### NEW FARMING

**DONE NOW AS SCIENTIFIC BUSINESS.**

The Farmer's Wife Has Come To Her Own—Farmer Coming To Produce Economically—Should Be No Objection To Book-Learning.

We are moving out of the old conditions, said Prof. C. J. Jones, Ontario's deputy minister of agriculture, at the Maritime winter fair. When our settlers first came to Canada they faced the primeval forest, and during all the clearing period the old agriculture held sway. With a new generation, conditions began to change; live stock came in, large barns were built, butter and cheese began to be made, and we gradually changed all our methods. This building and the exhibits it contains are proof that we are trying to keep up with the demands of the times and to compete with other countries by following the new agriculture. This must be conducted upon business principles. In towns every citizen is a merchant, and the manufacturer has also had to change his methods. The farmer is just as much a manufacturer as the man in town who makes boots, clothes and hardware. The manufacturer in town finds it necessary to make the kind of goods that the consumer demands. It is also one of the conditions to-day that the farmer should produce what his customers want. We must consider what each district is best capable of producing, and work along that line. Grow the crops and keep the live stock that thrive best where we live.

The manufacturer must produce economically. Our best new mills are now run with practically no waste of material; even the dust is used. One of the best examples of economical manufacturing is seen in the great stock yards of Chicago, where absolutely every part of an animal is turned into a marketable product. So the farmer must endeavor to convert to a profitable use all his products. He should see to it that there is no waste land under woods, under fences or in careless cultivation. The farmer has, perhaps, in his operations, overlooked problems to meet than any other manufacturer, if he would avoid unnecessary waste. There should not be any objection to book learning, for the intelligent man can find agricultural papers and books get the valuable experience of other men. Scientific men have been studying and finding out truths about plant growth, the composition of our soils, the breeding and feeding of animals, the growing of fruit, etc., and it will pay us to learn what these men have found out. The farm work of the future will be a great deal more enjoyable. In Ontario the farmers are very seldom referred to as "old heads." The intelligent man who watches closely all the results of his work is interested and takes a pleasure in it. The work that he has found out that the farmer can benefit by an education applicable to his business.

A few years ago in Ontario we first found out that the farmer had a wife, and we are doing our best to help her betterment. She has had a hard life, her work has been practically unending and she has not had the benefit of labor-saving devices to which we are trying to relieve her of all the drudgery possible by our system of women's institutes and domestic science teaching. There are children on the farms, and we are inaugurating a movement to provide the right kind of education for them. The reform of the agricultural home is the start of our new agriculture. Establish a farmer with an inclination to make the most of his opportunities, and children getting a rational education, and no matter how poor that farm it will succeed.

Tolstoi's latest play, "The Power of Darkness," is said to be even more unpleasant than "Resurrection."

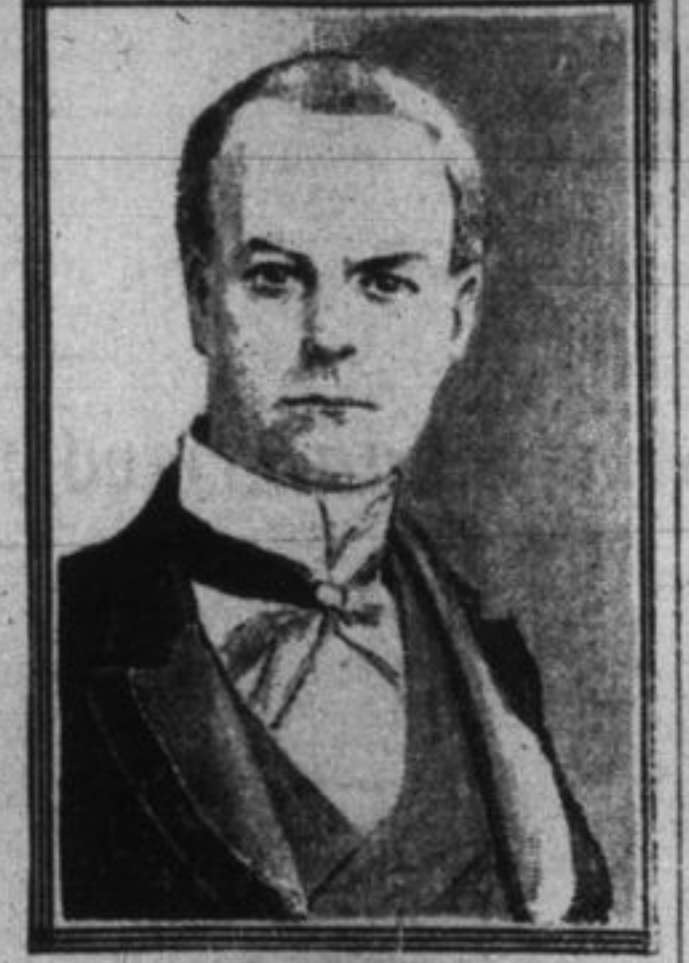
Calve took the part of the heroine at the 1000th performance of "Carmen" at the Opera Comique, Paris, Dec. 23rd.

**EXPECTED TO BE KILLED.**

**Boy's Remarkable Letter Read At Murder Trial.**

London, Jan. 14.—A Paris cable to The Chronicle says: During the trial of a man named Lafaille at the Hautes Pyrennes assizes for the murder of his son Bernard, a remarkable letter was read which showed that the boy had expected to be killed. The crime was committed in August last year at Bagneres-de-Bigorre, where Lafaille had a farm.

Ever since his second marriage Lafaille appears to have shown an extraordinary hatred for the only child of his first wife, and it was stated also that the boy would have benefited to the extent of £5,000 on the death of his father. In his letter the boy describes how his father and mother had systematically starved and persecuted him in the hope of procuring his death and inhering the money for their own children. Having now learnt that his father was about to kill him, he desired that all be possessed should go to the daughter of a neighboring farmer, and it was his wish that he should not be buried in the family vault.

Witnesses at the trial described the tragedy as the work of a moment. The prisoner, accompanied by the eight-year-old daughter of his second wife, met his son Bernard in the street. "Ah, you are still alive, then?" he exclaimed. "Yes," the son replied. "I must kill you," the prisoner responded to which the youth answered "Do it, then?" The father took a revolver from his pocket and fired three times at the youth, every bullet taking effect. "My father has killed me," the youth gasped as he lay on the pavement, where he fell at the first shot. He died a few hours later.

The prisoner showed no remorse whatever for his terrible crime.
