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WERE IN KINGSTON.

COUPLE ACCUSED OF CONSPIRACY TO MURDER. Stayed at British-American Hotel Last Month for Several Weeks—They Did Not Register Under Their Proper Names.

J. Morgan Smith and wife, who have been arrested in Cincinnati in connection with the sensational case of Nan Patterson, the actress, charged with murdering Caesar Young, the bookmaker in New York, spent two weeks at the British-American Hotel, Kingston. They registered at that hotel as "W. A. Adams and wife."

It was Smith who was said to have purchased the revolver with which Nan Patterson shot Young, and as soon as the revolver was identified, Smith left New York, and came to Montreal.

District Attorney Jerome, of New York, sent detectives all over the continent, in an effort to locate the missing witness, but the case came to trial last December without his presence. The result was a disagreement of the jury, but the attorneys for the prosecution declared very emphatically that had they been able to put Smith in the witness box, so that he could be identified by Stern, the pawnbroker, who sold the revolver, the result would have been different.

It was then decided to redouble their efforts to locate Smith, and a few weeks ago there was a rumor that he was in Canada. Just when no one ventured to say, but it was finally determined to put the case in the hands of the Thiel Detective company, and E. R. Carrington, the Montreal manager, was entrusted with the work. A rumor spread some time ago, that a man who had been at Princeton College with Smith, had seen him at the La Corona Hotel, Montreal, and that he had been addressed as "Adams."

No such name appeared on the books, but photographs sent from New York, bore a striking resemblance to a six foot two man, who for months had been the most familiar figure at the hotel. Step by step he was traced, first to Kingston and then to Toronto, where he stayed at the King Edward Hotel. He denies being the man in question, and will so testify, but there is strong evidence against him.

It was on May 4th, last year, that Caesar Young was shot in a cab with Miss Patterson. The actress said he had shot himself. The police found that the revolver was purchased at a Seventh avenue pawnshop the day previous, and circumstantial evidence pointed to the fact that Smith bought it. The girl was held for murder, and Smith fled. The authorities will now be able to produce the Smiths as witnesses who saw Patterson commence her second fight for life, on April 10th.

POSITION NO SINECURE. Another Blunder in Alderman Walkem's Motion. Dr. G. W. Bell, when asked if the position of veterinary to the fire department was a sinecure, replied that he had not found it so. It was more of a honorary position, so far as salary was concerned. He got thirty-five dollars a year for performing the work. In 1904, he made sixty-eight visits, equal to 868 and it cost him \$42.75 to supply medicines, making in all \$110.75. This amount does not include examination of horses purchased. So far this year, or in a period of three months, medicine for the department has cost \$10 and his visits would equal \$24.

Another blunder in Alderman Walkem's motion concerning the appointment of Dr. Nicholls as veterinary has been pointed out. The motion reads that Dr. Nicholls shall be appointed for the year 1905 at his offer. That is, Dr. Nicholls is to receive a year's salary for nine months' work. So, after all, the city council has made no saving whatever.

LINOVITCH'S DESPATCH.

Cannot Leave Harbin Without Special Permits. St. Petersburg, March 31.—A despatch from Gen. Linovitch, dated March 29th says: "There is no change in the situation. The enemy is displaying activity east of the railroad. Heavy snow fell during the night."

A telegram from Gushu Pass (108 miles north of Tie Pass), Manchuria, says Gen. Linovitch has forbidden the inhabitants of Harbin, with the exception of women and children, to leave the place, without special permission, fearing that the town may be denuded of workmen.

A Private Mission. Paris, April 1.—A despatch to the Echo de Paris says that Princess Henry of Prussia will be entrusted with an entirely private mission on behalf of the German emperor, relating to the conclusion of peace. She has started for Russia with Prince Henry.

Committed Hari-Kari. St. Petersburg, April 1.—The Bourne prints a report that a number of Japanese prisoners at Melved have killed themselves by hari-kari and with arsenic. Gossip in some circles in St. Petersburg attribute the suicides to ill-treatment. The American embassy has not been advised on the subject.

Terms Acceptable. London, April 1.—A despatch to the Exchange Telegraph company, from St. Petersburg, says, it is asserted in diplomatic circles, that the terms of peace which would be acceptable to Russia, include the consent of the railway from Harbin to Port Arthur to China, and the payment of 200,000,000 (about \$250,000,000), to Japan in the form of a concealed contribution.

OVERSHADOW WAR.

The Desperate Agrarian Riots in Russia. New York, April 1.—A St. Petersburg despatch to the Herald says that agrarian risings throughout Russia are assuming serious proportions that they overshadow war. As a matter of fact the troubles render the proposed mobilization impossible.

Doing Great Damage.

St. Petersburg, April 1.—The latest outbreak of peasant disorders is in the Werra district of Lithuania, North-Eastern Poland. Regular mobs of peasants are marching through the country pillaging estates and demolishing the houses of land owners. One proprietor was shot.

Police Commissioner Szabolovetz, of Lódz, Russian Poland, was seriously injured this afternoon, by a bomb, which was thrown at him in the street.
