Raising Raspberries.

When planting red raspberries, says a recent Farmers' Bulletin from Washington, the distance between the plants depends very largely upon the purpose for which the plantation is intended. If it is a commercial plantation upon soil which is no especially valuable, the plants should be three feet apart in the row and the rows should not be much less than six feet apart.
