OYAMA READY

For Fight Which Threatens Russian Left.

GENERAL LINEVITCH

MAY HAVE TO DEFEND HIS RECORD.

Japanese Heavy Columns Concentrate on Liao River—General Battle Impending—Russian Torpedo Boats Burn a Sailing Vessel.

Special to the Whig. Tsinghuashing (or Maimaikai) Manchuria, May 8.—Field Marshal Oyama seems to be ready to assume the offensive on a large scale, and activity has already begun against General Linevitch's left. This may be the prelude to another general battle.

The Japanese have concentrated heavy columns on the Liao river, and the advance divisions have been in contact with the Russians who are holding the main road from Fakoman to Bashiachen.

On Thursday the Japanese cavalry suddenly attacked the Cossacks in overwhelming force, forcing the latter to retire. Then, supported by infantry, the Japanese advanced and drove the Russian infantry out of the village of Palitoun.

The Russian reconnoitring party twenty miles further west ran into an ambush and all the party except five were killed.

Mauroding Russians.

Tokio, May 8.—Four Russian torpedo boat destroyers from Vladivostok appeared west of Hokkaido, off Suba, on Friday. They seized and burned a small sailing vessel and imprisoned the captain and disappeared to the north-west. They were evidently returning to Vladivostok. There is a possibility that they have destroyed other small craft, although no reports to that effect have been received.

Although none have been sighted, it is believed that the larger vessels of the Vladivostok squadron accompanied the torpedo boats, which appeared west of Hokkaido yesterday. It is doubted that the torpedo boats would venture across unscathed in the heavy sea which was running when they burned the sailing vessel.

The Russian heated kerosene on the deck of the sailing vessel and withdrew, after having ignited the oil.

Kuropatkin Going Home.

St. Petersburg, May 8.—The rumors of the approaching return of Gen. Kuropatkin from the front were seen to be definitely confirmed, and it is said that Gen. Zarubainoff, commander of the fourth East Siberian corps will succeed him. Failing health is assigned as the cause for Kuropatkin's coming back to St. Petersburg.

France Fails, Claims Japan.

London, May 8.—Special dispatches from Tokio to the London morning newspapers represent that Japanese feeling is becoming highly inflamed at France's alleged failure to prevent ostentatious disregard for the principles of neutrality by the Russian Pacific squadron.

The Tokio Ashahi bluntly describes the French attitude that they would preserve neutrality as falsehoods, declares that Japan would be justified in bombarding French territory and calls upon the government to take vigorous action.

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Using Force.

St. Petersburg, May 8.—The news from the front indicates that Field Marshal Oyama is pressing Gen. Linevitch's advance posts east and west of the railroad with considerable force as if about to undertake a general offensive movement.

TO INVADÉ SAGHALIEN.

London, May 8.—A despatch from Tien Tsin, to the Weekly Dispatch, says that it may be stated, on high authority, that the Japanese invasion of the island of Saghalien has been planned for the middle of May.

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SHARP TALK

Given To British Columbia Legislators.

VETO ACTS PASSED

INCREASE IN REVENUE AND EXPENDITURE.

Measure Sanctioning G.T.R. Purchase of C. A. R. Passes Final Reading—The Figures for the Dominion.

Ottawa, May 8.—Three acts of the British Columbia legislature have been vetoed, of which notice is gazetted today. The chief one is the Immigration Act, aimed at excluding Japanese, which Consul-General Nosse made complaint. The others are one relating to coal mines regulation act, and an act relating to the employment on works carried on under franchises granted by private acts.

The statement of revenue and expenditure of the dominion for the ten months ending with April shows the revenue to be \$37,130,511, about half a million dollars increase over the same ten months last year. The expenditure was \$42,337,907, an increase of \$5,207,396 over last year. The capital expenditure was \$9,100,000, an increase of one million and a half over last year. There was an increase of about \$3,000,000 in all classes of expenditures.

In the session the legislation to sanction the Grand Trunk purchase of the Canada Atlantic system passed its final reading, and having already run its course in the lower house, awaits only the sanction of the governor-general.

GIFT TO BISHOP BRENT.

Mystery of Source of \$100,000 Donation Cleared.

Utica, N.Y., May 8.—The \$100,000 gift to Bishop Brent, of the Philippines, about which there has been so much mystery for more than two years, has just been ascertained to have come from Mrs. Edward D. Bradlee, of this city, who was then the widow of Representative Charles F. Sprague, and who lived in Brookline, Mass.

Tippecanoe's contribution to the National Emmanuel church in Boston in 1902, it became known that Bishop Brent wished for \$100,000 with which to build a cathedral in his new missionary field, Mrs. Bradlee, who was a member of the Episcopal church, learned of the bishop's wish and made the present on the eve of his departure.

It was given with the understanding that the name of the donor should be made public, and the matter has been kept secret until now.

May Get Steel Plant.

Sarnia, Ont., May 8.—Sarnia is hopeful of securing the two million dollar steel plant which United States Steel company is to locate at some point in Canada. The town was visited some time ago by a number of the officials of the steel company. Practically every requirement they made has been met. A site of five hundred acres has been provided by the town on the river bank. The Pere Marquette railway, which runs close to the river, at that point, will have to be set back, but the board of directors of the railway will assist in every reasonable way. The Pere Marquette is planning an expenditure of ninety thousand dollars in improving its terminal yards here.

Released By Death.

Watertown, N.Y., May 8.—James A. Duncan, who was sentenced to Auburn Prison December 3rd, 1903, for forgery, for a term of not less than two years nor more than five, died Sunday in that institution. The remains will be brought here and taken to the undertaking rooms of Payne & Burns, from where the funeral will be held Tuesday. He leaves a wife and four small children. The wife has been ill for some time, and the family is in mourning.

To Continue Struggle.

Chicago, May 8.—To-day, the strike-first day of the teamsters' strike, found both sides prepared to continue the struggle. Two brothers, John and Richard Fron, were fatally stabbed to-day, in a street fight with a colored man. Their assailant escaped.

Swallowed Carbohc Acid.

Special to the Whig. Brantford, Ont., May 8.—Herman Vanderly, a prosperous farmer, who lived a few miles from this city, committed suicide, yesterday, by swallowing a quantity of carbohc acid. He is supposed to have been temporarily insane. He leaves a family.

Many Days Overdue.

Special to the Whig. Mexico City, May 8.—It is believed now that the Hainburg-American freight steamer, Castilla is lost. She is thirty-five days overdue at Vera Cruz.

Wife Makes Peculiar Charge in Alimony Suit.

Toronto, May 8.—Suing her husband, John Buckner, contracting plasterer, 62 Grant street, for alimony, Mrs. Susan Buckner, on the witness stand in the non-jury assize court, charged him with undue intimacy with her sister, Miss Lottie Jennings, with whom he has lived since their separation, after twelve years of married life.

"I think it is the most shocking condition of things I have ever heard of, that she should remain there," said Mr. Justice Street, after Buckner had told his story, in an attempt to explain his conduct.

Mrs. Buckner said she had never had any trouble until a year after her sister came to live at her house. Then she said she caught her husband sitting on Miss Jennings' lap and kissing her. After that he used to take her out frequently and his feelings against his wife became so strong that he assaulted and abused her at different times.

Because she would not tell him where she had hidden a beer bottle she swore that he pushed her down, and both kicked and struck her. When she said she would not retake her "dumping" her sister, Buckner seized her and struck her head against the wall with such force that the plaster was broken.

PROVED A FIZZLE.

A Strike Ordered, But Only Few Obeyed.

Special to the Whig. Toronto, May 8.—The Machinists' Union, this morning, ordered the machinists in the Grand Trunk shops here, to quit work at eleven o'clock. Before noon, only about a score out of a total of sixty-five had gone out. Reports received at the office of the mechanical superintendent of the G. T. R. indicate that out of 540 machinists, at Montreal, only fourteen went out on strike this morning. At Hamilton, Sarnia and London, important terminal points, it is reported all the men remained at work. From Bridgeburg, Allandale and Belleville, the same story has been reported to Superintendent Kennedy. At Stratford and Fort Grafton (Port Huron), the shops have been closed and the men did not get a change to declare themselves. At Palmerston all the men remained at work. At the time of writing it appears evident that less than fifty men on the whole system have struck. Superintendent Kennedy said, this afternoon, that the affair had proved a gigantic fizzle. He was sorry for the men who were angry only as the facts had been misrepresented to them. He hoped that they would return to work at once.

MEXICAN HUMAN SACRIFICE.

A Priest Immolates Himself on His Altar.

Houston, Tex., May 8.—Offering himself as a human sacrifice at the altar of his own cathedral, Ascension, parish priest at Cuale, state of Guadaluajara, Mexico, has atoned for sins of his congregation, according to the dictates of his inflated imagination. With his clothing saturated with oil he stood on the altar in full view of thousands summoned to witness the spectacle, applied the torch, and was consumed, in a par of flames. As the fire was spreading about him he prayed for the forgiveness of the sins of the members of the congregation, at the same time threatening with damnation any who might approach.

Faupers Yoked To Ploughs.

London, May 8.—A team of work horses imitates yoked to a plough has been at work in a field attached to the Milton-next-Sittingbourne workhouse. The idea is that of the master, who has been considering the problem of what to do with the able-bodied inmates of the house.

Failed To Work.

Vibourg, Russia, May 8.—The police officials investigating the attempt to assassinate the Governor, Myslinski, have received by express a package of papers and clothes with a letter stating that they would throw light on the crime. The package contained an infernal machine charged with dynamite enough to destroy a building, but the mechanism failed to operate.
