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SEE NEW YORK BY AIRSHIP

Cloud Carriages on Sale in Gotham.

New York, April 4.—The airship has come to this city as a commercial reality. Dirigible balloons, as capable of control as an automobile or a steam launch, are on public sale in New York. A \$3,000,000 corporation stands ready to sell airships to all comers—and, what is more, the "cloud carriages" are being purchased.

Men with means to take up the newest product of invention science are turning to the airship as a means of sport. The millionaires of New York, whose racing stables are large and costly, whose private garages, house automobiles worth fortunes, and whose yacht parties float over the fastest pleasure vessels afloat, have begun to add the airship to their list of costly playthings.

A site is being selected in which to build an aerodrome. Within a month a factory for the building of airships will be in operation in this city and a school for instructing airship chauffeurs will be established.

The first airship dealers in the world have established themselves here. Heading this first firm of airship merchants in Capt. Thomas S. Baldwin, whose airship, the Arrow, made the victorious flight at the St. Louis world's fair, winning for air navigators representing Baldwin, the prize of \$100,000.

"Yes, we sell airships. We are ready to sell airships of any size or color, will work just as well as the Arrow and the Los Angeles did in the west. There is no doubt that my invention has solved the problem of aerial navigation, and there is much room for perfecting the construction of the machine. My airship is nothing more or less than an aerial automobile. A gasoline engine drives it along, and it is started, steered, stopped, speeded and slowed just as an automobile is. I don't be surprised to see wealthy brokers and others of that class coming about New York before the summer is over. We intend to make airships a common sight in New York. They will be constructed large enough to carry a number of passengers, and one source of income for the company will be the establishing of a series of 'Seeing New York by Airship'.

WIRE IN NEW SKIRTS

Yards of Steel, Whalebone and Armored Platinums

London, April 4.—Fashionable women will wear during the summer of 1905 something very closely akin to that monotony of bygone days—the organdie.

So large, indeed, are the quantities of wire and steel used by fashionable dressmakers in the manufacture of the new spring skirts, that there is some justification for the reported return of the dreaded crinolines.

Under the skirt is an elaborate framework of wire and whalebone, the suggestion of the crinolines. This produces the full and outstanding effect now aimed at by the leading French dressmakers.

The Paris quantities of wire and steel are also being used in the making of all sorts of trim material, said a well-known court dressmaker to an Express representative yesterday.

"The waist of the skirt must fit like a glove, and this effect can only be obtained by the use of a whalebone enameled with steel."

"Nine steel—about seven and one-half feet—in the upper part of a skirt is an ordinary allowance, but in the case of plaited skirts, every plait may require to be held in place by five whalebones, and in order to accelerate the straight line from the bust to the waist, which in a great case of a thin veils or crepe de chine dress from 108 to 150 feet would be necessary."

WEALTH CONTROLS

Party Comprising Most Wealth Always in Power.

A party continuously in power, no matter what its name or avowed principles, is sure to freeze upon radical measures. The complete control of the organic law of a state by a majority of its voters means a future political situation hitherto unknown. The effect upon present party leaders and upon partisan organizations cannot be foreseen in full, but that it will be tremendous no one can doubt.

But if the individuals, who are enjoying the state offices, are opposed to a political approval of any kind, the parties which are permanently in the minority feel very differently. Their organizations and their members will welcome any reasonable reform which promises to alter materially the existing unsatisfactory situation. Also in sympathy with a reform so meritorious and non-partisan would undoubtedly be found a considerable portion of the adherents of the dominant party.

Yet even with a clear majority of the voters of any state earnestly in favor of a given amendment to the constitution, it does not follow that its adoption would be easy. In every state, with scarcely an exception, it is the party whose membership comprises nine-tenths of the total wealth, which, with few brief and partial interruptions, controls every department of the government. For the past decade this has been the situation more than ever before, and every year finds the power of money to determine the results of elections gaining in influence.

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TO GET THE MONEY.

Must Remain at Home Much of Time.

London, April 5.—Sir Phaulkell Maple, Great Britain's favorite king, who died worth \$10,000,000, bequeathed to his only child, the Princess Louise, the title of Duchess of Argyll, on condition that she forfeit it if she should not spend 200 days of every year in England. The baroness, whose husband is chancellor of the German embassy here, asked the supreme court to nullify this condition, but the court refused. She pleaded that it might be necessary for her own or her children's health to winter abroad but the judge replied that she should rely on the consideration of her trustees. She intends to appeal to the House of Lords.

CHARGES LAID.

Rector Accused of Making Faces at Worshipers.

London, April 5.—An enquiry, instituted by the Bishop of Bath and Wells, into the alleged extraordinary antics in church of Rev. Robert Seymour, rector of Kingston Seymour, near Bristol, was opened yesterday at Yatton.

Rev. Seymour, who is a cousin of the famous leader of the Agapomites, is alleged to have been in the habit of laughing at parts of the service, not knowing where he ought to kneel, preaching sermons that were mockeries and sometimes lasted only one minute, and at times breaking off to laugh and make faces at the congregation.

The rector denied all the charges and the enquiry was adjourned.
