

HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS Any even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba or the North-West Territories, excepting 8 and 26, which has not been homesteaded, or reserved to provide wood lots for settlers, or for other purposes, may be homesteaded upon by any person who is the sole head of afamily, or any male over 18 years of age

Entry may be made personally at the local land office for the district in which the land to be taken is situated, or if the homesteader desires he may, on application to the Minister of the Interior, Ottawa, the Commissioner of Immigration. Winnipeg. or the Local Agent for the District in which the land is situated, receive authority for some one to make entry for him. A fee of \$10 is

charged for a homestead entry. A settler who has been granted an entry for a homestead is required by the rovisions of the Dominion Lands Act, and the amendments thereto, to perform the conditions connected therewith, under one of the following plans:

(1) At lease six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year during the term of three years. It is the practice of the Department to require a settler to bring 15 acres under cultivation, but if he profess he may substitute stock; and 20 head of cattle, to be actually his own property, with buildings for their accommodation, will be accepted instead of the cultivation.

(2) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased), of any person who is eligible to make a homestead entry under the provisions of this act, resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entere for by such person as a homestead, the

equirements of this act as to residence prior to obtaining patent may be satisfied

by such person residing with the father or mother.

(3) If a settler was entitled to and has obtained entry for a second homestead the requirements of this act as to residence prior to obtaining patent may be satisfied by residence upon the first homestead, if the second homestead is in the (4) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his homestead, the requirements of this act as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the saidland. The term "vicinity" used above is meant to indicate the same township, or an adjoining of cornering township. A settler who avails himself of the provisions of Clauses (2), (8) or (4) must cultivate 30 acres of his homestend, or substitute 20 head of stock, with building for their accommodation, and have besides 80 acres substantially fenced. The pri loge of a second entry is restricted by law to those settlers only who con the duties upon their first homsteads to entitle them to patent on or before the 2nd June, 1889. Every homesteader who is is to comply with the requirements of the homsetead law is liable to have his entry cancelled, and the land may be

INFORMATION Newly arrived immigrants will receive at the Immigration Office in Winnipeg, r at any Dominion Lands Office in Manitoba or the North-West Territories, inormation as to the lands that are open for entry, and from the officers in charge free of expenses, advice and assistance in securing lands to suit them. Pull information respecting the land, timber, coal and mineral laws, as well as respecting Dominion Lands in the Railway Beit in British Columbia, may be obtained upon application to the Secretary of the Department of the Interior, Ottawa; the Commissioner of Immigration, Winnipeg, Manitoba; or to any of the Dominion Lands Agents in Manitoba or the North-West Territories.


