BUSINESS DONE

AT SESSIONS OF KINGSTON PRESBYTERY.

Expression on the North-West School Question—To Celebrate Jubilee of Rev. Mr. Chambers at Pictou on May 30th.

The Kingston presidency continued its meeting on Tuesday afternoon and evening. Additional members present were Revs. Messrs. McArthur, Burns, Hay, McNeil, McPherson, Cumberland and Rev. Fowler.

Dr. McMillan reported on the session of the presidency. The congregations receiving aid were generally recommended to receive the same amount as previous years, with the grant of \$250 to the recently added one of Stirling, Ont.

Rev. J. D. Boyd was granted leave of absence for three months in the hope that his health may be restored during that time. Rev. James McIlroy applied for leave to retire from the active duties of the ministry in consequence of failing health. The usual steps are to be taken.

It is proposed that the jubilee of Rev. Mr. Chambers, many years celebrated on the 25th of May, be celebrated at Pictou, on the 30th of May, at Messrs. Campbell, Gray and W. Guthrie, to be associated with the session of St. Andrew's, Pictou, to make arrangements for the jubilee. A committee to attend officials and Rev. Mr. McLaren reported from the committee on Sabbath schools.

The statistical returns were not complete, but the schools appear to be carrying on their work with commendable diligence.

Rev. A. Laird reported from the committee for the examination of students. Forty-four students of the Christian work for the vacation months, a number of these were examined and approved as new applicants. Nine about completing their studies, are applying to be taken on trial for leave.

Rev. Mr. McConnell reported on the French evangelization as aided by the congregation of presbytery. This was shown to be small in comparison with a number of other presbyteries.

Rev. F. D'avey reported from the committee on evangelization. No special services had been conducted during the year. The committee, except those at Zion church by Rev. Mr. Fowler.

The clerk called attention to the duty of congregations outside the presidency to aid in meeting the expense of accommodating delegates attending the meeting of the general assembly. It was agreed that a special committee be appointed to raise the sum of \$2000 per family from these congregations for this purpose.

Rev. Mr. McArthur reported from the committee on Y.P.S.C.E. from an investigation of the school and Christian objects. Application is to be made to the general assembly to receive Rev. Mr. Gordon into the Canadian presbytery.

Rev. Mr. Binnie reported on home missions. All the churches, except one, are receiving supply of service during the winter. The visitation of the sick is highly desirable, and is productive of much good. It was agreed to meet with the city-four stations, and the general assembly of 1903. One hundred and thirty-five members were added during the year. The support given is generous, and good work has been done in all the fields. It was agreed that the service at Livingston avenue be discontinued, and that Knox church be supplied in connection with Zion church.

The report of the committee relating to the North-West Territories was submitted, and was fully discussed. After some amendments had been proposed, the following resolution was agreed to, viz: The Presbytery of Kingston regards with deep concern and disapproval the educational clauses in the bill now before the Dominion Parliament, erecting universities in the North-West, and earnestly requests the bill may be so modified before its passage that the chief reading as to leave the new provinces entirely free to deal with the matter of education in the future, as to them may seem just and expedient.

Rev. H. Gracey presented a full and satisfactory report on church life and work which was approved. Rev. Mr. Burns reported on the condition of the Presbyterian Union and condition of the Presbyterian Union and condition of the Presbyterian Union.

The salary has been \$800 and perquisites, with apartments in buildings included.

AND WANTS THE ONTARIO LAW CHANGED.

So That Separate Schools Will be Abolished—Or Else the Roman Catholic Minority Given Less Powers.

Callan, was unanimously passed protesting against the legislation that would establish a separate school system in the two western provinces of Alberta and Saskatchewan, and demanding that the new provinces should be absolutely to themselves, both in organizing and carrying into effect their educational system; and also demanding that the B.N.A. act as shall abolish separate schools in the province of Ontario, or place the Roman Catholic minority in this province simply on an equal footing, as respects to educational advantages, with the Protestants of Quebec.
