Reports As To Russian And Japanese Fleets.

WHERE BOUND FOR?

SPECULATION AS TO RU- SIANS' DESTINATION.

Nebogoff's Squadron Cruising
Near Socotra-Togo. Has
Divided His Fleet—He Will Be
Ready to Meet the Russians in
a Capable Way.

London, April 12.—This morning's
reports regarding the Russian and

STARVED TO SAVE VOTE.

Englishman Wanted Another
Vote Before Dying.

London, Eng., April 12.—A story

that pathetically recalls the days when
men had to fight for the right to vote was told in the Manchester

council's court.

A shoemaker named John
Turnbull, living in the Ancoats slum
district, his eyes streaming with tears
told how his wife Sarah had died at
the age of forty-four.

"I have had no work for a long
time," he began. "We have been in
very poor circumstances. Buildings
have been pulled down and customers
have gone away. We have had some
bread and butter, and when we could
afford it we had bread and milk for
supper."

In reply to questions he said he
and his wife had lived like that since
last September. He said he could
have had relief from the guardians
but he wanted the elections to get
over and have another vote before
he died.

The immediate destination of the Russian

continues to be solicited. A

correspondent from Batavia claims to

Cochin China. It is believed

in Tokyo that they are making for the
Polo Condor Islands belonging to

France. These islands are in the
China sea, 120 miles east of Point

Cambodia, while the Standard's

St. Petersburg correspondent asserts that
the minister of marine professes profound ignorance of Admiral Rojestvensky's fleet.

The Times' correspondents represent

that the officials being greatly

satisfied with safety, the crews have not
been separated from the cruisers.

It was reported they had done.

The Times' man adds, it is evident
that Admiral Rojestvensky did not wait for Vice-Admiral Nieboogoff's squadron

because it would have been impossible

to coal or tow the torpedo boat

destroyers through a monsoon.

Admiral Rojestvensky has eight or nine
destroyers and Nieboogoff has none.

The destroyers probably will coal in
Dutch territory waters and await the
arrival of Nieboogoff, who is due in about

a month or two.

Waiting for Reinforcements.

London, April 12.—A despatch from
Johannesburg on the Gulf of Aden, to the
Daily Mail, says:

"Vice-Admiral Nieboogoff's squadron

has been seen cruising near Socotra.

It is reported to be waiting re-

inforcements from the Black Sea fleet.

Divided His Fleet.

Rome, April 12.—The commander of
the Italian squadron, in the far east,
sends word that Admiral Togo has di-
vided his fleet into three portions,
namely, a flying squadron of his faster
ships, for scouting and for opening
the attack, the more powerful ships
under command of Togo himself, which
will follow the others into action, and
finally the reserve squadron.

Executive Insurors.

Port Louis, Mauritius, April 12.—A
message from Nossi Be, Madagascar,
dated March 22nd, says that during the
first part of the voyage of the Italian
squadron, at that point many of the Rus-
sian sailors deserted, eight destroyers
were lost, and the remainder were reduced in rank.
