A VILLAGE AT WAR.

**BAD FEELINGS HAVE MADE
 HAVOC IN FAMILIES.**
 All Because the Thirsty Residents
 of Spencerville Signed a Peti-
 tion to Have a License Grant-
 ed to a Hotel Proprietor.

The little village of Spencerville, ordi-
 narily as quiet and peaceful as the
 poetic "Sweet Auburn," is in the
 throes of a conflict as bitter as the
 autonomy bill and as fierce as a Japa-
 nese dragon. The whole countryside
 is at war; houses are divided against
 themselves; relatives abuse one an-
 other; friends of a lifetime have be-
 come enemies and children, too, have
 entered into the conflict. Slander and
 viciousness run riot. Mrs. Grundy is
 on a rampage. Men who have held
 honorable characters for scores of
 years, are disgraced before their
 neighbors; sweet and motherly women
 have forgotten their calling and even
 the domestic "shine" is looked upon
 with suspicion. The udder which sup-
 plies the milk of human kindness in
 Spencerville has run dry.

Little things usually create the
 greatest distances and it is in this
 case. Dan McNeely, host at the
 temperance hotel in Spencerville,
 thought the change in government of-
 fered a good chance to apply for a
 license. Spencerville is a "dry" town
 and McNeely and his friends got out
 a petition and almost before the tem-
 perance people knew it he had enough
 signatures to make it presentable to
 the commissioners. When this became
 known, the temperance people arose in
 their might. They stormed because
 their neighbor's husband had signed
 the petition, only to find their own
 husbands had done so, too. Mothers
 wept and threatened to disown sons
 who had signed it; sons criticized fa-
 ther's character and societies split, and
 as the excitement spread stories en-
 larged and bitterness grew apace.
 Both sides are prepared to stand by
 their colors, although some have
 "hedged" and a few are "the
 fence." The temperance people have
 organized to fight the petition and
 collected a fund.

 his recent illness.


