TERROR REIGNS

CONDITIONS AGAIN ASSUMING SERIOUS ASPECT.

Railway Strike Spreading—Whole Caucasus Region Said to be in Revolt—Fighting at Baku and Tiflis Elsewhere.

St. Petersburg, Feb. 22.—The railway strike situation is reported to be growing worse in the south-west and private advisers are said to show the existence of a reign of terror in Tiflis and the Caucasus generally.

Situation At Warsaw.

Warsaw, Feb. 22.—Railroad officials here fear that traffic will soon become disorganized, incoming trains are almost empty, while the outgoing are crowded.

Uncertain At Loda.

Loda, Feb. 22.—The factories here have commenced taking on new hands to replace strikers. The situation is extremely uncertain.

Trouble At Baku.

St. Petersburg, Feb. 22.—Telegrams from Baku report that the disturbances there are increasing, fighting has occurred, that shops have been pillaged and houses burned, and that the inhabitants are panic stricken.

Discontinuance Revolution.

Warsaw, Feb. 22.—The Polish national democratic party has issued a manifesto discontinuance a revolution. There are no arms, says the document, no money and no leaders, and no aid can be expected from other countries.

LOSES HIS MONEY.

Millionaire Platt's Suit Against Negress Dismissed. New York, Feb. 22.—The suit of John H. Platt, the octogenarian millionaire, to compel Hannah Elias, a negress, to return to him \$685,000, which he alleges he gave her during a period extending over twenty-five years, today was dismissed by Justice O'Grorman.

MEETING OF LEGISLATURE.

Will Probably Be Fixed To-Morrow. Toronto, Feb. 22.—Hon. J. J. Poy was the only minister around the parliament buildings, this morning. It is expected that Premier Whitney will arrive to-night, and a meeting of the cabinet will be held to-morrow, at which, in all probability, the date of the meeting of the legislature will be fixed.

SEPARATE SCHOOLS

To Be Established In New Province.

Ottawa, Feb. 22.—A system of separate schools is to be established in the new province of Alberta and Saskatchewan. A declaration to this effect was the principal feature of the speech, yesterday, by the Hon. Sir Wilfrid Laurier when he introduced the bill to confer full governing powers on the people of the territories of Alberta, Athabasca, Saskatchewan and Assiniboia.

STUCK BY TRAIN.

Wife Of Former U. S. Senator Killed. St. Johnsbury, Vt., Feb. 22.—While Jonathan Ross, former United States senator, and former chief justice of the supreme court of Vermont, was driving with his wife yesterday, the sleigh was struck by a train on the St. Johnsbury & Lake Champlain branch of the Boston & Maine railway, and Mrs. Ross was killed. Mr. Ross was severely injured.

AWFUL CRIME

BABY THROWN INTO RED HOT FURNACE.

Furnace Keeper Covered With Revolvers While Crime Was Committed—Threatened With Death if He Told of It.

Rochester, N.Y., Feb. 22.—One of the most shocking crimes in the history of this city was reported to the police last night, G. W. McCaffery, engineer, in charge of an eighty-horse-power boiler in a building on Furnace street, used to heat several business places, told the story. He said that about two o'clock last Tuesday morning, two men and a woman entered the boiler-room and while one man covered him with a brace of revolvers, the other threw a package into the fire pot, on the red hot coals. The woman uttered a shriek as he did so, and one of the men threatened her life also. McCaffery says he heard the scream of a baby as the package struck the fire. The men waited several minutes, and then opened the furnace door again and raised the bundle, about on the coals. Before leaving the men threatened to kill McCaffery if he ever revealed a word of the matter. McCaffery kept silent until it proved on his conscience to such an extent that he could keep quiet no longer.

MORRISBURG INDUSTRY.

New York Capitalist To Establish Work. William J. Allison, who has become wealthy in New York, is about to build a steel and plate works at Morrisburg, Ont. He stands at the head of a strong company, looking for a Canadian market. Mr. Allison owned and operated a large mill at the Galop Rapids, and is having a summer home built thereon. The company asks the people to raise \$80,000 to put in the electric plant to generate power for the works. Thirty thousand dollars goes to the Dominion government for enlarging the inlet at the head of the canal and uniting the same with the government having agreed to do the work and to give the corporation 1,200 horse power at \$2 per horse power. The balance of the \$80,000 is the estimated cost of putting in the plant, and paying for sixteen acres of land. The corporation is to extend free water, light, and taxes, exclusive of school taxes.

Mr. Allison agrees within one year to have erected ready to run steel buildings to cost \$300,000. A forfeit has been posted. The corporation will lay legislation to have the debt consolidated and debentures issued covering a period of sixty years.

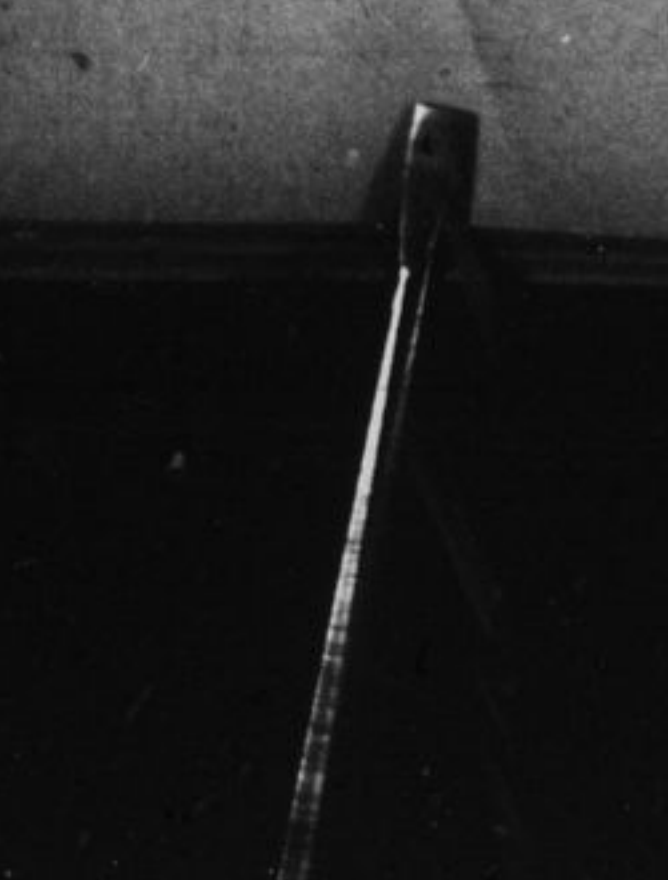
