AN EDITOR IS DEAD.

HE WAS A POPULAR OTTAWA WRITER.

Remains to be Sent to His Old Home at Barrie for Interment—Some of the New Concerns Incorporated.

Special to the Whig. Ottawa, March 25.—William Wyld, barrister, of Wyld, Oser and Ewart, died this morning, aged fifty-one, after a lingering illness.

He was born in Dundas, Ont., and was one of the best lawyers practicing here.

The death occurred at the Water Street Hospital, at an early hour this morning. Mr. Wyld was a member of the Citizen editorial staff for the past seven years, and one of the brightest and most popular writers among Ottawa's newspaper men.

A week ago he was taken ill with typhoid fever and was removed to the hospital, on Monday last, where he gradually sank until the end came this morning, but faint hopes of recovery at any time being entertained, the disease having taken an unusually malignant form.

He was a member of the Canadian Press Association, for interment at his home in Barrie.

DEATH OF THOMAS RAE.

One of Pittsburg's Oldest and Most Respected Residents.

Pittsburg has lost two of its oldest and most respected residents in the persons of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Rae, who passed away on their farm near Buffalo, within a month of each other.

Mr. Rae died on February 17th, and Mrs. Rae on Sunday, March 19th. Mr. Rae, after a long period of decline, passed to rest some ninety-four years and eight months.

The late Mr. Rae was born in the town of Lorne, county Antrim, Ireland, in 1839. In 1854, he came to Canada, settling in Kingston.

He was a mason, and worked with the late Hon. Alexander Mackenzie in the walls of Fort Henry. He served with the 5th Regiment of Foot Guards, and was in the rebellion of 1837, under Capt. Bennett, the commander being Col. Bouey.

Mr. Rae moved to Pittsburg in 1859, and worked on the farm of the late Mr. J. H. Sutherland, who was married in Kingston.

Surviving are five sons and three daughters: William and D. A., in New York; Robert, in Ontario; George, in Ontario; and James, in Ontario.

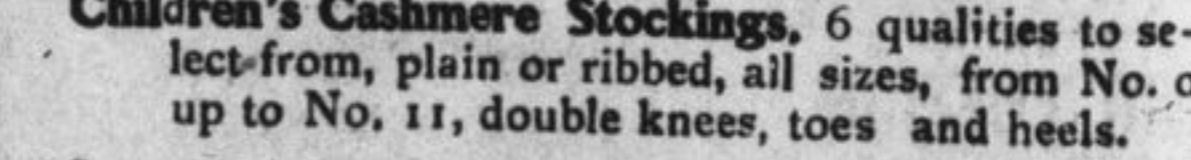
