SALVATION ARMY BEGINS ITS JUBILEE IN NEW YORK TO-DAY.

Will Continue Four Days—First Convert in States Was "Ash-Barrel Jimmy"—Philanthropic and Social Side of Work.

Special to the Whig. New York, March 25.—To-day there was begun in this city a great jubilee celebration of the twenty-fifth anniversary of the establishment of the Salvation Army in America. The affair will continue four days and promises to be notable in the annals of the world-wide organization. A quarter of a century ago the number of Salvation Army members in America was eight. In striking contrast, there are now gathered here to take part in the jubilee some five hundred officers representing every state and territory of the nation and many of the Canadian provinces. These officers, in addition to the local contingent, will conduct a series of jubilee meetings during the next few days in some of the largest meeting places of the metropolis as well as in the headquarters situated in Fourteenth street.

The first country, outside of England, to be affected by the work of the Salvation Army was America. As far back as 1872, when it was in its embryonic condition, and was then known only as "The Christian Mission," one of its converts, "Brother Jerry" found his way to Cleveland, and there, to use General Booth's expression in answering his letters, "raised the banner of the mission."

It was impossible at that early date to send reinforcements, and hence the work fell through with the departure of Jerry. In 1879 a second start was made by a family named Shirley. This time it was in Philadelphia, in an old factory. The urgent appeal for help sent to General Booth met with an immediate response, and in February, 1880, Commissioner George Scott Halton, with a band of seven, landed in New York city. Opposition, ridicule, persecution and even imprisonment were met in those days. Some of those things, however, served to dampen the ardor or quench the zeal of the little band of workers, and ere long it was apparent that the Salvation Army had come to America to stay.

The first convert of the army in America was "Ash Barrel Jimmy." A notable character he was, a drunkard, a general nuisance. He got his name from the circumstances of his rather strenuous conversion. "Jimmy" was accustomed to search in the refuse of the ash barrels and garbage cans for food. One cold night, however, he lost his balance and fell in a barrel head first. He was too drunk to help himself, and as the hour of the night, a passing policeman saw the feet sticking out and rescued him. "Jimmy" was frozen so fast to the barrel, the policeman seized him by the feet and dragged him, barrel and all, from the street into a room. Then when he was sufficiently thawed out, they sent him, by way of a joke, to the Salvation Army. From that time Jimmy was a changed man. He was converted in the army, meetings, and became a useful and earnest member of the army, rising to the rank of captain and remaining in the ranks until he died, a few years later.

The army confined itself for years almost entirely to purely spiritual operations. But with the arrival of the late leaders, Commander and Mrs. Booth-Tucker, in 1896, the latter of whom was killed in a railway wreck at Dean Lake, Mo., on October 25th, 1903, the social or philanthropic side of the movement was brought to the front, and institutional work of a most active form was begun. Farm colonies, with the object of assisting the poor, but worthy and industrious married men to obtain a home, were established in Ohio, Colorado and California. The difficulties met with in their establishment were overwhelming and seemingly endless, yet to-day these colonies, in excellent condition, exist as proof positive, that the time is not visionary, but a practical one, and capable of almost unlimited extension and improvement.

Hotels for workmen—and the same for women—have been opened, where clean, comfortable accommodations can be secured for a merely nominal sum. Rescued and children's homes, and many other institutions for helping the poor and needy, are also successfully conducted by the army.

At the present time the standing of the Salvation Army in America, roughly estimated, is as follows: Officers and employees, 35,000; outposts, 736; institutions for poor and needy, 143; farm colonies, 3; expended annually in poor relief, \$800,000.

During the last twenty-five years the mighty organization has come to be recognized by all classes alike, not only in America, but in almost every part of the globe, as among the greatest agencies in existence for the redemption and reformation of criminals of all grades, and for the practical, permanent aiding, without pauperizing, of the poor and unfortunate.

RISE IN SECURITIES

Resulted in the Usual Futile Speculations.

New York, March 25.—The long rise in the price of securities and the maintenance of the high level that has been reached here resulted in the usual futile but interesting guesses as to the winners by the upward movement. Investment holders and some small speculators, of course, have made great gains by the advance in stocks, but Wall street has time only just now to gossip about the operations of the larger lights of finance. According to current talk in the street, William Rockefeller, in the largest of the winners in the speculation of the past few months. About fifteen months ago, when Union Pacific was selling for about \$70, Mr. Rockefeller is known to have purchased at least 100,000 shares of this stock. Mr. Rockefeller has disposed of little or no part of these holdings, and meanwhile the price has advanced 50 points in value. In addition to his holdings in Union Pacific, Mr. Rockefeller is known to have bought large blocks of other securities that are steadily on the advance. His winnings in the present bull market, are estimated conservatively at \$15,000,000. Charles M. Schwab, former head of the steel trust, who figured prominently in the troubles that attended this combine last year, is said to have made \$2,000,000 in the last twelve months. It is known that Mr. Schwab purchased heavily of United States steel while E. H. Harriman is said to have made \$600,000 in incidental dealings in Union Pacific. The individual fortunes that have been made or are being made, while brokers have grown rich on commissions alone. Fortunately, or unfortunately, there has been no great public speculation. It is the rich men, principally, who have profited by the advance in securities, and professional Wall street expects them to prevent the usual crash that follows a protracted rise.

Before she was married Lady Haldon was well known upon the stage, and took leading parts in the Theatre Lane dramas.

She made farewell to the stage about eleven years ago, but her old love for the footlights has revived, and she has decided to go back to the stage.
