TWO GENERALS

WILL GO TO JAPAN AS PRISONERS OF WAR.

Prince Oukhtomsky Said To Have Escaped—Hospitalers Were Scattered All Over Port Arthur—Fifty Per Cent. Of Officers Go With Men.

Special to the Whig. London, Jan. 9.—The correspondent at Tokyo of the Times says: "The map of Port Arthur which the Russians produced on December 18th in support of their complaint that the Japanese were shelling hospitals scattered throughout the old and new towns.

Will Go With Men.

Headquarters Japanese Army at Port Arthur, via Fusan, Jan. 9.—Lieut. Gen. Fook and Smirnov have been ordered to go to Japan as prisoners of war.

Sails Towards Home.

Suda Bay, Jan. 9.—Vice-Admiral Brodsky's division, consisting of the cruisers Oleg, Izumrud, Dneiper and Rion and the torpedo boat destroyers Grosny, Gromak and Reutz, which left Suda Bay, left Sunday afternoon for Port Said.

Feats Japanese Squadron.

St. Petersburg, Jan. 9.—Grave fears have been created at St. Petersburg by the rumor that a strong Japanese fleet, consisting of the battleships Mikasa, Matsuyama, and the cruiser Mutsu, had been sighted near Madagascar.

Admiral Officers Constancy.

Tokyo, Jan. 9.—The Japanese, who express great admiration for Gen. Fook and other officers, for refusing parole, and standing by the men of their army, are busily preparing to receive the Russian prisoners from Port Arthur.

NEWSY ITEMS FROM MANY QUARTERS OF EARTH.

Matters That Interest Everybody—Notes From All Over—Little Of Everything Easily Read And Remembered.

Dr. John Hunter will run as an independent candidate in West Toronto. W. J. Mayor, Whitey, who was on a visit to Toronto, died as the result of a fall.

H. P. Crosby, who represented East York in the first Ontario legislature, is dead.

Rev. William Bee, one of old Primitive Methodist leaders, died at the age of seventy-eight.

Rev. Brother Walter has been appointed principal of the De la Salle Institute, Toronto.

Miss Kate Briley, Toronto, strangled herself to death while despondent through illness.

The Temiskaming railway is to be taken over for operation from the contractors on January 14th.

Rev. James L. Gordon, Bond street church, Toronto, has accepted the call to the Central Congregational church, Winnipeg.

In a battle between Cossacks and workmen at Baku, two of the former and six of the latter were killed. There was a big fire then, of incendiary origin.

Rev. Arthur Browning, a retired Methodist minister, was suddenly stricken while walking on the street in Toronto, and died in a few minutes.

At Peabody, Mass., James E. Ricker, aged fifty-one years, a veteran of the Spanish war, committed suicide by shooting through the head. He left a note saying that he had been deceived by a woman.

An attempted double murder followed by a suicide occurred at Tracy, Minn. Iowa P. Hustel shot Mrs. G. B. Lindsay and her daughter, Eva, and then sent a bullet through his own heart, dying instantly.

Martin MacDonald, thirty-eight and unmarried, was instantly killed by the Carthage train between Rutland and high streets, Waterdown. He was walking on the track and disregarded the signals of the engineer.

A gang of boy burglars, who gave promise of equaling the famous Chicago car barn bandits, have kept the police of Birmingham city busy. When rounded up they tried to shoot the policeman, but the gun failed to work.

The mail car of the Atlantic Coast Line, into Montgomery, Ala., was robbed about five miles east of the city. A large amount of registered mail was secured and the bandit made his escape. Eugene Hester, mail clerk, was shot through the hand.

The funeral of Port Arthur was celebrated at New York at a mass meeting of Japanese residents of the city, held in Carnegie Hall. The affair was intended to be solely for the Japanese residents, 200 of whom attended, and the only invited guests were Gen. Stewart L. Woodford, former minister to Spain, and Alexander Tison, both of whom spoke.
