A FORCIBLE SPEECH.

LONEY'S JUDGE TALKS OF ROUGH PLAY.

Thinks Customary Penalties of the Game Are Wholly Inadequate, and Violent Men Should Be Put Out.

Ottawa, April 1.—In opening the spring assizes Justice Teetzel made references to roughness in sports, in addressing the grand jury he said that there was an important matter which he wished to bring to their notice regarding roughness in lacrosse, football and particularly hockey. The matter, he was brought prominently before him, as he had just presided at the trial in Cornwall of young Loney, who was arraigned for causing the death being placed in a game at Maxville. The excitement of a game, his lordship said, was too frequently allowed to give into passions, which resulted in players being injured, and in some instances killed. It would be a pity if such rough play should result in the death being placed in the same class as cock and bull fights, which the law does not allow. His lordship regretted that it was necessary in Canada to make such remarks, and for the sake of Canada and the sports which are most deserving in building up fine physical manhood, he hoped that the law might change. The spectators, he said, were much to blame for giving their approval to acts of violence. Then, too, the usual penalties of sending a man to jail for five or ten minutes for league per playing, were, he said, utterly inadequate. There should be some rule to provide that violent men should be put out of the game entirely. Justice Teetzel said he did not know just what would be the best course to prevent rough play, but he thought a committee of the government might consult with the officials of the different leagues or teams and arrive at some law to govern.

SYRIANS ASK PROTECTION

Of Government in Hayti in American Citizens. Special to the Whig. Washington, D.C., April 1.—The law recently passed in Hayti requiring all Syrians to register their names, cease trading, and leave the country becomes effective to-day, according to advices from Port-au-Prince, and the consequences of its enforcement are awaited with considerable interest by the state department here owing to the fact that a number of Syrians doing business in the island claim American citizenship and have asked the protection of this government.

The state department is always keenly on the alert to protect this country's subjects wherever they may be, it is the prevailing opinion that the most of the so-called American citizens among the Syrian residents of Hayti are to be found in plenty among all the West Indian Islands. They obtain citizenship papers in this country, and sometimes through gross fraud, and with the single purpose of using them to protect their commercial interests in the islands where they reside.
