# IS UNFRIENDLY.

**THIS IS A CHARGE AGAINST BRITAIN.** Transmitting Intelligence of Rojestyevsky's Whereabouts Stirrs Russian Press—Is To Go Challenged?

St. Petersburg, April 15.—No further news beyond that contained in the foreign telegrams has been received regarding the squadron commanded by Vice Admiral Rojestyevsky, but the impression continues that he is steaming towards the island of Formosa with the intention of giving battle. If Admiral Tojo accepts the challenge. Some of the papers, notably The Novoye Vremya, still manifest irritation at the activity of British warships in reporting the movements of the Russian squadron. The Novoye Vremya says the vessels of all nations are observing neutrality, with the exception of the course of Great Britain, "taking particular exception to the fact that the British cruiser Iphigenia transmitted by wireless telegraph the information that she had passed Admiral Rojestyevsky's squadron, 140 miles from Saigon, which was very important news to the Japanese, inasmuch as Rojestyevsky had succeeded in slipping by the Japanese scouts."

"If a commercial ship to report such a fact upon arrival at a port is quite natural," says The Novoye Vremya, "but the news is then more or less old, and in the meantime the squadron might have changed its course, but for a man of war to send such information to a coast station by wireless telegraph is unfriendly."

"However, this is not the first time the British have conveyed a valuable warning to their friends. During the Sino-Japanese war, in which Great Britain was on the side of China, a British cruiser at Weihaiwei warned the Chinese admiral by firing a salute upon the approach of the Japanese fleet, although at night it is not the custom to salute in that fashion."

**To Sail In July Or August.** Port Said, April 15.—Information has reached here to the effect that a fifth division of the Russian second Pacific squadron, under the command of Vice-Admiral Vesnarsko, and composed of the battleship Imperator, Alexander II., Slava and Paul I., the armored cruiser Panayot Azov and the second class cruiser Admiral Mikoyan will leave the Suez canal in July or August.

**Did Not Sight Jap Scouts.** Paris, April 15.—A despatch to the Temps from Saigon, French Cochinchina, says Admiral Rojestyevsky did not sight any Japanese scouts during his entrance into the China Sea. It is expected that the Russian squadron will re-provision off the coast of Annam.

**Russia Aggrieved.** St. Petersburg, April 15.—The Press today remarks, referring to the despatch from Washington published here yesterday, on the subject of the Japanese assurances in regard to the opening of hostilities: "If the telegram is true, Japan deceived the United States scouts during a course of diplomatic routine, and was without any motive whatever."

**An "All Star" Production.** Special to the Whig. New York, April 17.—Metropolitan players are displaying keen interest in the "all-star" production of "She Stoops to Conquer," which is to be produced at the New Amsterdam Theatre to-night. The production is along the same lines as the memorable revival of "The Two Orphans" last spring. The cast includes such eminent players as Miss Eleanor Robinson, Miss Clara Bloodgood, Louis James, Kyle Bellow, Arnold Daly, H. E. Dancy and J. E. Benson. Following a four-weeks' engagement here the company will make a spring tour of the large cities.

**Leaves Over Million Dollars.** Rochester, N.Y., April 17.—The will of Frederick Cook was offered for probate to-day. The total value of the estate is estimated at \$1,800,000. Legacies are left to a large number of relatives, including nephews and nieces in Germany. The sum of \$25,000, left to the German Evangelical St. John's Charitable Association, \$10,000 to the Mechanics Institute, \$5,000 to each of the city hospitals and a number of bequests to local charitable organizations.

# DISCUSSED DIVORCE.

**Council to Ascertain Causes Leading to It.** Washington, D.C., April 14.—Over the bitter protest of Miss Susan B. Anthony, the National Council of Women to-day, adopted a resolution pledging the organization to co-operate with church and state in ascertaining what are the chief causes which induce or lead up to divorce. Divorce, the resolution recites, is known to cause most disastrous results in the family and state.

"I do not consider divorce an evil by any means," asserted Miss Anthony, who was on her feet before the reading of the resolution had been concluded. "It is just as much a refuge for women married to brutal men as Canada was a refuge from brutal mistreatment, a refuge from a resolution that will not women from a refuge from designing and brutal men."

The council adopted, formally the anti-polygamy resolution, favorably reported from committee yesterday, also a resolution deploring the horrors of war in general, and particularly the present war in the far east.

**To War On Tuberculosis.** Special to the Whig. Montreal, April 17.—Not only the United States, but Germany, France, Italy, and even far away Japan, are represented at the convention of the American Anti-Tuberculosis League, which began in this city to-day. The meeting convened at 2 o'clock, in the afternoon, in the hall of the house of representatives. Addresses will be delivered by Dr. George Brown, of Atlanta, called by Governor V. W. C. of order and Gov. McCall delivered an address of welcome. The roll call showed an attendance of nearly 1,000 delegates. These included not only eminent physicians from all over the country, but also many state and city health officers, members of congress, sanitary experts and others. The sessions of the congress will continue through the greater part of the week. Addresses will be given by the medical men of international prominence and there will be an exhaustive discussion of recent discoveries and the most advanced methods of fighting the dreaded white plague.

**Monastery Rified.** London, April 16.—The Russian government has drawn the attention of the British home office to a daring robbery which has been perpetrated at the monastery at Gaemat, in Georgia. The articles stolen include an embroidered black silk belt richly ornamented with pearls; inlaid in the buckles are 204 pearls and fifty-nine emeralds and turquoise. Pure gold articles, weighing 284 grammes, ornamented with sapphires and turquoise; four stones were missing. Large golden ring of King David the Renovator, with a picture of St. George on the outside; the ring is provided with a blue sapphire, rubies, small golden managias, being a picture of the Holy Virgin, worn by bishops as their distinctive sign; two silver chalices and a silver tumbler.

**Demand Indemnity of Mexico.** Chicago, April 17.—The Mexican government will be asked to pay \$450,000 as indemnity for the murder of J. K. McKenzie and Dr. Robert McCoy, of Chicago; Walter Stuppiger, of Kewanee, Ill., and M. T. Tellez, of Toledo, Ohio, killed for the suffering inflicted on G. E. Torrington, of Salem, Ohio, and H. E. Miller, of Los Angeles, Cal., by Yaqui Indians, on January 19th last.

**Censure For Ex-Premier.** St. Petersburg, April 17.—The lower house of the Hungarian diet, passed a motion for a vote of censure on former Premier Tisza for being actuated by political motives in raising the pension of the late president of the house of Decei Von Bayhard from \$1,000 to \$2,000. The motion was carried by a large majority.

**Precursor Of Cholera.** St. Petersburg, April 17.—A peculiar epidemic of cerebral spasms, almost always fatal, has made its appearance in St. Petersburg. The disease was first imported from Galicia to Lodz, Russian Poland, where there have been many victims. It is regarded by the doctors as a precursor of cholera.

When she could be moved she was brought farther west to Stockton, and a number of members of the famous secret society known as the Elks, including several British Columbia men, offered to sacrifice areas of their epidermis in her favor. Local members of the society have received word that the contemplated operation was a great success.

Out of the score or so of Elks who offered skin, George A. Lovejoy was the most favored. From him Dr. C. P. Thomas took nearly two square feet of his epidermis. F. B. Sears and H. P. Knight, husband and brother respectively of Mrs. Sears, gave a foot each. The three men have made rapid recovery, and have been discharged from the hospital. Every portion of the skin grafted on the woman's body adhered.

Robinson was subject to fainting fits, and it is generally supposed that he was seized with one while walking along the bank of the creek and fell.

**The Old Earth Restless.** San Francisco, Cal., April 17.—The Examiner says that Mount Shasta threatens to become active again. Some startling occurrences are reported at Sisson, a town in the vicinity of the mountain. The ground has opened at several points and mud is ejected. The railroad fill across a big canon has sunk forty feet, with the streets of the little mountain town filling up with muddy stuff, full of oil.

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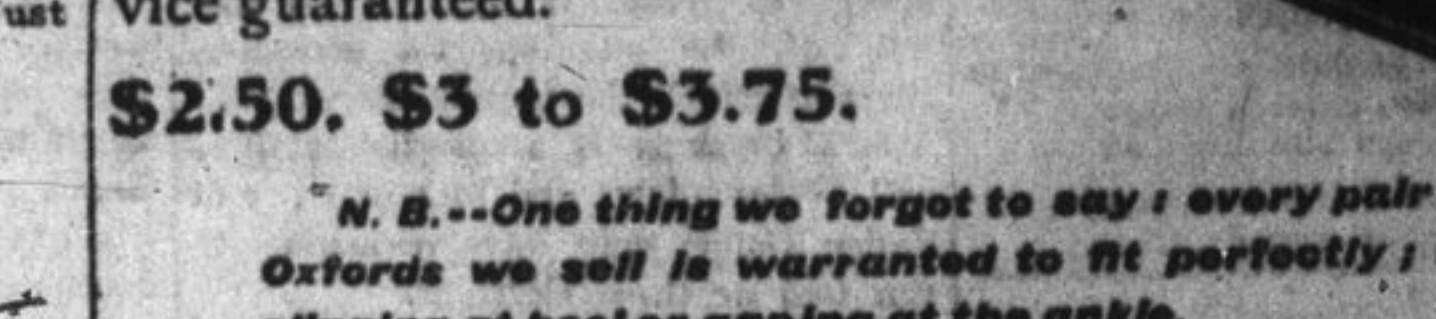
