ADVICE FROM MANITOULIN TO THE GOVERNMENT.

Budget Debate Still on—Toronto University Agitation Commanded—Mr. Pense Believes the Inquiry Will Do Good.

The debate on the budget was continued in the legislature, Thursday afternoon. Mr. Carstairs, in a pithy address, emphasizing the arguments advanced by the provincial treasurer, promised that the 'Soe agreement would be observed.

Mr. Pense (Kingston) taxed Carstairs with having lapsed into a pre-election speech when he talked about climatology, humber and clapping. When the house was past and accepted in a fair and manly spirit, when, as had been said, there was no sequel, he thought that tone might be dropped.

He reviewed the estimates of the agricultural department, and had a passage with Col. Matheson over the increase in expenditure, which the treasurer placed at \$114,000. But this was exclusive of the supplementary estimates, or there was no meaning in all the deputations that waited on ministers.

He justified the \$70,000 grant to Ottawa University, and complimented Dr. Pyne. The highly-educated man was not always an all-round man in matters of execution. The Toronto University had not the strength required by their 'alma mater which imbued the students at Kingston and Montreal. When a young man ventured to criticize instead of being brow-beaten, he should receive kindly received, but his criticism would probably have a good effect.

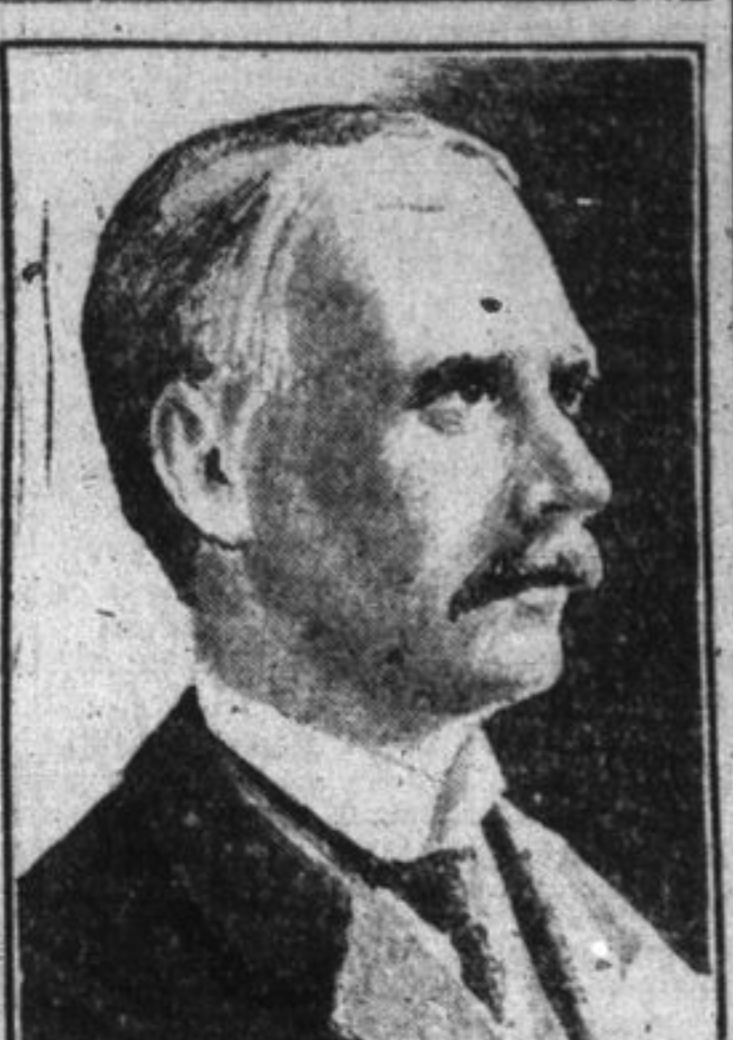

Who has become Governor of Colorado through the compromise resulting from the Adams-Peabody contest, McDonald has long been prominent in the affairs of the Canadian State and last November was elected Lieutenant-Governor on the Republican ticket, obtaining 862,500 in gold. Pittsburg Dispatch. An American, J. G. Jenkins, who is relinquishing the proprietorship of South Australia, in order to become the agent-general for that state in London, will enjoy the distinction of being the first man who was born a citizen of the United States to represent a British colony in London. He is a native of Susquehanna county, Pennsylvania, and is said to have arrived in Australia as a contractor for an American publishing house. He liked the country, settled there, became a naturalized British subject, was returned to South Australia—parliament, filled various ministerial offices, and ultimately reached the premiership.

SAYS YASHIMA IS A GONER.

Ottawa, April 14.—Ellis Ashmead Bartlett, war correspondent of the London Times, was asked regarding the Daily Telegraph's dispatch from Tokio, which says that the Japanese battleship Yashima has not been sunk. "It is practically certain that the Yashima was sunk," he said. "There were several Russian officers on board the ship, from Yokohama to San Francisco, and they told me they had seen the Yashima go down at the same time as the Halsea."

A FINE EXHIBITION

IN PROGRESS AT KIRKPATRICK'S ART GALLERY.

Annual Display of Work of Members of the Kingston Sketch Club—Clever Works of Art and Interesting Curios.

An interesting place to visit at the present time is Kirkpatrick's art gallery, where the Kingston branch of the Women's Art Association of Canada is holding its annual sketch exhibition. This year the Kingston branch is confining the exhibit to local artists, supplementing their work with a fine display of curios and specimens of rare skill in various branches of industry.

The art exhibit occupies about half the gallery, and almost every specimen is worthy of the place it occupies. It is true—some sketches have been done by a place on the skyline, but it is consoling to those whose work has thus been hung, that every specimen cannot be given a space in the immediate foreground. The exhibit numbers, all told, 269 pieces, and while there are too many to specifically treat, mention must be made of the miniature portrait work of Miss Mabel Gildersleeve. There are eight or ten specimens, among them being several faces familiar to Kingstoners. The work is above criticism.

Each day an exhibition is given in Honiton lake making by an English lady. Skill in this art is acquired by few because of its intricacies. To the uninitiated it is little short of marvellous that such beautiful results can be obtained from an apparent chaotic mass of pins and thread, requiring deftness and a delicacy of touch that comes only by inheritance. Among those having some delightful specimens of handiwork on display are: Mrs. R. H. Hooper, Mrs. Laidlaw, Mrs. J. Markie, Miss Brophy, Miss Lola Martin, Mrs. Barber and Mrs. E. H. Mackie. Miss Drummond, the energetic secretary of the sketch club, is in charge, and she is taking a delight in pointing out features which the careless observer would be sure to overlook.

ANOTHER DOCTOR.

He is a Graduate of Queen's—A Military Career. Harry Sound Star, April 5. Dr. A. Edmund Burrows, who has been practicing in McKellar for the past year, intends moving to Parry Sound about May 1st. Dr. Burrows commenced practice six years ago, as a surgeon in the Imperial army, during the South African campaign, where he served until the conclusion of the war. At the battle of Botha's, when the brave Le Galais, and members of his staff were killed, the charge of the wounded fell upon Dr. Burrows, who transferred an hotel and a church, the only two buildings remaining unburned in the town, into temporary hospitals, where the wounded were cared for with the aid of one orderly and of volunteer Dutch women until the British, who had retreated, again took possession of the town, some two weeks later. Dr. Burrows then conducted his wounded across the veldt to Kroonstad, not losing a single patient. His promotion into the medical staff was read out in orders the following day, with mention of his excellent services. With such an experience we feel sure the doctor will meet with success.
