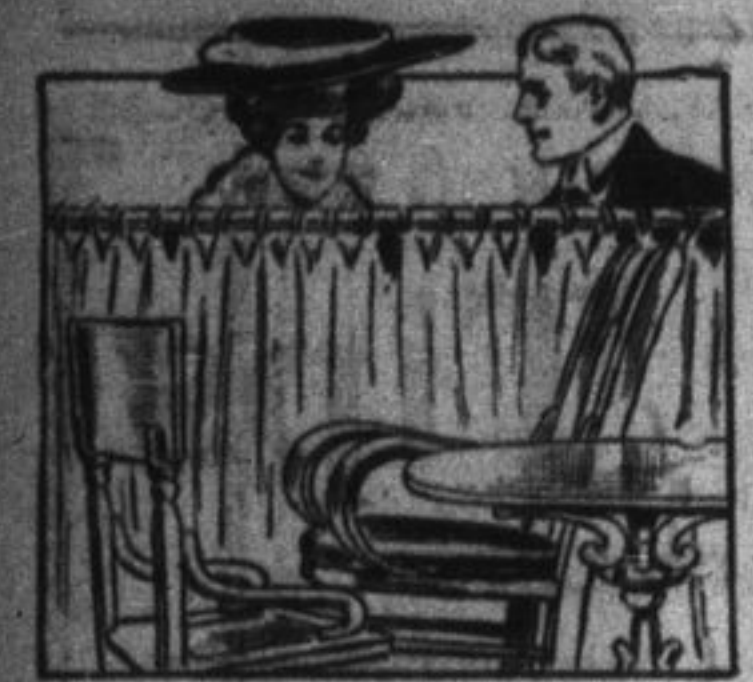

**MAKING OF CANADA.**

**LORD NORTON RELATES THE  
CREATING OF DOMINION.**

Final Draft of B.N.A. Act Made at Hama Hall, Warwickshire—May in Time to Come Draw Pilgrims from Many Parts of Empire.

To-day, writes S. in the London Daily Mail of April 1st, the mortal remains of the nonagenarian, Lord Norton, will be laid in their last resting place at Lea Marston church, which stands close by Hama Hall in Warwickshire. The aged peer had so much outlived the generation which knew him best that few will quite realize how vividly interesting a chapter of imperial history is thus brought to a close. Charles Adderley was not gifted to any remarkable extent with those platform arts which lay the foundation of a great political reputation. Straight and simple in style of speech, careless, rather, as it seemed, he won or missed distinction, but deeply in earnest about many things which tend now to the gaining of popular applause, though they make largely for the sweetening of human life, he missed greatness, yet won universal esteem.

Some years ago I was his guest at Hama Hall. He was over eighty, yet full of energy, and seemed to take a delight in spending some hours of a summer afternoon showing me over the gardens which surrounded his beautiful home. His memory of the past was fresh and vivid, and carried back to times which seemed almost historical as he spoke of his earlier political experiences and the men with whom he had been brought into close contact during an active political career.

"I lingered for a while on the broad terrace of the hall, gazing at the lovely of the Warwickshire scenery. Then quietly, and as it seemed to me, with special care, the old gentleman had seats arranged, and we sat down. He looked at me for a few moments, and his strong kindly face lit up with a smile of proud remembrance.

"Do you know," he said, "that you are sitting on a spot which may some day become famous enough to draw many pilgrims from far distant parts of the British Empire?"

"I express surprise and interest."

"It was just there," said Lord Norton, "that the final draft was made of the British North America Act. It created the Dominion of Canada, and laid down the great principle that the British subjects shall be free, self-governing nations, not mere dependencies of the mother country. It was most earnestly conceived that this was the right policy to pursue, but there was great opposition from a number of the Canadian people, and my chief, Lord Carnarvon, doubted whether we should go on with the scheme, especially as we know that there would be much opposition to it in the House of Commons."

"He spent an afternoon on this terrace earnestly considering it from every point of view, and I pressed my opinion as strongly as possible. Lord Carnarvon acknowledged that I should have the hardest task in piloting the bill through the House of Commons, but I thought it might have meant ruin to my parliamentary career. Finally, we agreed on the main principles, and then we sat down here and put the scheme into shape. I am proud of that afternoon's work, and I love this terrace because it is so closely associated in my memory with what I think was the most important work of my public life."

Lord Norton did not mention dates, but I think the scene he was recalling must have taken place in the autumn of 1866. He joined Lord Derby's government in June of that year as under-secretary of state for the colonies, and the British North America Act was passed in 1870. I recalled to his mind the vigorous opposition to the measure by Mr. Bright and other prominent liberals.

"Yes," said Lord Norton, "it was a very anxious time for me. Bright was a giant in debate, and on the face of it he had a strong case for the Canadian local elections had gone against the view we were taking. But I was sure that the choice lay between confederation and loss of some of our North American colonies. They would have joined the United States, and I never quite grasped Bright's view. My own anxiety was to make the colonies strong, self-contained nations, linked to us by the crown, but not under any kind of irksome control from London. The fact is that after studying colonial questions closely, I came to the conclusion that the colonies had got to learn how to govern themselves for we could not defend them enough to do it properly from London, and any kind of friction was likely to break the slender ties. They were farther away in those days," the old statesman added with a smile.

"Bright and many other liberals," he continued, "believed, I think, it would be better for us to relax all efforts to influence the colonies, and that if they slipped away entirely it would be rather a good thing—save us the cost of defending them, and the risks of being drawn into quarrels through anything done. I thought on the contrary, that we should hold them as free partners in the empire, and that was the aim of my policy. I did not believe that we could bring them into union as we have brought Scotland and Ireland. Distance put that out of the question, and with the astonishing example of the United States before us, we had to lay a might be reared."

"I think my views were practical and, I hope, a very sound compromise between the idea of positive union or mere fraternal control, and the other represented by Bright, which regarded the colonies as something of an encumbrance. On the whole, I am well satisfied; indeed, I may say not a little proud of the action I was able to take."

**PREVAILING PRICES.**

**Review of Conditions of Kingston Markets at Present.**

Home duties resulting from the opening of warm weather are causing the non-appearance of farmers on Kingston market, but despite this falling off, the supply of food stuffs keeps up. Beef prices continue firm, with little change from those last quoted. Western beef continues to meet the local demands. Little, if any beef in carcass is being marketed by farmers in this district. What is brought in is held at from 6c. to 8c.; by the quarter it sells at from 5c. to 8c. Dealers are paying from \$1 to \$6 live weight for suitable beef cattle. In Toronto the price at present is from \$4 to \$5.50, with a fair supply. In Montreal the price is a trifle lower, from \$5 to \$7 being offered. By the carcass, the quotations are from \$8 to \$8.50.

Locally, spring lamb is becoming plentiful, and may be purchased by the quarter at from \$1 to \$1.50. By the carcass they sell at from \$4 to \$5.50. In Montreal dealers are paying from \$6 to \$8 for spring lambs dressed, while at Toronto the price quoted is from \$7 to \$7.25. The supply of good mutton is sufficient to meet the demand, dealers quoting from 5c. to 6c. a pound for choice stock, dressed, as compared with 4 1/2c. to 5c. in Toronto, and 4c. to 4 1/2c. in Montreal. There is a strong demand for hogs, and dealers are offering \$7 to \$7.50 cwt., dressed. At Montreal the prices given are \$8.50 to \$9, while Toronto prices are \$7 to \$9.

In the line of vegetables, farmers continue to send quantities of vegetables, demanding 70c. and 75c. a bag, while merchants and dealers are offering potatoes of excellent quality at 60c. a bag. Onions are very scarce, and as high as \$2 a bushel is being offered. For carrots and beets prices paid are 75c. a bushel. For cabbage farmers are asking 5c. a head or three heads for 10c.; they sell by the dozen at from 40c. to 50c.

Quotations for the product of the dairy remain about as last given. In rolls sold freely at from 18c. to 20c. a pound, while in prints as high as 22c. a pound is asked. The prices in Toronto are from 20c. to 22c. and in Montreal 22c. to 23c. for prints, and 23c. to 25c. for creamery prints. In both Toronto and Montreal the price has dropped. At both places they are selling freely at 13c. and 14c.

Cheese quotations remain firm, with a slight upward tendency. Locally buyers are offering 14c., but at Montreal the prices offered are from 11c. to 12c. for choice make. These are exceptionally good prices for April cheese, and farmers should sell, as it is predicted that those left there will be a slump, owing to an influx of early make.

**SOUNDS A WARNING.**

**An Appeal for Strengthening of India's Frontier.**

Bombay, April 24.—The Times commenting on the recent liberal opposition in the British House of Commons, to strengthening the northwestern frontier of India, says the opposition does not realize the importance of the matter. It asserts that a Russian army of 200,000 men is now concentrated in Central Asia, and that a Russian force within striking distance of Herat, Afghanistan, which it could capture in a week.

The Afghan army has degenerated into a mere rabble, and the whole country is losing the cohesion it possessed under the late Amir. The hold of Habibullah Khan, the present Amir, upon Afghan Turkestan is steadily weakening. The completion of the Russian Orenburg railway has revolutionized the whole situation, and the Russian Central Asian army could walk over an unopposed distance of Herat, Afghanistan, which it could capture in a week.

**PATRIOTISM HITS RUSSIANS.**

Two Hundred in New York to Enter Army.

New York, April 26.—More than 200 members of Greek Orthodox Church of St. Nicholas, known as the Russian cathedral, have already left their homes and business here to return to Russia and join the army. In like proportion, the members of the Russian churches here have responded to their country's call.

The reverses in Manchuria have quickened the patriotism of Russians here and still more are going to take up arms against the Japanese.

Vladimir F. Gnesin, a wealthy importer of Broad street, and a member of the cathedral congregation, is the leading spirit in recruiting. Before he came to America he was a lieutenant in the Russian army. He will go back soon to take up his command again and go to the front.

Though patriotism is depleting the ranks of his congregation, Rev. Alexander Hotovitsky, the arch priest of St. Nicholas' church, encourages it.

**TRAINS JACK RABBITS:**  
Minnesota Editor Races Them Against Locomotives.

Crookston, Minn., April 26.—Norwood Davies, managing editor of the Crookston Times, while on a train last summer saw a jack rabbit running even with the train, and he got the idea of training jacks for racing purposes. Since then he has been gathering likely specimens and has been devoting much time to training the animals.

Now, he says he has two jack rabbits trained so that they obey his commands fairly well, and every nice day when he has time, he takes them out and races them against incoming trains. He says the rabbits can do a mile a minute. He plans to race the jacks against horses, bicycles, and motor cars.

**To Protect Life.**  
Albany, N.Y., April 26.—Governor Higgins has signed the first of the series of legislative bills resulting from the disaster to the excursion boat Slossum in the last summer. It requires that in future, construction of all barges and steam vessels carrying excursions upon routes within a radius of forty-five miles from cities having a population of 1,000,000 inhabitants or over the stanchions, deck beams and frames shall be of iron and steel.

**Mystery At Lapeer.**  
Lapeer, Mich., April 26.—Paul Fitch and D. Reamer, farmers, while digging a post-hole for a line fence on a farm inside the city limits, struck a board that proved on investigation to be a box containing a human skeleton. The skull is about a third larger than the skull of the average human being to-day, and the whole skeleton is in a remarkable state of preservation.
