COMMERCIAL MATTERS.

What Is Going On In the Business World—The Markets.

Failures in Canada this week were twenty-three, as against thirty-seven last year.

The Commercial Union Assurance company will absorb the Ancient Head-in-Hand.

It is said that the American Woolen Co. claims to have \$15,000,000 worth of orders pending.

Montgomery Ward & Co., the big mail order departmental store, of Chicago, may establish a branch in Windsor.

In Berlin applications for the Russian loan were closed immediately after it was closed on Thursday morning.

An advance of 10c to 15c per cwt. in prices of Canadian refined sugars is announced.

Sugars are now dearer than at any other time in many years.

The Canada clip of wool of almost 10,000,000 pounds, which usually went to the United States, has been bought by Germany at very high prices.

A Seattle dispatch says Canadian capitalists have bought from Chicago parties controlling interests in the Alaska Central Railroad, which is in process of construction.

The Nelson, B.C., Daily News gives production of the Crow's Nest Pass collieries in the year just closed as higher than in any previous year, about 1,086,000 tons.

Of this 744,000 tons were disposed of as coal, and the remainder made into 234,000 tons of coke.

A FINE ORDER.

GOVERNMENTS LOYAL TO CANADIAN WORKS.

Locomotive Works Has Had Another Order of Engines For The Temiskaming Railway—Keeping Workmen Busy.

The Canadian Locomotive Co., today received notice that their was the lowest tender for four engines required for the Temiskaming and Northern Railway, now being built through New Ontario.

This order completes a total of eight engines which the Kingston company will have finished for the new road. This makes in all about eighty-five engines, which the government of Ontario and the Dominion have had constructed in the locomotive shops here. The wages alone on these represent over \$750,000, all of which has inured to the benefit of Kingston's working men.

TWO RUNAWAYS.

One Accident May Have Serious Consequences.

Two runaways, one of which may prove serious in its consequences, occurred this morning.

A team of spirited horses, owned by Patrick Kelly, Glenburnie, led their owner in the city and started off at a rapid pace for home.

On Eideran street, the runaway collided with a delivery rig, owned by Frank Burke, butcher, and driven by a lad named Daniel Hogan.

The latter was turning his horse around, not noticing the approach of the runaway team, with the result that when the delivery rig was turned directly across the road, the runaway crashed into it with full force.

The horses jumping right into the delivery rig on top of the driver, and smashing the rig into splinters. Hogan was badly cut about the head and body, and received several bad kicks from the horses, which were frantic in their endeavor to clear themselves of the wreckage.

Burke's horse was also cut in several places, but the driver managed to keep him from running away.

The driver's team was stopped, and held, waiting his arrival on the scene. Hogan, although severely hurt, held his horse for some time, until help arrived, and then he was removed to Dr. Healey's street, where his injuries were dressed, after which he was removed to his home on Victoria street.

When the farmer arrived it is said by some who were there that he was almost indifferent to the injuries received by Hogan, and lent him no assistance. The owner of the delivery rig intends to secure remuneration from the farmer for the damage done to his outfit.

The second runaway occurred shortly before twelve o'clock, on Brock street, and was not of a serious nature, although it looked, for a moment, as if a bad mix-up would result.

A horse hitched to a battery box-sleigh and driven by two battery-men, made a break at the market square, and dashed up Brock street, upsetting the rig and breaking the box and harness slightly.

Several collisions were narrowly averted before the runaway was captured near Bagot street by William Murray, Jr.'s son.

ICE RACING ASSOCIATION.

Will Put On Ice-Scraper To Clear Track.

Although the local Ice Racing Association have been experiencing hard luck on account of their inability to keep their race track clear of snow, they will again put a scraper to work on the track, so that they may wear track at about the same place below the bridge that the first one was staked out. The date for the local race has not yet been definitely set, but it is understood that it will be immediately after the Ottawa races, which are held for February 4th to 11th.

The number of local horses competing will probably be about seven, and several outside flyers will also enter.

The Frontenac and Stroller hockey teams had a good joint practice at the rink, last night, after the hockey match. This was the final practice of these teams before their Monday night games. Both teams were out in force and showed good form. The ice was in good condition for a hard game.

WORKING ON BURGLARY CASE.

Liquor Stolen Last Saturday Or Sunday.

The police force have, during the past week, been working on a case of burglary, which occurred sometime during Saturday evening and Sunday morning last. The premises entered was in a goods shed on Princess street, entrance being gained through the rear of the building.

A quantity of liquor, consisting of several quart bottles of whiskey, and some other articles, were taken. The police were notified to keep a look out for any persons who looked as if they were drunk on stolen liquor.

On Sunday night P.C. Page saw a young man named John Kelly, flashing a quart bottle of whiskey on Princess street, and immediately suspected him as the thief. On Thursday, further inquiries pointed to Kelly as the thief, and yesterday he was arrested on the charge. Kelly had been around collecting money to leave town, and had told several people that the police were after him.

He was remanded by Police Magistrate Farroll, and will probably come up for trial early next week. The police have, in the meantime, been working on the case, and hoped to arrest Kelly's accomplice in the theft. In this, however, they have so far proved unsuccessful, and it was said to-day that the suspected party has left for Chicago.

McGill Defeated Queen's.

McGill senior hockey team defeated Queen's in Montreal last night by 6 to 3. The Montreal Gazette says: "Although far from brilliant, the hockey was clean and fast, and probably of a higher standard than the colleges have shown in the past. As might be expected of a first game, there was an evident lack of condition on the part of some of the forwards, and the first half, which started out in a whirlwind style, tapered off somewhat towards the end. The efforts of both teams at combination work were decidedly spasmatic, and most of the scoring resulted from individual rushes. Queen's defeat may be set down to an all around improvement on the McGill team since last year rather than to any reversal of form on the part of Queen's. The latter looked good at all stages, but when it came to effective work McGill was a shade stronger. On the forward line Walsh and Richardson were all to the good, the latter sharing with Gilmeour the distinction of being the most conspicuous men on the ice. Macdonnell, at point, put up a very fair game last year, but in going, failed to replace Mills of last year's team."

Richardson scored two of Queen's goals, and Walsh one.
