Thus kind of advertising pays because it hits the iron while it is hot. I pick up a book, glance at the title, look at the illustration, and lay it aside because it does not strike my fancy. Another one attracts me at the first glance. It is purchased and read through.

It is the same way with advertisements. One strike of head-line will at a glance cause the reader to devour a column of small type. Big black type that covers an entire page is not remembered when the thing said does not interest the reader.

By associating events of this nature with your advertisements, you are making use of already created agitation. In other instances you must create this contentment.

A retailer must be careful, however, in special advertisements of this nature to see that they are not brazenly doctored. As an example compare the following headings of advertisements to appear on election day. No. 1—"John Jones is the winner and so are our special offers." No. 2—"Seyforth's Bargains Win."

The first example shows a brass band style of publicity, while the second suggests the idea you wish to convey instead of letting it outright. Special mid-winter sales, announcement of spring and fall openings and real tag sales are good drawing cards, but these special advertisements where the copy fits in with important local events, when properly handled, give life to your business, and make all of our advertisements more talked of and more productive of real results.

THE "SCHREYERS HOEK"

In Old New York—Means Weeping Point.

New York, April 15.—One of the forgotten points of interest in the lower end of the city is the old "Schreyers Hoek." This was the "Cape Hoek" or Cape rock which jutted out into the river at a point a little north of South Ferry, and which is now included in Battery Park. Here was the first dock, and here the settlers greeted new arrivals and said farewell to those about to depart. It took its name from the "Schreyers Hoek," in Amsterdam, a similar point projecting into the harbor, where the burghers said good-bye to their friends, who were about to sail. Because of the mournful scenes enacted there it came to be known as "Schreyers Hoek," or the "weeping point."
