THE VARIOUS DOINGS IN THE RELIGIOUS WORLD.

Items That Will Interest the Churchgoing Public Gleamed from Many Fields.

The Eight Reverend Thomas F. Hickey, is confirmed an co-advisor bishop of the Diocese of Quebec.

Rev. M. R. A. Ketchen, B.A., has decided to remain in Peterboro, as assistant pastor of St. Paul's church.

Rev. W. J. Cadman, Hamilton, has received and accepted a unanimous call from the Church of the Disciples of Christ, Bowmansville.

In accepting the canopy of Winton, Rev. Angus McKay, Presbyterian minister of Lucknow, Ont., is resigning his charge to go to Scotland where he will be given one of the old Free churches.

Rev. George Jackson, of Waterloo Street Methodist church, Stratford, has accepted a call to Walkerville, and Rev. J. H. Kirkland of Walkerville, will be invited to take his place.

The Baptist convention of Stratford, have tendered a majority call to Rev. H. B. Bingham of McMaster University, Toronto, to succeed Rev. Mr. Grant, who recently resigned the pastorate.

A DARING EXPLOIT.

As Described by An English Banker.

Apart from the many valiant deeds performed in war, such as scaling the walls overhead a live shell, hangs a sack of gun-cotton to which a lit fuse is attached on the gates of a beleaguered citadel, and many another deed of martial valour, probably the most daring least ever performed by mortal man since the world was created was the crossing of the river of Niagara on a rope stretched over the raging torrent, by Blondin in 1860.

What a spectacle must have been presented when thisfeat was performed. The mighty flood is scouring rapidly, though smoothly and unperturbed, on and on to the very edge of the precipice, over which, with an awful roar it dashes, like a mad bull, mad into this vast seething caldron far beneath.
