ATTEMPTS TO COMMIT SUI-CIDE BY SHOOTING.

Business Troubles The Cause Some Manufacturers Protesting Against Some Members Of New Merger Directorate.

Special to the Whig. Montreal, Jan. 13 .- Arthur Verner, a clerk, twenty-five years of age, attempted to commit suicide in his father-in-law's residence, St. Elizabeth street, by shooting himself near the heart. He was hurried in an ambulance to Notre Dame Hospital, where on examination, the physicians found, that the bullet had just missed passing through his heart; and had lodged in the small of the back. His chances of recovery are slight. Verner had been in Winnipeg for about six months and returned to Montreal, with his wife a few days ago. He was in trouble with his employer, in Winnipeg, over some money matters, and it is supposed that is what was preying on his mind, and was the reason for his attempt to end his life.
