TO LIFT AMERICA'S CUP.

Expense Cuts no Figure in Calculations.

London, March 4.—Lord has been received that Sir Thomas Lipton is considering the building of three yachts, each by a different designer and such constructed upon a different plan for the purpose of getting in a challenger to the fastest yacht possible to produce in the United Kingdom to challenge the America cup. He has under consideration a set of drawings from the hand of Linton Hope. This is a racing machine of the most extravagant type. Alfred Mellon and George Lamont, the latter successor to the late George J. L. Watson, will submit designs on more conservative lines. Lipton will make his fourth trial the subject of his life. Expense cuts no figure in his calculations. He wants the cup, and if it is possible for England, Scotland or Scandinavia to win, he will not be satisfied until he has secured it.

SAVAGE KING WILL APPEAR.

Objects to Britain Assuming Control.

Auckland, N.Z., March 4.—The king of the Tonga Islands will appear against Great Britain's attempt to control the islands annexed to New Zealand.
The British, who had since 1899 exercised a virtual protection over the Tonga Islands, assumed control of the legal and financial affairs of the islands, which were still in a feudal condition. It was stated at that time that this had been done with the consent of the chiefs, and that an understanding had been reached that the islands would not be annexed until after the death of the present king.

GREAT TIME

Over The Inauguration of Roosevelt.

MANY PEOPLE THROUGH THE CAPITAL OF THE UNITED STATES.

Fine Military and Civic Parade—Bodyguard of President Consisted of Rough Riders, and "A" Squadron New York.

Washington, D.C., March 4.—The ceremonies which mark the inauguration of New York, President of the United States for the next four years, were performed today with all the dignity and splendor fitting such an occasion.

A half hour earlier in the day, Charles Warren Fairbanks of Indiana, was inducted into the office of vice-president. Fully 100,000 people thronged the open space and streets

to the east from the capitol whereafter receiving the oath from Chief Justice Fuller of the supreme court, President Roosevelt delivered his inaugural address. As the last syllable fell from the president's lips, he stepped from the rostrum, 100,000 voices rose in a prodigious note of applause. The official hour for the commencement of the exercises was about 11 o'clock, at which time the president left the White House for the capitol, accompanied by the congressional committee of arrangements, and escorted by the members of the department of the Potomac, G.A.R., and a detachment of the United States army veterans. Long before this time the streets were filled with what appeared to be the whole of the population of Washington. To the many hundreds of the local population were added many thousands of visitors who came in on excursion trains last night and this morning.

There were 25,000 men in the 100 regulars, marines, midshipmen from Annapolis and cadets from West Point; 15,000 militia representing nearly a score of states; and 12,000 fourteen thousand made up of political organizations, rough riders, college students, cowboys, Indians, etc.

Two o'clock was the hour set for the start of the parade, and at 2 o'clock it started. Prompt to the minute General Chaffee gave the word, there was a booming of cannon and the great column was set in motion.

The parade rode a detachment of the local police followed by the Marine Band. The president, vice-president, several of the governors and other distinguished guests rode in carriages. The personal escort of the president consisted of a body of Rough Riders and Squadron "A" of
