**FIGHT A DUEL**

**WOMEN USE HAT PINS AND DAGGERS.**

One Is Stabbed To Death, The Other Escapes - Bloody Mystery In Street Of French Capital.

Paris, Jan. 28.—In the Rue de Bondy, yesterday a terrible tragedy was enacted by two women, who fought a duel with the result that one of them was stabbed to death, while her antagonist escaped. The cause of the encounter is a mystery.

It was about five o'clock in the afternoon when two cabs, driven at a furious rate, suddenly made their appearance in the street and stopped abruptly in front of No. 90. Immediately two elegantly dressed young women stepped out and closed in combat lacerating each other's face terribly with their nails.

A large crowd quickly collected around the two combatants, but nobody interfered. Soon nature's weapons proved insufficient, whereupon the women stabbed each other with hat pins. Eventually one exclaimed: "We must make an end of this. One of us must die," and in a twinkling of an eye they both drew small daggers.

After a few savage thrusts one of the antagonists suddenly shrieked, "She has killed me," and sank to the ground, pierced through the heart.

A bystander who wished to come to her aid says the Petit Parisien, was received by the murderers with two stabs full in the chest. Then she leaped into one of the cabs, which had been waiting, and before anybody could bar their way, both vehicles had rapidly driven off.

The injured woman, who had no papers of identification on her, was carried to a neighboring chemist's, where she shortly afterward expired, while the man who had been stabbed, was taken to the hospital.

**GRAND DUKE WEDS COUSIN.**

**Bride The Divorced Grand Duchess Of Hesse.**



St. Petersburg, Jan. 28.—The czar has ordered Grand Duke Cyril to return immediately from Cannes, owing to a report that he has secretly married the Grand Duchess of Hesse, who is his cousin. They are alleged to have married at a priest of the Greek church with 800 guests at the ceremony. The czar had absolutely forbidden the marriage, but even he is now powerless to dissolve it.

The grand duke has been staying at Coburg as guest of the nobility, Grand Duchess of Saxe-Coburg-Gotha who is his aunt, and there he has been much in the society of the young grand duchess.

The czar's opposition to his cousin's marriage is based upon the fact that the grand duchess was divorced from her husband three years ago. He could not well sanction it, but it is believed here that, once it is announced as an accomplished fact, he will pardon the young pair and receive them into good graces. For if the marriage was performed by a priest of the Greek church it is valid and binding in a religious sense, though civilly invalid until the czar has formally ratified it.

The grand duke is, however, in high favor with his imperial chair, having won this favor by being on the bridge of the battleship Petropavlovsk when she was sunk by a Japanese mine and having escaped by leaping overboard, wounded.

**MISS FLORENCE KELLY**

**May Be New York's New Labor Commissioner.**

Special to the Whig. —New York's next state commissioner of labor may be a woman, as up to the present time Miss Florence Kelly is unquestionably the leading candidate to succeed John McLaughlin, whose removal is imminent on account of his failure to enforce the child labor laws. A number of societies and philanthropic persons have sent letters and petitions to Governor Higgins, urging the appointment of Miss Kelly. She is a daughter of the Pennsylvania Congressman familiarly known as "Big Iron" Kelly, and was labor commissioner of Illinois under the administration of Governor Altgeld. A report has been prepared by the New York Child Labor Committee showing that the employment of child labor was twice as extensive in 1904 as it had been in the year previous.

**ECHOES FROM THE WAR.**

What Japanese Soldiers Think of the Struggle.



TYPE OF JAPANESE INFANTRY

The Japanese soldier, though one of the best educated in the world, is not a prolific letter writer, says the London Tatler. Japanese letters have, however, been picked up by Russians on many battle-fields, and some of these translated make interesting reading.

The Japanese seldom describe scenes of carnage, evidently taking them in the day's work, but the following letter from Sergt. Mavro is worth quoting: "Nine of our brave heroes were to-day surrounded by a whole company of Russians. They took refuge in a house, which the enemy set light to, waiting with bayonets fixed at the entrance for the heroes to emerge. Then, as no sound came, they rushed in while the house was still flaming and found that we all lay on their own bayonets. Such is the spirit of our army."

"At Motienling," writes another Japanese soldier, "one of our company was disarmed and taken prisoner. Through an interpreter he begged the Russians to kill him, declaring his father would die of shame if he heard that his son was a captive. But the Russians refused, saying: 'You will get to mother Russia, and see our czar and other fine things.' But our man was determined to die. At night he struggled with his guard, and wrenching away his bayonet, stabbed him. Next morning he was shot and died boasting that he was not a prisoner."

The Japanese do not complain of their sufferings. "Many of our men have fallen sick from eating dampened rice and from fatigue in the sun," says a letter found after the fighting at Faichang, "but we all feel that this enhances our glory, for victory is the conquest over difficulties, and the smallest our victorious army, the greater the honor."

In Nomination Of Straight Republican Ticket.
