"AT HOME" OF '05

A SPLENDID FUNCTION AT QUEEN'S.

One Of The Most Enjoyable Dances Ever Given There—The Musical Programme—The Number Of Guests Was Limited.

That much anticipated social event at Queen's, the "At Home," of the final year in arts, medicine and science, last night proved to be well worthy of all the extravagant words which have been used in prophesying its success. The magnificent Grant hall, the centre of attraction, where the dancing was held, presented a beautiful and ever-changing scene. The interior of the hall, in which further decoration would be superfluous, looked at its best, with its artistic coloring scheme and brilliant lights. Beneath the galleries along the walls of the room were arranged comfortable easy chairs and seats where the dancers could rest between the numbers. The red room on the main floor was also utilized as a sitting-room and was a scene of subdued grandeur.

The guests, numbering about three hundred, were received by the presidents of the final year in arts, medicine and science, and were, by them, presented to the patronesses, Misses Gordon, Shortt, Connell and S. Kirkpatrick. Several professors and their wives were also among the guests and apparently formed a very large part of the younger set present. The floor of the hall was in excellent condition for dancing and the music as provided by Crosby and O'Connor's orchestra, was the subject of many favorable comments, that it was the best given at Queen's in many years. The comparatively small number of guests made dancing a genuine pleasure as it did away with all possibility of over-crowding, which has on other occasions marred the pleasure of college dances.

From eleven o'clock until the close, Caterer Thomas Ferguson, with a large staff of willing assistants, dispensed the choicest of refreshments in several rooms on the ground floor of the arts' building. The reading room was the main refreshment room and here were set many tables where the wants of the guests were tended with all possible expedition.

All things considered, the final year "At Home" of the year '05 has merited a place among the foremost college social functions and will long be remembered by those who enjoyed the hospitality of the senior students at Queen's. The committee who had the affair in charge, were deserving of the many compliments they received in regard to their capable management of every detail.

The concert was held in one of the large rooms in the new arts' building. The leading part in the programme was taken by Miss Mae Dickenson, a well-known soprano and guitar soloist of Toronto, who was greeted with a large audience on each appearance. It is safe to say that Miss Dickenson simply captivated and charmed her audience each time. Her sweet and well-trained voice, together with her charming stage presence, won the admiration of her hearers on her first appearance and the more they heard her the more they liked her, which was amply evidenced by the fact that, though she appeared five times during the evening, she was heartily cheered each time. Miss Dickenson's selections were taken mainly from Spanish, Japanese, Irish and Scotch ballads and her rendering of that old Scotch ballad "Loch Lomond," was simply wonderful and those who heard it were firmly convinced that Miss Dickenson is one of the best ballad singers in Canada to-day. Miss Dickenson accompanies herself on the guitar and piano, and her selection on the guitar showed that she is able to handle that delicate instrument to perfection. When Miss Dickenson had finished the unanimous opinion seemed to be that she had proved herself to be one of the best soloists ever heard in Kingston and one of whom all Canada may well feel proud.

The programme consisted of eight numbers, and the remaining ones were taken by several of our best known and best liked local artists, including Miss Edith Mills and D. A. McKerscher. Miss Mills sang very charmingly indeed and Kingston audiences are growing to like her more and more on each occasion of her appearance, and it is safe to say she has a great future in store for her as a singer. Mr. McKerscher's selections were greatly appreciated as they always are, and they formed a very valuable addition to one of the best concert programmes of its kind ever given in Kingston. The final year is to be congratulated upon introducing such high class entertainment into Queen's "At Home" for the benefit, especially of those who do not partake in the dancing. Miss Munroe was also to have appeared, but was unavoidably absent and her place was taken by Mr. McKerscher.

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
