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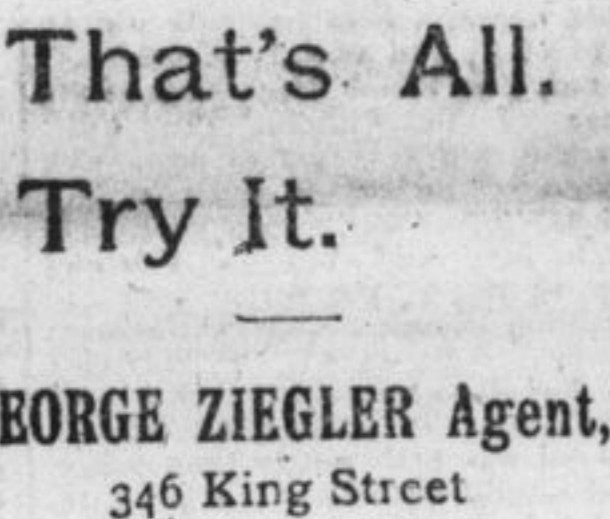

BRIEF NEWS

From Russian Armies in
The Far East.

LINES MAY BE CUT
UNCONFIRMED THAT NOGI
HAS REACHED KIRIN.

Gen. Sukhominoff Made Minister
of War—United States and
France Working for Peace—
Baltic Fleet May be Near
Chagos Islands.

Is Nogi in Kirin?
Paris, March 29.—A dispatch from
St. Petersburg, to the Echo de Paris,
says there is a rumor there, that
Gen. Nogi has reached Kirin. A dis-
patch to the Journal from St. Peters-
burg, says it is officially announced
that Gen. Sukhominoff has been ap-
pointed minister of war.

Still Hope For Peace.
London, March 29.—A news agency
from St. Petersburg, says that Rus-
sia has outlined the conditions under
which she is prepared to negotiate for
peace. It is stated, with every em-
phasis of authority that, thanks to
the good offices of the United States
and France, the question of peace has
assumed practical shape.

Thousands in Tokio.
Tokyo, March 29.—Twenty thousand
Russian prisoners, captured in the
battle of Mukden, have already ar-
rived in Japan. A revised official
estimate of the Japanese casualties in
the battles of Mukden and the Pass
place the number at 77,000. Gen.
Mayeda, who was wounded at Mukden,
is dead.

AUSTRALASIAN BUTTER
J. A. Ruddick on Recent Ship-
ments.
Ottawa, March 29.—J. A. Ruddick,
Honorary Director of the Dominion
Board of Agriculture, in a report before
the House of Commons agriculture com-
mittee, stated that about one thousand
boxes of New Zealand and Aus-
tralian butter, totaling fifty-six
pounds each, were received in Mont-
real this winter and sold at thirty
cents a pound. There would be no fur-
ther shipments, however, as the price
had since fallen. The quality of this
butter he investigated and found that
it compared very favorably with our
own.

TO WRITE BOOK ON HAREMS.
French Novelist Recalled From
Constantinople.
Paris, March 29.—Pierre Loti, who
has spent some time in Constantinople
as commander of the Vautour, a sta-
tionary French vessel in the Bosphorus,
has been recalled and will soon
depart.

Are Making Plans.
Windsor, Ont., March 29.—A force
of Michigan Central engineers are
busy in the Windsor yards. They de-
cline to enlighten anyone as to the
nature of their work, but a spy is
also taking soundings in the river, it
is believed that they are locating the
best place at which to begin the tun-
nel under the Detroit river.

\$25. The money was deposited with
Salles.

of anthropology my head, hair, skull,
and brain, and more if thought neces-
sary." He also added a donation of
50,000 francs.

Middletown, N.Y., March 29.—As a
reward for her faithful services in the
capacity of nurse, Mrs. Alida H. Gray,
employed in the state hospital here,
will receive \$40,000 from the estate of
a patient.

LARD HELPED FLAMES

Which Broke Out in Pork
Factory.
Winnipeg, March 29.—The frame an-
nex of the J. V. Griffin company's
pork-packing establishment, on the
river bank was burned. A stock of lard
consisting of thousands of rolls, was
among the material burned, and this
added lury to the flames. The struc-
ture was reeking with fat, which, in
a heated and blazing state, ran from
the building, and surrounded the
doomed premises with a sea of sput-
tering flames. The flames were stem-
med before they reached the magnifi-
cent main plant to the east of the
annex. The loss will be \$25,000 or
\$30,000; partly covered by insurance.

HUSBAND AND WIFE DEAD.

A Terrible Accident Occurred in
Winnipeg.

Winnipeg, March 29.—Mrs. John
Thompson was working with gasoline
or benzine, yesterday afternoon, when,
in some way, the oil exploded, set-
ting fire to her clothing and the room.
M. Thompson, in the employ of the
C.P.R., on the night staff, was asleep
upstairs at the time and was suffocated
by the smoke. He was evidently
going to the front door when he sec-
cumbled, his body being discovered by
the firemen just inside the door. Mrs.
Thompson was burned severely in all
parts of her body and died shortly
after 11 p.m.

To Open A Branch.

Montreal, March 29.—The Eastern
Township bank has decided to open
a branch in Vancouver and has secured
premises for that purpose. A five
years' lease of the property has been
secured and plans for the necessary
alterations of the building now on the
property are being prepared. It is ex-

JUDGE DISMISSES ACTION.

Of Baie Des Chaleurs Railway
Company.

Montreal, March 29.—Justice Bar-
bridge has rendered judgment in the
exchequer court, dismissing the applica-
tion of the directors of the Baie des
Chaleurs railway company, for confirma-
tion of the scheme of arrangements
between the railway company and its
creditors. The scheme provided for a
new issue of debentures to be ex-
changed for the bonds, privileges, and
liens, now existing upon the railway,
and for the cancellation of the claims
of the creditors, who were to be paid
by an issue of preferred stock. This
was contested by the Atlantic and
Lake Superior railway company,
which claims to be the owner of the
railway, and by several creditors and
shareholders.

DIED OF EXPOSURE.

of the British steamer Mars have died
of exposure. The rest of the men re-
