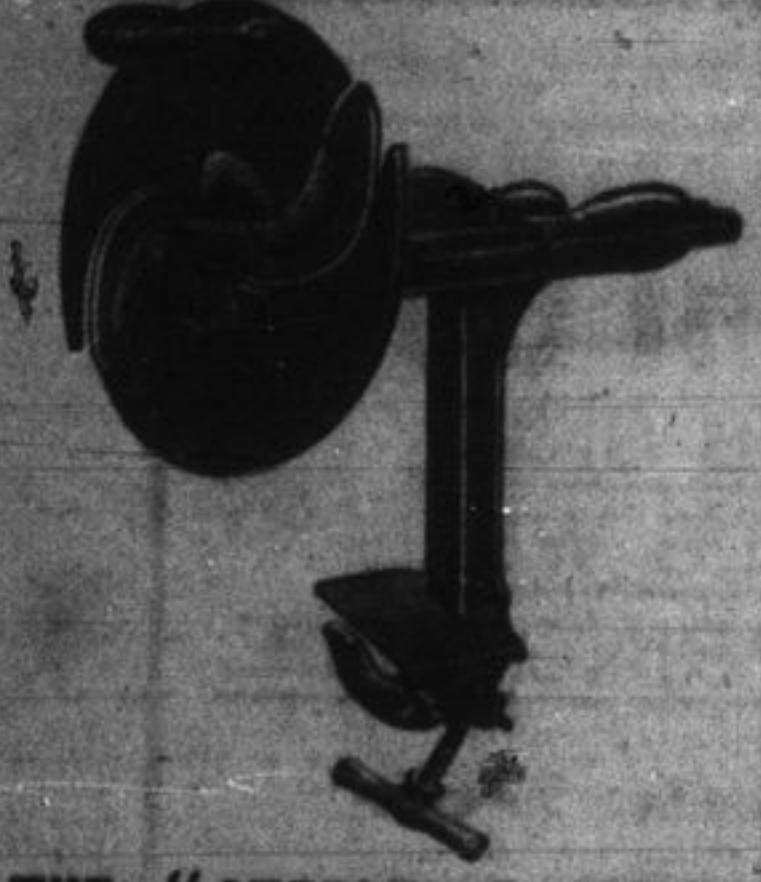

HELD LAST EVENING BY THE ANGLICAN CHURCHES.

Reports of the Work During the Year—Advances Made in Many Ways—The Finances Reported Good.

The vestry meetings of the Anglican churches were held last evening. The following are reports of the proceedings:

St. George's Cathedral. The annual meeting of the vestry of St. George's cathedral was held in the hall, on Monday evening at eight o'clock.

The church wardens reported \$2,419.14 received from pew rents, and \$2,370.41 from Sunday collections and envelopes.

Special collections, \$410.00. The church wardens only report what appears in their books, so that \$1,400 for missions and the same raised by the women's auxiliary and the Sunday school do not appear.

St. James' Church. At St. James' vestry, after J. C. Peterson had been elected vestry clerk pro tem, the annual financial statement was most lucidly presented.
