The Canadian North-West. HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS

Any even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba or the North-West Tenteries, excepting 8 and 26, which has not been homesteaded, or reserved to such wood lots for settlers, or for other purposes, may be homesteaded upon by any person who is the sole head of afamily, or any male over 10 years of age to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres, more or less. Eatry may be made personally at the local land office for the district in ich the land to be taken is situated, or if the homesteader desires he may, on

alcation to the Minister of the Interior, Ottawa, the Commissioner of Immi-ation, Winnipeg, or the Local Agent for the District in which the land is mated, receive authority for some one to make entry for him. A fee of \$10 is HOMESTEAD DUTIES A settler who has been granted an entry for a homestead is required by the revisions of the Dominion Lands Act, and the amendments thereto, to perform a conditions connected therewith, unde one of the following plans:

(1) At lease six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each sar during the term of three years. It is the practice of the Department to require.
