Russian Ships At Port Said. Port Said, Egypt, Jan. 11.-The division of Russian warships, commanded by Rear Admiral Rotovskoy, which left Suez Bay, island of Crete, on Sunday, the cruisers, Oleg, Ismail, Dnieper and Lion, and the torpedo boat destroyers, Grozni, and Reziy, have arrived here. The Russian minister, accompanied by Capt. Schwank of the Russian navy, boarded the flagship Oleg. After the signing of the necessary declarations the vessels will be allowed a limited quantity of coal. The squadron will leave Port Said at ten o'clock this morning. A torpedo boat destroyer while entering the harbor, yesterday struck, and sank a coal lighter.

LOUISE MICHEL DEAD. Noted French Female Communist Passes Away At Paris.



LOUISE MICHEL. Marvellous, Jan. 11.-Louise Michel, the noted communist, is dead. Louise Michel was born in 1830. She became a teacher in 1853, and ultimately taught in Paris and Montmartre. She took an active part in the revolutionary communist in Paris, and was made a prisoner in 1870. She was sentenced to transportation for life, but was released, and returned to Paris in 1880. She was again imprisoned in 1883 and 1886. She wrote many books attacking the social system, and of late years she was classed as an anarchist.

THE TRUTH OF THE MATTER. German Fleet Mobilized to Aid Russia.

Berlin, Jan. 11.-It is stated, this morning, that the truth of the rumored Anglo-German trouble, which occurred just after the Dogger Bank affair, was as follows: After the firing by the Russian Baltic fleet, that the British fleet, the German navy was mobilized with the intention of supporting Russia, if war occurred between that country and England. The British government then lodged protest with Germany against the latter's mobilization, and Germany, deprived of Russia's assistance, has hastened to conciliate Britain.

WANT TO SEE Parliament Will Open On Thursday. MEETS TODAY BUT THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL WON'T ATTEND.

There is Rustle and Excitement About the House—The Ladies Anxious To See And Hear—Unraveling a Tangle As To Seats. Special to the Whig. Ottawa, Jan. 11.-Parliament will be opened to-morrow, with more than the usual pomp and ceremony. The world and its wife wish to see the new governor-general, and to hear how he speaks English and French, and the Senate Dress Gallery has been increased in size to gratify feminine curiosity. The desire to see and hear is so epidemic and the gentlemen of the House of Commons are so anxious to give seats to the ladies, that the House is trying to unravel the tangled seat plan, and the chief opposition whip, like Oliver Wood, is making for more. Through the wide corridors' wings the hum of incessant preparation, mingled with the odour of fresh paint, while members are wishing each other a Happy New Year and a short session. Sir Wilfrid Laurier has definitely informed Senator Fairbanks that it is useless to hope for the re-assembling of the joint high commission to discuss reciprocity at this time. There is talk of building a northern extension to the west wing of the House of Commons, and running an extension westerly from Mr. Spoke's apartments out to the new building forming a new quadrangle, as well as to add another flat to the common and senate buildings.
