What is Going On in the Business World—The Markets.

The total shipment of South Africa is date is 10,425,000. The Canadian General Electric Company report, profits of \$202,519 for the year 1904, against \$512,519 for 1903.

WILL VISIT QUEEN'S

THIS IS THE URPOSE OF LORD STRATHCONA.

He Visited Ottawa to See the Governor-General—He Would Not Talk on Any Controversial Matters.



LORD STRATHCONA.

Ottawa, March 21.—"I shall in all probability visit Queen's University, when his excellency receives the honorary degree of LL.D.," said Lord Strathcona, to a Whig representative, at two o'clock this afternoon.

His lordship arrived in Ottawa on his special car, via C. P. R., and was escorted with first, his excellency the governor-general, and then with the premier for about an hour.

"I have nothing to say on the school question," was the answer when he was questioned. "It is about a year and a half since I visited Ottawa. You know I am a commissioner now, and not in politics. Things are looking fine in Canada, are they not? I arrived here about one o'clock and an returning to Montreal this afternoon." His lordship is looking well, and appears to be in good health.

JUDGE ENGINEERED PLOT

Way a Kentucky Feud Operates Shown.

Lexington, Ky., March 24.—A plot to shoot down five men in the Breckinridge county courthouse during one of the feud murder trials there, was brought out at the hearing of a motion to admit to bail Sheriff Edward Callahan and the Hargies, one of whom is a judge and another a state senator.

The story was told by Anderson White on the witness stand. White said that Judge James Hargis had given the witness a pistol, telling him to go to the courthouse, where the trial of Thomas Cockrill for killing Benjamin Hargis was in progress, and be ready, if any trouble started, to shoot Dr. Cox, James Cockrill, Mark Cockrill, Attorney Vaughan and another. This other, witness remembered, was J. B. Marcum.

"Kill all of these, or any one of them," is what White said Hargis told him. White said he declined to do this and returned the pistol.

Anderson White is a brother of Thomas White, who is now serving a life term for the killing of J. B. Marcum.

"Bill" Smith followed White. He said that before the killing of Cockrill, Judge James Hargis declared to witness: "Jim Cockrill has got to be killed, if he is not, Cockrill will kill Callahan in me, or both of us."

Witness declared that he participated in the plot. Hargis threatened, witness said, to get George Smith or Curtis Jett to do the killing. Witness said that he was in Hargis' store the day after Cockrill was killed. Callahan and Judge Hargis were there, and when the news came from Lexington that Cockrill had died in a hospital, Hargis and Callahan smiled at each other.

DIAMONDS IN CANADA.

Another Kimberley North of the Great Lakes.

Ottawa, March 21.—"There is likely to be another Kimberley north of the great lakes," said Dr. Ami, chief geologist of the Geological Survey. "All the surveying parties and explorations in the northern part of Ontario should be on the lookout for everything that will show where diamonds are to be found in places." Dr. Ami has just returned from a trip to the United States.

While in New York," said he, "I consulted Prof. G. F. Kunz, geologist of the United States Geological Survey. Prof. Kunz is enthusiastic about the prospects of diamonds found in the states of Wisconsin, Illinois and Michigan, and the University of Wisconsin. Two more specimens have been found lately. The finding of these two specimens in drift intensifies the interest in the matter, and should show further that diamonds exist in places in Canadian territory north of these states."

STEAMBOAT INSPECTION.

Have Canadian Rules to Correspond With American.

Ottawa, March 21.—A deputation from the Marine Association saw Hon. Mr. Frontenac, minister of marine, yesterday, and asked that rules with regard to the inspection of Canadian steamboats on the great lakes be made to correspond with the American rules, particularly as respects the size and carrying capacity of life preservers. It was also asked that life preservers' dues be abolished and a board substituted by which it would be agreed to pay for the sick without creating a special fund. The "rules of the road" of the Canadian and United States waters are now made similar. The minister promised to consider the whole matter thoroughly.

Man Lost Part of Four Fingers To-Day.

An unfortunate accident occurred at Wornouth & Co's piano factory shortly after nine o'clock, this morning, by which William Aseltine, an employee, lost parts of the four fingers of his left hand. The injured man was operating a lathe, with which he was planning some broad boards. In changing the position of the guard, and when feeding the machine he left his hand on the lathe, and the sharp knives, and badly mutilated. The top of the first finger was cut off, and the other three fingers badly cut, right down to the middle joint. W. H. Wornouth, the man immediately conveyed to Dr. Mundell's surgery, whence he was taken to the General Hospital. It was found necessary to amputate three fingers of his left hand at the middle joint, and the operation was successfully performed this morning. The injured employee has been with the company several years, and his accident is deeply regretted by his many friends.

IN SWADDLING CLOTHES.

Peers' Eldest Sons Still in Nursery.

London, March 21.—The little Lord Broughley, the Marquis of Exeter's heir, who only a few weeks old, is the only one of quite a large number of eldest sons of peers still in the nursery. The Marquis of Worcester, the eldest son of the Duke of Bedford, will be five in April; the Marquis of Garmarthen, the heir to the Dukedom of Leeds, is four this year, and Viscount Mandeville, eldest son of the Duke of Manchester, has recently celebrated his second birthday. Earl Beauchamp's eldest son, Viscount Elmley, is just eighteen months; the Earl of Tyrone, the eldest son of the Marquis of Waterford, is four; the Earl of Bevis, the heir to the Marquis of Headfort, will be three years old on May day; Viscount Dunwich, eldest son of the Earl of Strathmore, will celebrate his second birthday on April 1st, and Viscount Sefton, the eldest son of the under secretary of state for war, will be three in November next.

WILL NOT ARBITRATE.

This is the Declaration of Castro.

Washington, March 21.—Minister Rosen called the state department, to-day, from Caracas, that President Castro has flatly refused to arbitrate the pending issues between Venezuela and the United States.

NEWS OF THE WORLD

OCCURRENCES RECOUNTED IN BRIEF FORM.

Despatches and Callings Telling of Events Transpiring in All Parts of The Earth.

J. B. Hill, the St. Thomas merchant, awaiting sentence for fraud, is set on \$10,000 bail. Miss Lillian Mulvaney, Toronto, was struck by a street car on her way to the theatre, and will probably die.

The new Allan turbine liner Victoria sailed from Liverpool for Halifax and St. John, with 1,500 passengers. A negro vendoo doctor has been arrested in Cuba, charged with the murder of a twenty-two months old baby.

Clarence Eddy, Chicago, an organist of international repute, asks for absolute divorce on the ground of desertion.

Paul Pons, the great French wrestler, ex-champion of the world, died this week in Berlin. He was forty-one years old.

Hamilton's civic overdraft is \$90,000, and the city will apply for authority to issue debentures for that amount.

Kelly, who is aged thirty-seven, is the oldest member of the Australian cricket team which will visit England this summer.

The early fulfilment of promises in the car's receipt will be received, and delegations will be received, and grievances discussed.

The subscription list for the movement of Victoria College has been headed by Charles D. Massey, for \$100,000, and E. R. Wood for \$30,000. Olive Clegg, a young girl in Connor's tailor shop, Hamilton, had her hair caught when adjusting a belt, and her scalp torn off. She will probably die.

President Roosevelt has tendered the office of assistant secretary of the navy to Truman H. Newberry, of Detroit, Mich., and the proffer has been accepted.

Lord Hawke, the well-known captain of the Yorkshire County Cricket club, is expected to arrive in Toronto about April 20th, on his way home from India, where he has been on a shooting expedition.

At a double hanging at Pittsburgh, Pa., the noose broke when the trap under the second man was sprung. He fell and was badly hurt, but was again put on the scaffold, and this time he was strangled.

It is not probable Pittsburgh will be included in the International hockey league next year. The distance between Pennsylvania and upper Michigan is too great. Duluth is spoken of as the next town to join the league.

The last level of the Rochester, the Gardiner yacht club, which the yacht club syndicate is having built at Charlotte for the defence of the Canada's cup, was run Saturday afternoon on the Sorek's foundry.

Reports from Toronto are to the effect that Lou Dillon is wintering grandly. The two-minute mara has now been at San Jose, in charge of Budd Deble, for about six weeks, having been shipped from Memphis early in December.

Traffic on the G. T. R. is reported to be much heavier than it was last year at this time. Over the entire system there is a steady movement of both passenger and freight and the outlook for the coming season is exceptionally bright.

The schedule of games for the 1905 season in the New York State baseball league, was arranged at the meeting here. The playing season will open May 16th, with Syracuse at Albany, Utica at Troy, Binghamton at Jamestown and Scranton at Utica.

On dit that Hon. George W. Ross will assume the leadership of the opposition in the legislature for the year at this end and that shortly thereafter, he will be elected to the senate and enter the Laurier cabinet without portfolio.

Charley Mitchell is willing to fight Jim Corbett to a finish with bare knuckles and says that he "can get into condition in five weeks for such a mill. There is no state in the union that would tolerate a bare knuckle prizefight.

Sam Boyle, a prominent member of the Montreal A.A.A., who has done great work on the field for his association, has addressed a remarkable letter to his fellow-members, condemning the present methods of amateur sport, which allow ill-conceived professionalisms and condone many offenses on a field and in order that a game may be won.

After a series of battles and feverish hand-to-hand encounters, covering twenty-four hours, and a wide expanse of territory, Frank Popilikus alias Knicker, leader of the murderous banditti gang, that killed Fritz Krenner in a Chicago saloon, is under arrest. The capture of the gang is one of the most thrilling pieces of police work in the records of the Chicago department.

The trial races for the honor of challenging for the Canada's cup against the Rochester club's defender, to be held in Toronto, will have, besides the Hamiltons, Works and Nicholls yachts, the Beaver and Invader as contestants. These last two will not of course race for the cup in the event of their winning, but they are good trial horses and are rated that \$1,200 prize hung out for the trial races.

Exercise Common Sense.

Complaints have been made at the city engineer's office, about sidewalks being flooded. Those in really bad condition have been drained by the cutting of a water-table. But a day or two afterwards complaints from the same places came in, and on investigation shows that the residents have shovelled ice and slush into the trench, filling it up. Such action is decidedly to be condemned. Common sense should be exercised and water tables kept clear.
