GREAT JAPANESE.

RANK SHIMOSE WITH THEIR WAR HEROES.

Japanese Will Pay Tribute to Inventor as Well as to Togo, Oyama, and Nogi When Final Victory is Won.

Tokyo, April 21.—His countrymen will rank Prof. Shimose with Togo, Oyama, and Nogi when final victory is achieved over Russia. They will honor the scientific worker in the laboratory equally with the admirals and generals who led their fleets and armies in the actual fighting.

For Shimose, with infinite pains and innumerable risks, perfected the tremendous explosive that bears his name. He will carry to his grave the mark of his invention. Yet, destructive as is Shimose powder, it is perfectly safe to handle. It can be kept at varying temperatures without change of character. It can be hammered and bullets may be fired into it without exploding it.

If it is set on fire deliberately it burns with a minute flame and can be extinguished easily with one bucket of water. In destructive power it is second only to nitroglycerine, and is superior to gun cotton and dynamite, but safer and more reliable than either of the three.

The Japanese in their ardent love of progress give more honor to Shimose because they alone fully realize that only half a century has passed since Nippon adopted the military methods and arms of the west.

Europe and America for all their arms, but in the last twenty years they have been working hard to become independent of other nations in such matters. They are no longer "mere" imitators. They have "bettered the instructions" of their teachers, and their soldiers, their mechanics, and their mechanics have provided them with formidable weapons of Japanese invention and Japanese manufacture.

Japan must still buy her battleships and her great naval armaments abroad, but she herself has built many of her best torpedo boats and destroyers, while her army is almost entirely equipped by her own workers and in every phase of warfare on sea and land the Japanese inventor has been busy.

As a result Japan boasts and other nations must envy the Murata rifle, the work of Col. Murata, of the engineers; the Arisaka gun, invented by Gen. Arisaka; the Igin fuse for shells, the invention of Vice Admiral Igin, vice chief of the naval general staff, and greatest of all—Shimose powder, the work of the Japanese shells, torpedoes and mines all owe their high explosive power.

Before this war the name of Prof. Shimose was unknown outside of Japan, and very little known in Japan. His experiments were never published, for it was intended to keep secret as long as possible the fact that the Japanese army and navy had this new material.

range and several of the fragments hurled by within a few feet of Shimose, who was watching the firing. The Russians do not aim half as well. In 1893 the invention had advanced so far that the admiralty promoted the inventor and awarded him a special grant of money. When the Chinese war broke out next year Japan had no plant for making the new powder on a large scale and had in store only small quantities for experimental purposes. So the occasion for using it in actual war passed by.

In any case the inventor was not yet satisfied that the new explosive was all he could make it. In 1898, however, he had completed his researches, and a plant for the regular manufacture of the powder on a large scale was laid down in the arsenal.

After it had blown at least one big gun to fragments in the earlier experiments, Shimose had given up the idea of using the powder for the charge in the big gun and confined his effort to making it safe and effective for the charges of shells, mines, and torpedoes, and for engineering work.

The fight with the Varig at Chemulpo on the very first day of the war revealed the existence of the new explosive and its terrific power. The narratives of the Russian officers tell how a bursting shell blew part of the end of a ship's bridge into small pieces, while the bodies of the men who were near the point of explosion were scattered in unrecognizable fragments.

The doctors who treated the wounded were surprised at finding that they had been injured by large shell splinters as would be the case with ordinary shell fire from naval guns, but that they had to extract from the bodies of their patients numbers of small shell fragments, each sufficient to inflict a serious wound.

Shimose powder not only tears open a shell, but shivers the steel into hundreds of fragments, each capable of killing or wounding a man. In experiments against armor plates with the Shimose charge and the Igin fuse, the shells appear to burst with the penetrating plate, shattering it and projecting inward a shower of fragments. The wonderful effectiveness of the new powder is also proved by the damage done to the Russian warships by Japanese torpedoes and mines.

TALKS TO RETAILERS. No. 28, Origin of Trade Marks by B. G. Moon. So the jobber was advised that the chairs would be made according to instructions at the price specified.

The jobber in turn having progressive salesmen sold these chairs to the different retailers of the country and the retailers in turn sold them to different families in their own community. Things went well until one day one of these chairs was not satisfactory. The dealer made complaints that the chairs were not properly quarter-sawn and that they were coming apart. Some of the dealers made a good deal of fuss, and the manufacturer, who was repairing the chairs, while other retailers said, "Wait until I see your jobber. When the jobber was consulted regarding "making good," on the imperfect chairs, he guaranteed as to the quality of his goods when he sold them to the retailer; that the retailer had to take the chances; that he had no agreement with the manufacturer to guarantee so that if he took back the chairs there would be a loss to him and that there was no additional profit in the goods to warrant his doing this.

But the jobber said, "Now hereafter, I will guarantee another manufacturer to make my chairs and will be sure to receive satisfactory goods." The following year he withdrew his contract from the first manufacturer and gave it to another. This year the quality of the goods was such that after a few weeks he was such that the chair was refinished and the consumer was again dissatisfied with the goods.
