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TO MAKE DASH.

After Coaling Vladivostok In View.

Will They Escape?

Ships at Shanghai May Get Away.

The Russians Fired Some Rounds Uselessly and Aimlessly Under the Mistaken Impression That the Japanese Were Approaching.

Special to the Whig.—A despatch to the Times from Paris says that Admiral Rojstvenky, before beginning the last stage of his journey to Vladivostok, intends to coal at a point south-east of Formosa, which will be communicated to the fleet at Manila.

A despatch to the Morning Post from Shanghai says it is believed that the Russian cruiser Askold and the torpedo boat destroyer which are interned there, are preparing to slip out secretly and join the Russian fleet.

A despatch to the Telegraph from Vienna says that news has reached the British legation there, according to the unconfirmed reports, that a fight had occurred between the Russian and Japanese fleets, to the fact that the Russians fired some rounds uselessly and aimlessly under the mistaken impression that the Japanese were approaching.

A despatch to the Standard, from Singapore, states that the Russians closely scrutinized the British cruiser Saito, when the latter passed, and trained their guns on her.

USE HATPINS IN RUSH.

Woman Found a New Use for the Article.

Hagerstown, Md., April 14.—Hundreds of women seeking bargains rushed to the opening of a new department-store here to-day, and so great was the crush that many of the women forced their way through by jabbing others with hat pins, little caring whose they wounded.

The throng extended out to the middle of the street, and the pressure to get inside was terrific. Many women and girls fainted, and the number of punctured victims were frequent.

The excitement was due to the fact that several well known staple lines of silk and other dress goods were portland down to very low prices for this day only.

The crush in the store was so great that business could not be carried on, and the salesmen and saleswomen behind the counters stood motionless while the crowds pushed and fought. Many would be purchasers were glad to get out with a whole skin.

ARTIFICIAL GEMS.

Young Chemist Arrested After Making \$30,000.

Paris, April 14.—By the arrest of a jeweler's traveller named Acres, at Lyons, the police have put an end to a clever deception upon diamond merchants and jewelers throughout the country.

Acres was originally a chemist's assistant, and in the course of his studies invented a means of making artificial diamonds and rubies which deceived the most expert.

The imitation stones cost him less than 85 per cent to produce, and he sold them at a profit for anything between \$40 and \$100 per carat. Some of the best known houses in Paris are said to have been taken in with his wares.

The sale of these artificial diamonds and rubies has already brought him in some \$30,000 profit, notwithstanding that he has only been engaged in the work a little less than six months.

DRIVEN FROM TOWN.

Japs and Chinamen Huddled Out by White Men.

Vancouver, B. C., April 14.—A party of thirty-three Orientals, ten of whom were Chinamen and twenty-three Japanese, were driven out of a mill at Salmo, by a crowd of 200 white men, who had heard that the Orientals were coming and had gathered at the station when the train arrived.

The whites refused to allow the Orientals to leave the depot, and the newcomers, nearest the train, to Nelson, the nearest station. Another attempt will be made with the aid of provincial police to land the Asiatics in Salmo.

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ICE-BREAKER SAFE.

Steamer Has Left Montreal for Newfoundland.

Special to the Whig.—Montreal, April 11.—The latest news from the ice-breaker Montcalm, caught in an ice above Cap Rouge, is that the Montcalm, in perfect safety, in good shape and clear of water, at Point Abasi, on the south side of the river. The ice above Point Abasi, and below Cap Rouge is to be heavily packed and grounded, that it cannot move until the water rises.

Tides are beginning to increase, and marine authorities are of opinion that the jam below Cap Rouge will break up, this evening, or in morning morning, when the Montcalm will return to Quebec. There is no anxiety as to her safety. She has been provisioned for a week, and everybody on board is comfortable and happy. There are many who think the Montcalm will not be released until high tides, which will be on the 19th, and prophesy danger if the ice comes down from above, and crushes the vessel between the two ice.

The steamer Pallua, Capt. Belanger, left port at daylight, this morning, for St. John's, Nfld., with a full cargo of hay, and general cargo. She is the first outward steamer this season.

VERGIANIAN IN PORT.

Had a Good Trip Across the Atlantic.

Special to the Whig.—Halifax, N.S., April 14.—The Turbiner Virginia docked at 12:15 o'clock this morning. She had sixty-third class passengers; 43 second class and 841 steerage. She had a very good trip out, her best day's run being 403 miles, made on Tuesday 11th. Her daily runs were: Leaving Noville 4:10 p.m., on the 7th, made 195; Saturday, 311; Sunday, 388; Monday, 350; Tuesday, 408; Wednesday, 313; Thursday, 369; Friday, 331, arriving at Halifax at noon. The trip over was good, excepting no very rough weather, except on Wednesday, 12th, when, an small sea sprang up, but the ship acted well through it. Her engines worked very well with the exception of the boilers priming a little. Everything was in good shape. There was one death on the way out; a little child about twelve months old died and was buried at sea.

SWEEPING TREATY.

A Basis for Opposing French Policy.

Basin, April 14.—The commercial treaty between Germany and Morocco, is being negotiated by Dr. Von Kuhlmann, the charge d'affaires at Fez, is more than an arrangement covering coating trade rights. It embraces all the most favored nation guarantees in the previous treaty.

It is upon this treaty that Germany will press her resistance to France's efforts to become the predominant power in Morocco.

Matter Of Weighing.

Special to the Whig.—Montreal, April 14.—Hon. Sidney Fisher, minister of agriculture, came to the city, to-day, for the purpose of holding a conference with the cheese traders, relative to the problem, which is a rather vexed one, of weighing.

The conference, with representatives of the Montreal Butcher and Cheese Association took place, this morning, in the council chamber of the board of trade. Representatives of the various country cheese boards were present and gave their views on the matter in question. With these the minister will be able to devise a uniform method of weighing which will be binding on the trade.

To Play in Toronto.
