SPAIN'S MAD KING.

ALFONSO GIVING PROOF OF
IRRESPONSIBILITY.

The King, Who is Nineteen Years
Old, Shows No Respect to
Age or Rank—Cabinet Forced
to Resign.

Madrid, April 25.—Spanish court officials are worried over the strange conduct of King Alfonso. While they do not believe his intellect is impaired, they think his character is showing signs of such weakness as to indicate constitutional infirmity. Alfonso so will be nineteen years old next month, but almost every day he gives evidence of irresponsibility as is seldom seen in a school boy. The following typical instances of his behavior are given by a reliable source:

Recently, Alfonso in passing through an ante-room in the Madrid palace, met Admiral Chacon, a venerable sailor who was formerly aide-de-camp to the king. Alfonso approached the admiral and said to him: "What office are you now filling?" The admiral replied that he was at one of the bureaus of the navy department, whereupon Alfonso answered in a loud voice, "Tell, my dear Chacon, I suppose you did when you were at court." The king then raised his hand, and slapped the face of the old sailor, after which he walked off, laughing boisterously.

Chacon, in relating the incident later, said: "When I felt his majestic hand hit my face it was all I could do to restrain myself from disgracing myself with my uniform."

On another occasion Alfonso was going to his private apartments in the palace. He noticed for the first time, outside his door, a small bell with a glass case. The king inquired what it connected with, and was told that it connected with the bell of the guard room of the palace and was to be used only in the event of grave danger threatening the king. Before the glass and pushed the button vigorously and then ran to his apartments.

Great Racket in Palace.

Instantly there was a frightful racket in the palace. Cries of "assassins" were raised and the palace hallways and corridors were filled with drawn swords and loaded carbines and rifles. Alfonso met them, almost in hysterics from his laughter. The soldiers retired and expressed their selves as unappreciative of the joke.

During the visit of the Duke of Connaught to Madrid last month in honor of the royal guest, the most famous in Spain, the king, Alfonso, was playing a soft Andalusian air, owing to the loud conversation at the royal table Alfonso was unable to hear the music. He hit the table with his hand and exclaimed "What has happened? Why isn't the band playing?"

One of the lords of the bed chamber informed his majesty that the particular part of the music, then being played required soft music. Alfonso replied: "What nonsense. I am the band in order to hear it. Tell the leader to play his pieces louder, so I can know he is working."

From then until the banquet ended the diners were compelled to carry on the conversation in shouts owing to the loud conversation given to the king's orders by the band leader. Alfonso's reckless speech through the streets of Madrid in his automobile has been repeatedly commented upon in the Madrid papers and it has just become known that the attempt of the late Maura government to compel the king to stop his breakfast speeding was the real reason why the cabinet fell.

Premier Maura, during an audience with the king, pointed out the danger of using the streets of Madrid as a race course, and the fact that the municipal laws were being broken by his majesty. Alfonso was greatly annoyed and at once demanded the government's resignation for impertinence. The resignations were handed in, and a new government was formed under General Villaverde, which has made no attempt to interfere with the king's automobiling.

OUR HANOVER FRIENDS.

A Beautiful Country of Hills and Valleys.

Hanover, N.H., April 25.—(To the Editor): Delightful spring weather we are having; the air is so warm one feels like spending the time out of doors. And March was like a dream, so warm and bright. Not so the four months previous, they were a cold reality. Not very stormy weather but most and cold. The snow was about a foot deep on the level here, but in other parts of New Hampshire, was much deeper.

The sisters were dressed very modestly in gray and wore plain white bonnets. We saw a few of the brethren who were a delightful sight. These Shakers are very healthy, but the sect is fast dying out.
