CZAR'S MOVE

**TO PRESERVE HIS THRONE
 COMES TOO LATE.**

Should Have Taken Mirsky's Ad-
 vice Months Ago — Parallel
 With French Revolution
 Drawn—Manifesto Won't Inter-
 fere With Rescript.

Special to the Whig.
 St. Petersburg, March 6.—The his-
 tory of Friday's imperial rescript, as
 it is authoritatively disclosed sheds
 an illuminating light upon the strug-
 gles for ascendancy between the forces
 of reaction and liberalism which are
 raging about the emperor again com-
 pelling him draw a parallel with the
 French Revolution and showing the
 truth of Prince Bismarck's famous re-
 mark that everything which he had
 done to preserve his throne came a
 day too late.

Substantially the decision to permit
 representatives of the people to partic-
 ipate in a consultative capacity in
 consideration of laws had been taken
 by the emperor three months ago on
 the advice of Prince Sviatopolk-Mir-
 sky and had been actually incorporated
 in clause III. of the December man-
 ifesto.

Prince Sviatopolk-Mirsky's heart
 was set upon this scheme, making it a
 condition of his continuance in office,
 but at the last minute yielding to the
 pressure of the reactionaries, led by
 Grand Duke Sergius and M. Pobedon-
 ostoff, procurator of the holy synod,
 it was stricken out. Prince Sviatopolk-
 Mirsky stepped down.

Had Emperor Nicholas then clung
 to his original resolution many pain-
 ful events since the first of the year,
 including the assassination of his un-
 cle, might have been avoided.

The manifesto was signed and issued
 after midnight on Thursday with-
 out the knowledge of or after consulta-
 tion with any of the ministers, who
 were thunder-struck.

But upon their arrival at Tsarsko-
 Selo, on Friday afternoon the minis-
 ters were relieved when the emperor
 informed them that the manifesto
 would not interfere with the rescript
 under consideration which he had re-
 solved to sign, explaining the con-
 nection between the two.

It is a fact, however, that the min-
 isters were so startled by the rescript
 whose influence might intervene here
 it could appear in the regular morn-
 ing edition of the Official Messenger,
 of Saturday, that it was made public
 by instantly upon their return to St.
 Petersburg, and at the same time the
 ministers ordered its publication in a
 special edition of the Messenger.

The disorders which were predicted
 here and at Moscow for Saturday and
 Sunday did not occur, although the
 strike situation here appears distinct-
 ly more threatening.

GOES TO TOP

**A KINGSTONIAN GETS AN
 ADVANCE.**

Mr. McCammon Becomes Head of
 the Western Union Operating
 Department at New York—
 Quite a Feather.

T. A. McCammon, chief operator of
 the Western Union Telegraph com-
 pany, New York, who has been pro-
 moted in fact, although not in title,
 to the head of the operating depart-
 ment, vice A. F. Sink, resigned, as
 mentioned briefly in our issue of Feb-
 ruary 16th, says the New York Tele-
 graph Age, advances to that respon-
 sible position a man of excellent ca-
 pacity for the numerous and exacting
 duties he will be called upon to meet.

Like many other strong men in the
 service, Mr. McCammon is a Cana-
 dian, having been born at Kingston,
 Ont., December 27th, 1859. He began
 his telegraphic career at his native
 place, in 1875, in the employ of the
 Old Dominion Telegraph company,
 subsequently going to Toronto and
 London, Ont. Coming to the United
 States, and pushing west, he found
 employment in Colorado as a train
 despatcher, in 1880, and in 1881, at
 South Park railroad. Thence he went
 to San Francisco, and with varied
 fortune afterwards found his way
 eastward again to Salt Lake City
 and to Omaha, at which latter point
 he became night chief operator for
 the Western Union Telegraph com-
 pany. Here he made a fine record,
 which found recognition by his being
 transferred in 1892 to Denver, Colo.,
 to fill the position of chief operator.

At that busy point he remained ten
 years, gaining much valuable experi-
 ence and broadening into a man of
 many all-round qualities. When E. B.
 Saylor, chief operator of the Philadel-
 phia office, was superior in merit at
 Pittsburgh, resigned, Mr. McCammon
 was brought east to fill his place.
 This was in June, 1902. This post he
 held for nearly a year, until May,
 1903, when he was promoted to be
 chief operator, a position then newly
 created, in the New York office. His
 further advancement, now to the head
 of the operating department, al-
 though still retaining the title of chief
 operator, comes as a natural se-
 quence, for Mr. McCammon possesses
 the knowledge, the ability, the initiative
 genius and tact which should guide him
 successfully in administering the affairs
 of his important office.

PRODUCES LIFE CHEMICALLY

**Prof. Loeb Announces a Startling
 Experiment.**
 Berkeley, Cal., March 6.—As a result
 of his latest experiments, Dr. Jacques
 Loeb, of the University of California,
 was able to announce that it was
 possible to stimulate the process of sex-
 ual fertilization by artificial means in
 the eggs of the sea urchin, one of the
 lowest forms of animal life, which
 means in plain English that Dr. Loeb
 has discovered the secret of producing
 a living organism by other than
 natural means.

If he has not deceived himself the ex-
 periment demonstrates that it is only
 a question of steps by step from the
 lower to the higher forms of life, and
 one which will culminate with man. It
 is one of the most startling theories ever
 advanced by any scientist in the world,
 and while Dr. Loeb as a physiologist
 enjoys the respect of the scientific
 world, the most learned professors in
 America and England are unwilling to
 accept his hypothesis. Three years ago
 they rejected his first announcement
 that he was well on the way to learn
 the secret of life, the discovery of
 which he has just made public.

Another discovery of Dr. Loeb's and
 which electrified the scientific world in
 December, 1901, was that he had found
 means to direct, rather than retard,
 death by chemical reaction. This was
 accepted as a demonstrable fact by no
 less an authority than Edwin Grant
 Conklin, professor of biology in the
 University of Philadelphia, and noted
 for his conservative views, but Dr.
 Loeb did not pursue his experiments
 as to how death could be prevented,
 but changed in three years of study
 and labor as to how life could be pro-
 duced.

LORD'S DAY ACT

**Infringed By Joseph Nadon,
 Ontario Street.**
 Joseph Nadon, proprietor of an On-
 tario street restaurant, was charged
 before Police Magistrate Farrell,
 this morning, with infringement of the
 Lord's Day act. The offence was that
 of selling candy to three boys, named
 Cochrane, on Sunday afternoon. The
 three boys were in court, but their
 evidence was not necessary, as an at-
 tempt was made to deny the charge.
 D. A. Givens appeared for the de-
 fendant. He argued that the offence
 was not of a serious nature, and also
 questioned the validity of the law on
 account of a restaurant license. His worship,
 in passing sentence, said that he con-
 sidered that, although the defendant's
 case had been well presented, the of-
 fence was of a serious nature, as the
 children were probably spending money
 which had been given them for other
 purposes. The practice of selling candy
 to children, on Sunday, must be
 stopped, and the law must be re-
 spected. The defendant's past record
 was argued against him. He was fined
 \$10 and costs.

The Lights Went Out

 in darkness. A short circuit outside
 flung a belt off one of the machines,
 and to fix it all the machinery had to
 be stopped.
