IS IT CURABLE

DR. DOYEN CLAIMS DISCOVERY OF CANCER GERM. His investigations extend over twenty-five years—Periodical Vaccination His Method—Immunity Will be Conferred by Successive Injections. The most debated question in European medical circles is the theory of cancer advanced by Dr. Doyen, the celebrated French surgeon. An interview, recorded by 'The Lancet' in the March Book Review, is the first authoritative statement of Dr. Doyen's remarkable achievements. He claims to have discovered the specific bacillus of cancer, and to have concentrated a specific serum for its destruction. Whether Dr. Doyen's statements proved sound or not, his statements will command attention. The doctor's claims have been under the close scrutiny of a committee of close French surgeons, and their report has been favorable so far; his investigations extended over twenty-five years, and frequently tried in the most terrible injections, solutions of hydrochloric acid, chloride of zinc, and various other antiseptics, but unsuccessfully. This failure and the results of his studies generally led him, in 1888, to try vaccination. A method somewhat similar to that used in the vaccination against smallpox, a method in which the virus of a fresh peripneumonia lung is introduced at the root of the tail of healthy animals. The patient, whom I experimented had been attacked by cancer for the third or fourth time, that is to say were doomed, so my experiments were at least hopeless. But I did not object to any result, worthy of interest for the fragments of tumors inserted under the skin were absorbed. It was following up this idea of vaccination against recurrences of the disease after operation—in the case of cancer when he showed the possibility of curing people bitten by mad dogs by successive injections of rabid virus, first of all very weak and then increasing in strength, that I started in 1901 to vaccinate against cancer with toxins and vaccines from cultures of micrococci neoformans. The method of vaccination, Dr. Doyen claims, 'bestows immunity slowly, and its effects last for several years. Periodical vaccination may, therefore, answer in the affirmative the question—Can cancer be cured?' 'Immunity to a disease is a particular state of an organism which renders it refractory to that disease. The state of a soldier protected against the blows of an enemy by an impenetrable armor, the state of a man whose natural or acquired immunity against the venom of serpents, or against certain infectious diseases, is a particular state of an organism which renders it refractory to that disease. It is also necessary to prevent the cancer from the soil air in the stable. Milk freezing in order to obtain the best results.
