto roller skating rink has been engaged by Hon. A. G. Blair, K.C., as its counsel to take up the work of organization of kindred companies in the United States, Great Britain and in foreign lands.

Report speaks of the projected betrothal of King Alfonso and Princess Victoria, youngest daughter of the Duke of Connaught, brother of King Edward, and of Louis Philippe, Crown Prince of Portugal, and Princess Margaret, eldest daughter of the Duke of Connaught.

Senator Avellaneda, son of a former president of the Argentine Republic, who resides in Paris, and is an officer in the Argentine army, was sentenced to one month's imprisonment, a fine of 500 francs and 10,000 francs damages for an automobile accident in Paris last June.

### Budget From Sharpston.

Sharpston, Dec. 29.—The annual school meeting took place Wednesday, Dec. 29, at 8 o'clock, and E. Taylor, secretary, F. W. Bell was elected trustee, J. Wilson and G. Bell were appointed auditors. Engineer Sharpe, injured in a G.T.R. accident, is a son of Mr. Sharpe, of this place. The engineer is improving nicely. T. Sharpe, Dakota, is visiting his father, A. Sharpe. The county road trustees are being elected, but no matter who is elected, taxes are sure to be always high. Miss Mabel Bell, daughter of F. W. Bell, was united in marriage to Mr. Miller, of Napawa. The abolition of toll gates again comes in for a great deal of discussion. A great many sharpshooters who travel the road pay for them; that the country has as yet a large debt on hand and that the county council should be chary of assuming new burdens. The trustees have engaged Miss English (sister of previous teacher) to teach for the coming year. Scarcity of water is still felt by many.
