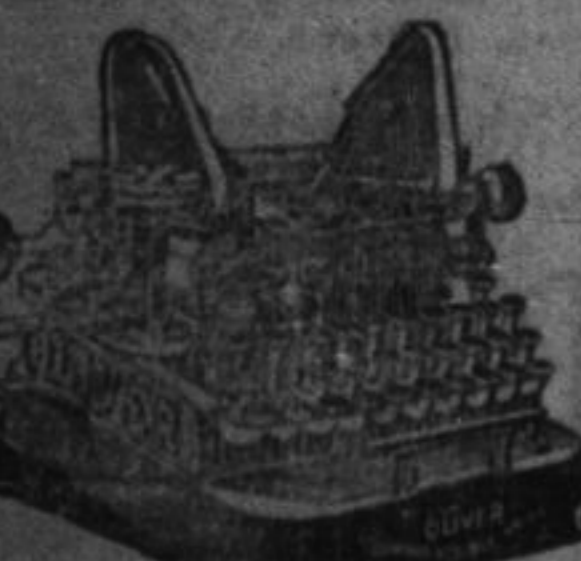

"Le Cercle Conservateur" is an Ottawa institution, with an aim, and it to promote the cause of the conservative party. At a recent meeting a long debate occurred respecting the "Distribution of Patronage," and the feeling was "that those liberals who had taken an active part in politics should not secure licenses." In other words revenge should be visited upon the liquor men who did not work with and for the conservative party in the last local election, but that, on the contrary, they should be driven out of business.

Noted Municipal Election

Municipal ownership won a victory in Chicago, in the election of Judge Edward P. Dunne, democrat, as mayor.

Both candidates were committed to the principle of municipal ownership. The difference between them lay in the manner in which ownership was to be brought about.

Mr. Harlan, who represented the republicans, was willing that the franchise, now expired or expiring, should be extended to the street railway companies, but only for a short time, and then only with the understanding that the service should be modernized, and that the city had the right to buy out the tangible assets at a valuation, without any allotment for franchises and goodwill.

Facts Leaking Out.

The attempt has been made, witted by enough, to create a religious war in connection with the proposed provincial legislation. Mean intentions have been sent out, concerning Sir Wilfrid Laurier and the Catholic church.

It was under its thumb and dominion, that he was moving only as it directed, and that its aggressiveness was such as to challenge the antagonism of every Protestant in the land.

Now was this all. Manitoba, it was alleged, had been practically taken by the throat. It was given out that its ambitions were dependent, more or less, upon its willingness to modify its legislation in favour of separate schools.

With time the agencies that were at work, in the interest of strife, became bolder, and it was intimated that Mr. Sharrett had brought his influence to bear upon the politicians, and that he had endeavoured to impress the ministers in Manitoba as he had impressed the ministers in Ottawa.

The government at Ottawa has been patiently waiting for the climax in this ignoble scheme to excite the prejudices of the people, to usher in a religious war. Those who know Sir Wilfrid Laurier have been satisfied that eventually he would put an end to the villainous rumour that have been in circulation. He has not spoken yet. When it is necessary to treat a phase of the subject that is disagreeable to him, and to any honourable man, he will turn back the tide of public opinion, and public criticism upon his traducers.

Meanwhile the Winnipeg Free Press, through its Ottawa correspondent has made enquiries, and writes: "Pending explanations there is a disposition here to regard the Winnipeg rumour, even as they affect Mr. Sharrett, as gross perversion. It is known here that on the night of February 20th, the day before he left home, Attorney-General Campbell of Manitoba, was closeted with the papal delegate, Mr. Rogers did not, it is said, see him. There was no nothing remarkable in it, but this conference, which was held, it will be noticed, two days after Sir Wilfrid had declared his policy on the boundary question in the House, was not the first time that these parties had met. For a year past the Roblin government has been dicker with Mr. Sharrett, and through most of the negotiations have been personal interviews between the delegate and Mr. Roblin and Mr. Campbell. The nature of these negotiations is well known to a number of people both here and in Winnipeg, and when the facts are made known, as they probably will be in the course of a few days, the people of Manitoba will be astonished, particularly those who are regarding Mr. Roblin as the stalwart defender of national schools. It is said that the church authorities have in their possession documents establishing the willingness of the Roblin government to amend the school law and re-establish separate schools under certain conditions."

Mr. Roblin is not under the direction of Sir Wilfrid Laurier. He is not serving the liberal cause, knowingly, in any respect, and any negotiations he has had with the church representative, if he has had any, does not concern the liberal government and has not been inspired by it.
