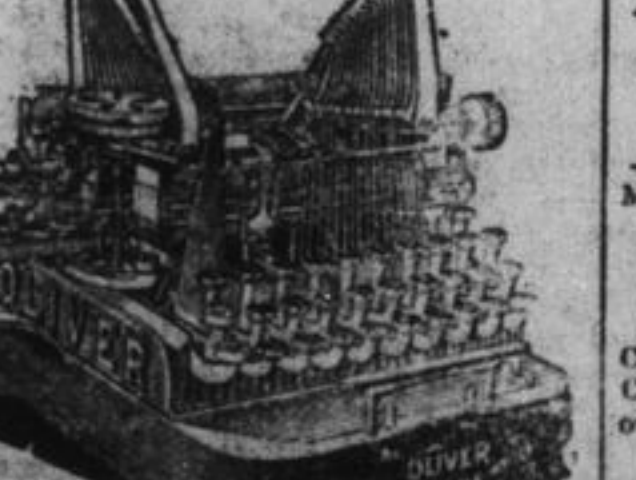

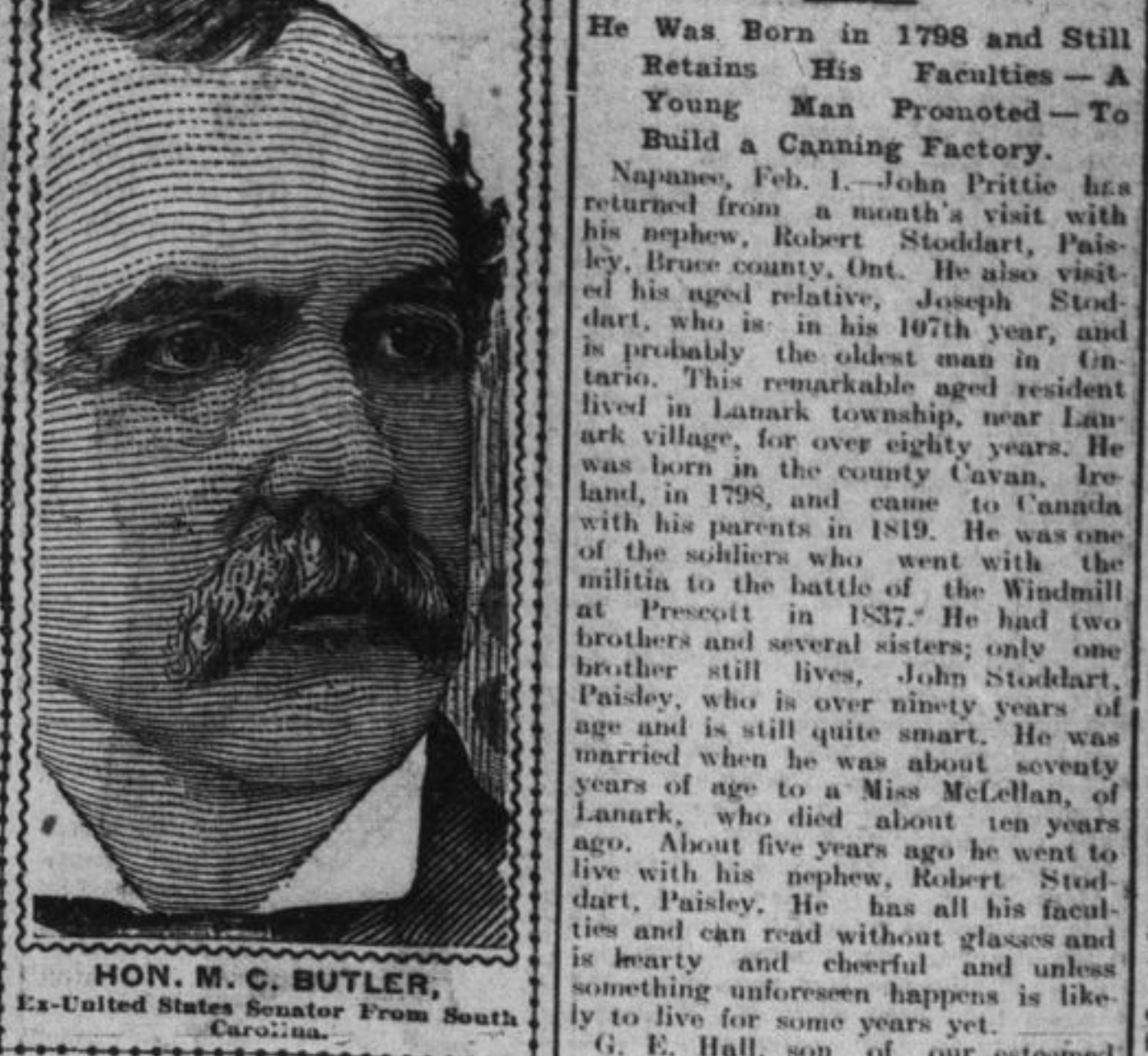

He was born in 1798 and still Retains His Faculties - A Young Man Promoted - To Build a Canning Factory. Napane, Feb. 1. - John Prittie has returned from a month's visit with his nephew, Robert Stoddart, Paisley, Bruce county, Ont. He also visited his aged relative, Joseph Stoddart, who is in his 107th year, and is probably the oldest man in Ontario. This remarkable aged resident lived in Lanark township, near Lanark village, for over eighty years. He was born in the county of Cavan, Ireland, in 1798, and came to Canada with his parents in 1819. He was one of the soldiers who went with the militia to the battle of the Windmill at Prescott in 1837. He had two brothers and several sisters; only one brother still lives, John Stoddart, Paisley, who is over ninety years of age and is quite smart. He was married when he was about sixteen years of age to a Miss McEllan, of Lanark, who died about ten years ago. About five years ago he went to live with his nephew, Robert Stoddart, Paisley. He has all his faculties and can read without glasses and is hearty and cheerful and unless something unusual happens is likely to live for some years yet.

CUSTOMS' INCREASES.

Increase Half a Million For Seven Months.

Ottawa, Feb. 1. - The customs revenue of Canada for the past seven months of the current fiscal year totals \$21,209,967, an increase of \$880,462 over the corresponding months of 1903. The gain in January alone was \$30,106.
