THE FAR EAST.

Will Be Without Kuropat-
kin's Services.

HAS RESIGNED

GRIPPENBURG FEELS DIS- HONORED BY RETREAT

Ordered by Kuropatkin, and Asks
For Removal From Man-
churia Command—Much Skir-
mishing in Progress—Rus-
sians Report Success.

St. Petersburg, Feb. 6.—According
to Gen. Kuropatkin's latest reports,
which indicate the wounding of a
third Russian, Gen. Dembowksi, the
operations at Sandipin, and the fight-
ing at Shakhe have been temporarily
suspended. The Russians successfully
repulsed the latest attack of the Jap-
anese, eastward, with heavy loss.
The cold is still intense, there being
twenty-four degrees of frost. There
are indications that the Japanese are
preparing to break their inactivity on
their own account, as soon as the
weather moderates.

Majority Still Out.

Ludl, Russian Polad, Feb. 6.—A
few factories were enabled to resume
work this morning. The majority of
the strikers, however, are still out.
No disturbances are reported to have
occurred.

Women in the Riot.

Warsaw, Russian Poland, Feb. 6.—
Advice from Kalesz says the strike
situation there is serious; there are
conflicting reports, however, as to the
participation of women. Several of
the women have been killed and many
others wounded.

Kuropatkin Resigns.

St. Petersburg, Feb. 6.—Gen. Kuropat-
kin has resigned the command of the
forces in the far east. Gen. Gripenburg
has been removed from the com-
mand. The Russian government has
accepted his resignation, having de-
clared that he had been dishonored by
Kuropatkin's orders to retreat at the
battle of the Hun river. It is not
believed that Kuropatkin will be
resigned to accept of the present
stage of affairs, but there is no ques-
tioning the fact that he is not on the
best terms with his superiors.

Off For St. Petersburg.

Russian Headquarters, Hun Mountain,
Feb. 5. (Delayed in transmission).
Lieut. Gen. Gripenburg left here to-
day for St. Petersburg. The Japanese
are fortifying their east bank and pre-
paring, evidently apprehending a Russian
offensive movement.

All Is Quiet.

Tokio, Feb. 6.—Official announce-
ments made this evening are quiet
in the vicinity of Changting with
the exception that the Russians are
strenuously enforcing. It is thought
that the Russians intend to abandon
all operations in North Eastern
Korea.

Regiment of Amazons.

Victoria, B.C., Feb. 6.—The Japane-
se steamer Shinano brings news of the
formation of an Amazon corps at
Nikols to aid the Russian forces at
the Shakhe. Russian women formed
a regiment, armed like Cossacks,
which has gone to the front. The wo-
men have short hair, and wear mas-
culine attire.

Brief Bulletins.

The statement made in a despatch
from London that Emperor William
considers this an opportune moment
for Great Britain and Germany to
unite in an effort to force in the far
east is treated by the foreign office at
Berlin as being merely a variation of
an old phantasy, quite without any
basis of foundation.

MR. LEE'S YARN

THINK CIVIL LORD SHOULD BE MUZZLED

Says Britain Looks With Anxiety
Towards the North Sea—If
War Should Be Declared Navy
Is Ready To Deal With The
Danger.

Known In Kingston.

Mr. Lee is well-known in Canada,
having been professor of strategy and
tactics at the Kingston Military Col-
lege from 1892 to 1898, when he was
transferred to Washington as military
attache to the British embassy. He
was British military attache to the
United States army during the Span-
ish war and was elected to the British
House of Commons in 1900.

FATAL "HYPOCHOIRIS."

Street Car in Detroit—Runs Into
Children.

Detroit, Feb. 6.—Eight children,
hitting behind, and on the hands,
were struck by a street car at the
corner of Sixth and Abbott
streets, on Saturday. Four of them
were seriously hurt, one fatally, and
the others escaped with minor and
injuries. Marion Donovan, aged
seventeen, died later, and John Dono-
van is in a critical condition. The
others were badly cut and bruised.

Bob Hits A Train.

Battle Creek, Mich., Feb. 6.—While a
party of eight boys were coasting
down Beach street, here on Satur-
day, their hobnob hit into a
rapidly moving Michigan Central
train. George Lundy, aged twelve,
was instantly killed, and Leo Shar-
key, aged ten, had his left leg severed
by a car wheel. The other six lads
were not injured. Five of them fell
or rolled off the whizzing bob. The sixth
uninjured lad was thrown on the pil-
low of the engine when it struck it,
and managed to clutch the flagstick.
He clung to it desperately until the
train was stopped.

Typewriters Under The Ban.

St. Petersburg, Feb. 6.—The police
of the town of Romni, in the pro-
vince of Poltava, have confiscated all
the typewriters, which have been
found in the place, which is in-
habited by 15,000 inhabitants. No rea-
son is assigned for the action, but as
it is taken under the law of "in-
creased defence," equivalent to a
military state, there is no doubt that
typewriters are regarded as
dangerous organs of sedition.

Two Million Co-Operators.

London, Feb. 6.—Some interesting
particulars as to the growth of the
co-operative movement in England in
the past ten years have just been pub-
lished by the board of trade. Official
returns relating to 2,927 societies are
dealt with. They show that the growth
of the distributive and productive so-
cieties of all classes has been con-
tinuous. The present total membership
is 2,985,721, compared with 1,245,966
a decade ago, an increase of 67 per
cent. The total stock and reserve
capital amounts to \$185,316,529 and
during 1904 they did a business
amounting to \$495,036,745.

Well-Known Preacher Dies.

St. John, N.B., Feb. 6.—Rev. John
Desnoyes, M.A., L.L.D., died suddenly
at the general hospital here. He had
suffered from internal trouble and
during the day was taken to the hos-
pital, where an operation for strang-
ulated hernia was performed, as all
indications pointed to that. He re-
fused all but later collapsed and died
half an hour later. It was found af-
ter death that an aneurism of the
aorta, which burst, was the cause of
death.

Is In The Right Man.

New York, Feb. 6.—Johann Hoch
was identified by Mrs. Mary Hen-
dricks, of Chicago, as the man who
married her on January 2nd, 1904, in
Hannover, Ind. Hoch, who is said
to have married her under the name
of Jacob Schmitt, and that after
three weeks he deserted her, and
she had given him all her savings of
\$300.
