A GREAT RALLY. THE GATHERING IN THE WHIG HALL.

Under the Auspices of the Young Liberals—There Were Lively Speeches and Bright Songs—All Enjoyed Themselves. The Young Liberal Rally held in the Whig hall last evening was, in every respect, the largest and most successful rally ever held in the history of that long established organization.

The meeting was called to order at about eight thirty o'clock by Nicholas O'Connor, who, in the absence of President William Macdonald, extended a hearty welcome on behalf of the Young Liberal Club. In a brief speech he called on his hearers to band together for the common good and protect the grand heritage which has been handed down to our present worthy leader, Hon. G. W. Ross, by the great leaders of the past.

The first speaker was Albert Solos by Messrs. Arthur Ellis, Volker Kennedy, J. Cousins and W. W. Richardson were all heartily enjoyed, and were sung in a rousing and stirring manner, the vocalists being recalled for encore. An impromptu flute solo by Albert Simmons, was also given, and the next speaker, a mandolin and guitar duo by H. V. Finnie and E. H. Nicole, of Queen's Mandolin and Guitar Club, was artistically rendered and heartily applauded.

The first speech by J. M. Ford, president of the Reform Association, was a masterly effort, the speaker reviewing in concise terms the past record of the liberal government in Ontario and showing the marked contrast displayed by the conservative party as the government of the dominion and opposition in the provincial legislature. He first congratulated the young liberals upon the evidence of their showing, which he said was improving with every rally.

Young men, he said, are naturally on the liberal side in this election and in the government platform during their long term of power plainly demonstrates the reason of this fact. He briefly dealt with the highly successful liberal convention recently held in Toronto, at which a permanent platform was adopted which meets the requirements of our growing times. J. P. Whitney, he characterized as a good leader of the opposition, no leader of public opinion but one who was only able to follow the lead of the liberal leader. The conservatives, he said, also held a convention in Toronto, attended by about twelve hundred delegates, mostly from Toronto and Hamilton, contrasted with four thousand delegates at the liberal convention, representatives of the entire province.

The speaker next dealt with the campaign methods of the conservatives in crying down the Ross government as corrupt. Electoral party is an important matter and if the liberal party can be proved corrupt and the conservatives, pure, the latter have some reason for their election cries.

CIVIC MATTERS. BUSINESS DONE BY THE PROPERTY COMMITTEE.

Council Chamber Ceiling Not In Good Condition—Telephones In The City Buildings To Be Re-arranged. The city property committee met yesterday afternoon at four o'clock, in attendance being: Alds. Sears (chairman), Givens, Walker, McEwan and Johnston. The committee was advised by the local manager of the Bank of British North America, asking that the removal of the old and dilapidated ceiling of the council chamber be put in order. On motion of Ald. Walker, it was decided to accede to the request, the question of liability to be decided hereafter.

Walker, is the liberal side of the chamber, and I do not think we ought to touch it. Let it fall. The chairman and the engineer were instructed to examine the ceiling and find out what can be done to strengthen it. Another thing the chairman advocated was the placing of electric lighting in the police court. At present, the city is paying two dollars a year for gas in the police court. The cost of putting in electric light would be small. This matter was left to the chairman for a report as to cost.

House of Industry. At a meeting of the House of Industry directors, there were present J. E. Knapp (chairman), Alds. Meek and Johnston, Mrs. Birch and Miss Holt. The superintendent's report showed that the house contained more inmates last month than usual, and the expenses were rather high for December, \$188. It was decided to ask the city council to instruct the permanent auditor to audit the house accounts each month, before the directors' meeting.
