COUNTY COUNCIL SESSION.

The Standing Committee—Communications Read.

The county council resumed its session Wednesday morning. These communications were read:

From A. Campbell, commissioner of highways, regarding the county of Frontenac, qualifying under the act respecting the construction of county roads, towards which the Ontario government will pay one-third of the cost.

From the inspectors of prisons and asylums, asking that steps be taken to erect and equip a county house of refuge, which must be completed by January 1st, 1906.

From the York county council regarding the regulation of speed of automobiles.

From Oso township council stating that Bolton Creek bridge is in a bad state of repair.

From B. H. Newton protesting against county aid to a bridge in Kenbec.

From T. L. Snook, stating that the Portland Road company had no right to abandon a portion of its road, and that the county council is not liable for the road being kept in repair.

From the Eastern Ontario Good Roads' Association, asking the council to appoint two delegates to its convention in Brockville next month.

WARDEN SPROULE.

Sketch of The New Warden of Frontenac.

Thomas Sproule, the newly-elected warden of Frontenac, was born in Kingston township in 1846, within a mile and a half of where he now lives, outside the village of Westbrook. His parents came from Ireland in the thirties. Mr. Sproule has followed agricultural pursuits all his life, and has lived in Kingston township since his birth, with the exception of nine years spent in Erveto, where the township adjoining. He married Eliza Jane Sproule, whose surname was the same as his own.

He has one son, who was elected a township councillor, serving as such for two years. In 1896 and 1897 he was re-elected Kingston township councillor, and served as a member of the A.O.U.W., a Methodist and a conservative.

The new warden has served four years in the county council, and is well posted on all county matters. He has proved himself to be a good debater, and has served the people faithfully. As warden he should render good service to the county.

Royal Military College.

The bill dealing with the Royal Military College, which Sir Frederick Borden will introduce, will abolish the present limitation of the amount paid in salaries to not exceed \$20,000. There is a larger staff than formerly and this limitation would prevent the payment of their stipends.

The bill will also require the board of officers in the military district to examine the examinations for admission to the Royal Military College, instead of merely supervising them. It is proposed in the bill to grant pensions to four of the subordinate military officials of the college, thus placing them on the same footing as the rest of the permanent force.

HAD GOOD TIME

GARLAND CITY SHOWN TO CANADIAN SOLDIERS.

Royal Visitors Were Escorted From Sackets Harbor, Where They Have Been Entertained By 9th Infantry.

The "boys" of the Ninth United States infantry at Sackets Harbor have had as their guests the staff, sergeants and serjeants of the Royal Canadian Field artillery which is stationed at Kingston, Ont. This is said to be the first time a body of the regular Canadian army has ever visited Madison barracks.

The visitors slight ride from Kingston to Cape Vincent, last Friday, in two sleighs and for two days had full sway at the barracks.

Saturday afternoon there was a basketball game between the Ninth five and the Watertown Y.M.C.A. scrub five, which resulted in a score of 34 to 2 in favor of the soldiers. In the evening there was a banquet and reception followed by a smoker and two boxing matches, one of six and the other of four rounds.

Saturday the non-commissioned staff of the Ninth took the visitors for a ride to this city and gave them a supper at the Crowne House. Every one was in good spirits and the best that the house had was freely set forth. The Canadians stayed all night in this city and left for their teams at the Cape and home on the nine o'clock train this morning.

The visitors were: Q.M.S. Instructors Gimblet and McIntyre, Q.M.S. Farrier, Cunningham, O. S. Worth, O. S. Major Carroll, C. S. Worth, O. S. Major Gordon, Sergeants, Summers, Hazleton, Norwell, Peppatt, Fowler, Slater, Gray, McDonald and Alderford.

The reception committee from the Ninth was composed of Sergt-Major Barker, First Sergt. Donovan, Zortman and Hopkins, and Band Sergeants Young. The trip to this city and the resulting feed were arranged by Color Sergeant Blum.

The non-commissioned staff and sergeants of the Ninth infantry will pay the visit before the regiment leaves for the Philippines, whether it has been ordered.

MINING COMPANY LITIGATION.

Serious Charge Alleged In Mining Suit.

On behalf of the New York Canadian Copper company's shareholders, B. W. Folger, becomes the plaintiff against William G. Pollock and W. L. Kimberley of Chicago, in asking for an injunction to restrain the defendants from proceeding against the plaintiff company, of its possessions in the matter of certain mechanics' liens.

One case is cited in which Richard Sandow has a lien against the company and is trying to force it against the property in Thunder Bay, which includes 325 acres of mining lands. Twenty-five thousand is asked for breach of agreement whereby the defendants agreed with the plaintiff to advance large sums of money, including the sums necessary for the work in respect of which this very lien was obtained. For alleged conspiracy in an attempt to wreck the plaintiff company and to obtain control of its properties \$50,000 damages is asked.
