ITS FREEDOM

That Will Be Granted Russian People.

GREAT WORK

The Czar Has Yielded to the Requirements of the Hour—A Representation Chamber to be Created—Yermoloff's Interview With Czar.

London, Feb. 2.—The St. Petersburg

correspondent of the Daily Telegraph

sends the following remarkable state-

ment: "In a few days we shall witness

a political transformation scene

of culture, do not touch the problem of the crying need of the people, lie solely in the nationalization and communism of land.
