BISHOP MATHESON.

Bishop Matheson, of Rupert's Land, elected archbishop and metropolitan by the western and northern bishops of the Anglican church, is one of its younger bishops, but one of its most loved and most devoted. Most Rev. Samuel Pritchard Mathe son is descendant of one of the Scotch settlers taken to Red River by Lord Selkirk, 1812-14. Born in Kildonan, Man. kirk, 1812-14. Born in Kildonan, Man., 1852, he was educated at St. Paul's parish school, and St. John's College school, where he was admitted to a foundation scholarship as a theological student. Ordained to the priest-hood by Archbishop Machray, 1870, he had charge of the parishes of Victoria, Rockwood, St. Paul's and North St. John's successively, being all the St. John's successively, being all the time actively engaged in teaching. Prior to election to the bench in 1902, he had been deputy headmaster of th College School since 1878, steward since 1879, bursar since 1887, and he also filled the chair of exegetical the ology in St. John's College.
