THE CHINESE

Appear to be Helping Cossack Raiders.

RUSSIAN FORCE

REPULSED BY JAPANESE LATELY NUMBERED 6,000.

1,200 Men Repairing Port Arthur - British Vessel Seized - Lloyds Gets Uneasy, And Raises Rates On Steamers Carrying Contraband.

Tokyo, Jan. 19.-A report comes from the Manchurian headquarters of the Japanese that with the Cossack detachment that raided the district west of New Changwe, were a large number of Chinese regular cavalry.

The Russian casualties in the fighting on January 14th, were over 300. The report states that the Russian force repulsed on January 18th, consisted of 6,000 Cossacks, with ten guns.

The Russians retired in a northerly direction through Liao Tung-lou. The same force, when encountered later, appeared greatly fatigued.

Many of the Russians were dressed entirely in Chinese costume, even to queues. From other sources it is reported that lately Cossacks attacked a Japanese position near Huihuan, south-east of Mukden.

Eleven Japanese were missing after the action. Twelve hundred workmen are repairing the dry-dock at Port Arthur.

The British steamer, Bowley, bound from Kiao Chuan to Vladivostok, with a cargo of shipping materials, was seized yesterday in the Tausima Straits.

The capture of another steamer is reported, but no details have yet been received.

Lloyds Is Uneasy.

London, Jan. 19.-The recent captures by Japanese warships of steamers carrying contraband of war has caused uneasiness among the underwriters at Lloyds.

Not long ago insurance was affected on such vessels at about thirty guineas per cent. Today the premium on vessels destined to pass through the Strait of Korea was seventy guineas, and on vessels bound for Vladivostok, by way of Lepasou Strait, fifty guineas per cent.

It is estimated that some fifty steamers bound for Vladivostok, are now approaching the sea of Japan. All of them are insured as war risks, by the Lloyds company, for about £2,000,000.

A dispatch to the Daily Mail from Shanghai says that the British steamer, Powderham, with a cargo of coal, has entered Wo Sung, her crew refusing to proceed with her to Vladivostok, to which port the vessel and cargo are consigned.

Russia's Neutrality Limitation.

St. Petersburg, Jan. 19.-It is semi-officially stated that although Russia is not concerned in the war agreed with the other powers to observe the neutrality of China, so long as Japan and China did, she specifically included within the sphere of hostilities the territory between the Liao River and the Yinkow and Simingting railway.

German Steamer Wrecked.

London, Jan. 19.-The Times says: The Hamburg-American steamer Bengalia, which has been wrecked off the Madagascar coast, is one of the sixteen big German steamers which went to Madagascar with Welsh coal for the Baltic fleet.

She is of 7,550 tons burden and was built in 1908.

Rumor Unfounded.

St. Petersburg, Jan. 19.-The statement that Kashgar, eastern Turkestan, has been occupied by Russia is not correct. Enquiries show that there has been no change in the situation at Kashgar, so far as Russia is concerned.

STOLE MONEY FROM LETTERS.

Man With Family In Evil Moment Falls.

Montreal, Jan. 19.-E. Wilfrid Blouin, aged forty-six, a letter-carrier, with seven of a family, who has been employed in the postal service for eleven years, yesterday pleaded guilty to stealing money from letters.

He was suspected and was caught by a decoy letter addressed to a Sicilian from Mary on Borchester street, from which \$5 was taken. The money was found on him. Blouin will be sent down for three years. His family in the meantime are hardly able to struggle along without assistance.

THE ESTIMATES

Brought Down In The House Of Commons.

Ottawa, Jan. 19.-The estimates submitted to the House of Commons yesterday, amounts to \$65,664,297.70 a decrease of \$6,295,621.85 as compared with last year.

Winsted, Conn., Jan. 19.-"Gip" Williams, a church-going dog, died in Northville, a Berkshire village, yesterday and his funeral was held today.

Many children followed the dog to its burial place.

Gip, who was owned by a family named Williams, for years had attended prayer meetings and all the entertainments in the village church.

After the family had gone to prayer meeting last week Charles Richardson, who lives with the Williamses, said to the dog: "Gip, you can't go to church to-night." The dog walked in to the next room and went through the window, snuff and all.

Arriving at the church Gip pushed the swinging door open and took his accustomed seat with the congregation.

ELECTION IN WRIGHT.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier Decides To Sit For Quebec East.

Ottawa, Ont., Jan. 19.-At the last general election it will be remembered that Sir Wilfrid Laurier was elected for two ridings-Quebec East and Wright.

His nomination in the latter constituency was made to avert a faction fight, yesterday, as provided by the rules of parliament, the prime minister made his decision as to the constituency for which he will sit by electing Sir Wilfrid Laurier for the latter riding.

The writ for the election was issued last evening, nominations to take place on January 27th, polling on February 3rd. A lively contest is expected.

REV. DR. JOHNSTON

Has Heard Nothing Of Rumor Concerning Him.

Montreal, Jan. 19.-When shown a dispatch from Galt, Ont., stating that the Rev. Dr. Johnston, Montreal, had been elected to the chair of practical theology in Knox College, Dr. Johnston said, last night, that this was the first intimation of the presbytery's action, which he had received. In fact he was not aware that the chair was vacant. Dr. Johnston remarked the attraction which the position held for him made any change from his present work unlikely.

WARNING TO THIEVES.

Escape a Sentence Of Forty-two Years.

Vancouver, B.C., Jan. 19.-Alexander A. Walters, alias Cyril Byron Scott, a young Englishman, twenty-four years of age, pleaded guilty in the police court to nine charges of stealing overcoats and umbrellas. He also admitted that he was a deserter from the North-West Mounted police. In sentence the Guelph presbytery had nominated the Rev. Inhabitants Are Buried Alive By Falling Of Walls.

London, Jan. 19.-A dispatch from St. Petersburg to a news agency reports that an earthquake at Shomal, seventy-six miles north by north-west of Baku, buried hundreds of persons in the ruins of large buildings in the lower part of the town, which was densely populated, despite the decision after the earthquake of three years ago that no more houses should be built there.

SWEDISH KING ILL.

In Dangerous Condition From Facial Paralysis.

London, Jan. 19.-A dispatch to the Telegraph from Copenhagen states that a telegram from Stockholm reports that the King Oscar is dangerously ill from facial paralysis. The festivities arranged for his majesty's birthday, January 21st, have been cancelled. Crown Prince Frederick of Denmark, whose wife is a niece of King Oscar, has gone to Stockholm.

WERE ARRESTED.

Bail Is Being Sought For Suspect to the Whig.

Toronto, Jan. 19.-Sarah Goodfellow, Isabella A. Grant, Elizabeth See and William Brundrett, the Christian Science demonstrators, adjudged guilty of manslaughter by a coroner's jury, in connection with the death of William Goodfellow, son of the first named woman, were arrested last evening.

They remained in the cells over night. Application will be made to a high court judge, to-day, for bail. Bonds of \$10,000 were offered last night.

A number of sympathizers remained around the police station until a late hour and leaders of the sect requested that the prisoners be made as comfortable as possible.

Bail Was Refused.

Toronto, Jan. 19.-The four Christian Science adepts who were arrested on a charge of manslaughter in connection with the death of Wallace Goodfellow, appeared in the police court, this morning. A large number of sympathizers were present. The case was remanded until to-morrow.

At Osgoode hall, this morning, T. C. Robinette, K. C., applied, before Justice Anglin, for bail for the prisoners, but the judge held that he had no jurisdiction until evidence had been submitted for trial.

In the police court, when Mr. Robinette asked for bail, Magistrate Denison said he had no power to grant bail upon a charge of manslaughter.

"So-called," interpreted Mr. Robinette. "As a matter of fact," added Mr. Robinette, "I think summons should have been issued in this case."

"I wouldn't have issued summons," said the magistrate, "if I think it was a very stupid case of manslaughter. When a man is dying he needs the best attendance obtainable and should not be neglected."

"The man was twenty-one years of age," said Mr. Robinette as the prisoners filed down stairs. The prisoners were remanded until Monday (next to-morrow).

WOULD HAVE BEEN LYNCHED

But The Officers Made A Detour.

Detroit, Mich., Jan. 19.-An Algoma dispatch says: "William Sauer, Jr., who shot and killed Constable Moore, yesterday, while the latter was attempting to replenish some logs in possession of Sauer, was captured yesterday afternoon a few miles from here. Had he been brought here he certainly would have been lynched. A large crowd was waiting for him with a rope. A detour was made, however, and Sauer was taken to Robert's Landing. The Sauer family squatters in the middle channel, a few miles below here. The logs are some that broke away from the booms of the Hall Lumber company, Sarnia, two years ago."

JUDGMENT UPHELD

And Case Will Go On To Privy Council.

Montreal, Jan. 19.-The court of king's bench in appeal, to-day, confirmed the judgment of the court of review, condemning the Montreal and St. Lawrence Light & Power company to pay \$260,000 to Edmund A. Robert for the property at Bulson Point, Beauharnois, which they brought in 1901. The company pleaded that it had no authority, by its charter, to make such purchase, and the meeting at which the purchase was decided upon was not regular. The case will go to the privy council.

LOVE OF A BABY.

Prevented Great Reforms Being Granted Russians.

New York, Jan. 19.-A story comes via Paris in explanation of why Czar Nicholas refused recently demanded reforms. His mother took the czar's baby son to him on the day that he was about to grant the desired reforms, and argued that as he had the right to divest himself of the throne of his autocratic prerogatives, he was morally wrong to leave his boy with less imperial power than he had himself received from his own father. Papa agreed and that ended the reform business.

SEEKING TERMS.

But If None Reached Then Strike Comes.

Philadelphia, Jan. 19.-P. H. Morrissey, grand master of the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen has been called here by First Grand Master W. G. Lee, who was unable to reach an agreement with W. W. Atterbury, general manager of the Pennsylvania railroad, regarding the differences between the company and the trainmen. Mr. Lee said this morning that no strike order would be issued before to-night.

Man Charged With Murder.

Winnipeg, Jan. 19.-Robert William Taylor, who murdered his wife here in November, died Wednesday morning. He was in jail, awaiting trial. The cause of his death was consumption. He came from Tonawanda, N.Y., and Deseronto.
