GOES TO CROWN

Unrecognized Son of Sir John Wilson Dies After Spending Porty Years as a Recluse, Hiding From His Fellow Men. London, Feb. 17.-Becoming a re luse after the discovery that he was an unrecognized son-George L. A Wilson, once a figure in society, has died intestate and his fortune of \$1,-50,000 goes to the crown. The story of the man's life is re

markable. He was the unrecognized son of Sir John Wilson, once commander of the English forces in Ceyion. Educated at Cambridge, upon the Guards and his commanding figure and social graces made him a favorite in the highest society. On his father's death, young Wilson learned of his left-handed parentage, and the discovery so upset him that he resigned his commission in the Guards and left society forever. That was forty years ago, and since that time Wilson has been a recluse and a

woman-hater. He lived for a time or his estate at Brentwood, seeing no one but an old man servant. The lord chancellor, hearing of his mode of life had been forcibly removed to the Brentwood asylum, but Wilson's solicitor secured his release. Wilson then moved to Folkestone.
