

COMMERCIAL MATTERS.

What Is Going On In the Business World—The Markets.

Canadian Pacific Railway land sales for April were 22,080 acres for \$125,210 and those of the Northwest Land Company 6,308 acres for \$47,287.

The Great West Land Company has bought about \$1,000,000 worth of iron ore property in the Gogebic range from Cleveland, Detroit and Duluth investors.

The Canadian Pacific Company said that the dividend disbursements by industrial companies in May will be \$17,000,000, an increase of \$6,000,000 over last year.

Toronto Railway's gross earnings for the week ending April 29th were \$50,000,000, up against \$49,500,000 spending of last year, an increase of \$8,883,13.

Montreal—At a meeting of the Sherbrooke, Gaspe, Council, the offer of the Sherbrooke Power, Light & Heat company to sell its plant to the city for \$1,000,000 was accepted.

The Baltimore and Ohio railroad has awarded contracts to the American Locomotive Company for 240 locomotives, at an aggregate cost of \$4,000,000. It is said to be the largest locomotive order ever given in America.

THE SOO COMPANIES

PAID SIX MONTH'S INTEREST AHEAD OF TIME.

Legislation May Secure Entrance, to Toronto, of Electric Roads

—Man Fatally Scalded—May Yet be Troubled in Building Trades.

Toronto, May 3.—The re-organized industries at Sault Ste. Marie have paid to Morton & Co., the New York bankers, \$52,000, the amount of the interest for six months on the \$2,000,000 borrowed by the company, and repaid by the Ontario government.

The interest fell due on Monday, and the money was sent to New York on the previous Thursday. Morton & Co. are the firm who hold the certificates of the Soo company.

A conference of the representatives of municipalities in the counties of York, Peel and Ontario, was held in the county office here, and the unanimous decision arrived at was that if the city of Toronto and representatives of the York Radial company, could not come to terms in regard to the entrance of electric roads into the city, the municipalities interested should seek legislation to insure an entrance for their roads.

NO PROPER EXITS.

Brockville Council Decides to Shut Up Playhouse.

Brockville, Ont., May 3.—Brockville will have no playhouse on and after June 1st, the town council having decided to close the Grand Opera House, which is corporation property, on the date mentioned. About the time of the Iroquois theatre fire in Chicago, the question as to the safety of the Brockville structure was raised. Upon the report of an architect, the property committee recommended certain improvements, for the purpose of making proper exits and fire escapes. These recommendations were never made, and though the house has been in use continuously since, patrons have been in dread of accidents. Public opinion has been strongly expressed to the place being kept open, and the council has at last acted. The house will probably be rebuilt by private capital, the promoters obtaining a lease conditionally.

CZAR TO ATTEND REVIEW.

Will Leave Palace for First Time Since Attempt.

London, May 3.—A despatch to the Telegraph company from Paris says that the czar will be present at a review of troops that will be held at Tsarsko-Selo next Friday. It is noteworthy that the czar has not left his palace at Tsarsko-Selo since January 19th, when a charge of case shot was fired at him during the ceremony of the blessing of the waters of the Neva.

Dr. O'Reilly's Resignation.

Toronto, May 3.—The trustees of the General Hospital accepted the resignation of Dr. Charles O'Reilly, for thirteen years superintendent of the institution. It was decided to pay him his full salary and to give him a retiring allowance after that of \$1,000 a year for five years.

St. Catharines, May 3.—George Hopkins, a colored man, found guilty of stealing numerous articles from stores and eighteen dollars worth of postage stamps from the postoffice, was sentenced to a year in the Central Prison.
