FOR THE FARMER.

INTERESTING INFORMATION FOR AGRICULTURISTS.

Canadian Farm Produce in Demand in England—The Value of Cross Rotation—The Best Way to Plant Potatoes.

A proposal is now to amalgamate the Ontario Farming Association and the Ontario Grange, so as to form a gigantic combine to meet the advances of other combines.

The Vegetable Growers' Association has asked the minister of agriculture for Ontario for a grant of \$1,000, and have requested also that arrangements be made for an exhibition of vegetables at the next fruit, flour, and honey show.

What wheat is to the farmer of Manitoba and the North-West, cotton is to the southern farmer. An organization is in process of formation to have all the cotton growers combine so as to keep up the price of the product and to regulate the quantity to be grown from year to year.

It is not well to discard a cow, particularly a heifer, because she does not do well the first year. She may do better the next year, and as much must not be expected of a two-year-old heifer as of a four-year-old cow. When you make up your mind that a cow falls below the standard, then fatten her and sell her to the butcher.

The practice of using a currycomb has been abandoned in many stables and some authorities say it should never be used on the skin of a horse. The question may be asked, how is the dirt and dandruff to be got rid of if the hair is not first stirred up and the refuse matter be brought where a brush can be held of it? A stout bristle brush will do the business. For long, rough coats nothing is better than what the English hostler terms a dandy-brush.

A good variety of potatoes may be made to last a great deal longer if the farmer in selecting a few potatoes for seed will go through his field and select those varieties which are most resistant to fungus diseases, whether in plant or fruit. Fungus diseases take hold of the tubers; they are abundant on those less able to resist their attacks. When a potato begins to weaken fungus diseases take hold, and as a result the tubers rot, running out in a few words, losing vitality. When a farmer holds a lot of a really fine variety of potato he should under no circumstances plant small seed, neither should he plant the extra time to observe the need of draining.

Now is the time to observe the need of draining," says Prof. Reynolds, of the O.A.C. "The existence of wet and dry patches, and the general directions of the water course should be observed in order to learn whether the drainage is in and what places and directions drains should be laid. The draining of farm lands should be regarded as an investment. The improvement resulting from drainage, where drainage is necessary, will return a large annual dividend and will increase the capital outlay by reason of the improved texture, moisture content, and temperature of the soil, and the resulting increase in the quantity and quality of crops."

Now is the season to observe the benefits of fall plowing. The difference should be noted between land, especially sloping land, that has been left smooth and that was plowed in the fall and left rough and loose. The former has become packed and possibly puddled, or on steep or sloping land, has been gullied and washed out and deprived of much of its valuable material. This land, if left to itself, will soon become hard and difficult to till. The fall plowed land, however, will be in a far more meliorated condition, and will make an earlier and a superior seed bed.

Some Market Reports.
Eggs are selling at Montreal at 16c a dozen.
Maple syrup is retailing at Montreal, at from 70c to 75c a gallon.
There is an unlimited demand for Canadian bacon and Canadian eggs in Birmingham, Eng.

At Montreal potatoes are selling at 50c to 55c a bag in car lots. A very fine feeling prevails in the Bristol market for Canadian bacon, with prices ranging from 51c to 57c. Canadian Wiltshire bacon at Liverpool has advanced 1s on the week, the range now being from 48c to 53c. The London market for Canadian bacon is strong, and prices are 1s to 1s 3d higher than a week ago, at 53c to 61c.

The tone of the Montreal market for butter remains steady under a fair demand and as supplies coming forward are not in excess of the daily requirements, prices are unchanged at 24c, 24 1/2c for choice new milk creamery, and 23c for undergrades.
P. B. Bull, Canadian government agent, at Birmingham, Eng., says that a great deal more trade would be obtained if shippers would brand their goods "Canadian." They should also ship direct to the inland towns instead of dumping at Liverpool, London or Bristol. In doing this, the price would be obtained and cheaper through rates could be procured.

A Mammoth Idol.
Two miles from Kamakura, and about twenty from Yokohama, on a terrace near the temple, sits the most gigantic idol in the world. It is the brazen image of a deity, and dates from the reign of Emperor Shomu, who died A.D. 756. The dimensions of this idol are colossal. Its height, from the base of the lotus flower upon which it sits to the top of its head, is 63 ft. The face is 16 ft. in length and 9 1/2 ft. wide, the ears are 3 ft. 9 in. from corner to corner, the eyebrows 5 1/2 ft. and the ears are 3 ft. The chest is 20 ft. in depth and the middle finger is exactly 5 ft. long.

One son, Fred Grange, and one daughter, Mrs. Roberts, are all that remains of a large family. Deceased was a consistent member of the Presbyterian church, an estimable lady, and beloved by all who knew her.

AVOIDING POTATO SCAB.

Care Must Be Made in Selecting Seed Stock. It must be remembered that while the treatment of seed potatoes here given is one of the most effective known it will be of little value if the seed tubers themselves are scabby or if they are to be planted on land infested with scab.

It is considered by expert growers that it is a waste of time and money to attempt to raise potatoes unless the soil is practically free from scab and unless fertilizers, such as potash, kainit and acid phosphate, are used which will not have a tendency to encourage scab growth. Then, again, the crops used in the rotation have much to do with the soil getting in a scabby condition when such crops are likely to become affected as easily as the potato. This being the case nothing is better to use as the crop preceding potatoes than corn.

The treatment of the seed tubers which gives the best results consists in making a solution of one pound of formalin to thirty gallons of water and soaking the tubers in this solution for about two hours. Plant as soon thereafter as possible or if they cannot be planted at once they should be spread out thinly on the barn floor to dry. Of course it is understood that the whole tuber is immersed in the solution and cut up according to the usual practice afterward. The process is doing for potatoes what it is doing for the coming year, but only potatoes free from scab will bring prices which will pay.
