Note This, Please.

The municipal committee of the legislature has put a finish upon the ambitions of the women to become voters. When the proposition was advanced by the Toronto council, which is leading in the matter, it transpired that the husbands of married women, with property in their own right, were to have votes also. So that an extension of the franchise, as Toronto favoured it, "meant that both the ladies and their husbands should have votes." Against the proposition the committee was unanimous.

When the question was referred to the Kingston council it was somewhat uncertain what the movement meant, and pending developments, nothing was done. Now that the real prospect of the women's request is really understood it will be "sat on." The wisdom of giving the fair sex the general power to vote is seriously questioned, and the expediency of giving both the man and his wife votes is disputed on every hand. Two souls with but a single thought, two hearts that beat as one, will have to get along with one vote. When it transpires that the man cannot use it a right it will be in order to transfer it to his better half.

Another point has been settled by the municipal committee of the local house. It is that the man who accepts pay for any service at the poll, as a scrutineer for the candidate of the city, cannot vote. The money transaction disfranchises him. There will be fewer, perhaps, in search of the inside job upon such terms.

Consulting The People.

An experience in Ottawa is of some value in Kingston, educationally. The city has desired to raise, by way of a loan, \$85,000 for exhibition buildings, and \$65,000 for the extension of water mains. It sought a special act through the legislature, legalizing the procedure and the municipal committee interposed an objection. It held that the people should have been consulted upon the subject, and it made a difference as between two schemes or plans. It let the request go for the loan for the exhibition buildings and it blocked the request for power to borrow money for sewer purposes.

It was argued in behalf of the Ottawa council that it represented the people, and that the legislature should give them what they want. "It is clear," said the Free Press, in discussing the case, "that Mr. McDougall has something to learn with regard to the spirit of the institutions under which we live. Aldermen who impose burdens upon the citizens without asking their consent do not represent, but misrepresent, the people."

The question arises, is Kingston in a different position with regard to its electric light and gas plants? It was alleged, at the last council meeting, that the contemplated improvements could be carried along like the water-works improvements. The Ottawa repulse suggests that there may be a difference of opinion upon this point. Sewers are as necessary as gas mains. Why should the people be consulted about one and not about the other?

The Tide Of Life.

The tide of immigration is about its highest now. Thousands of people are pouring into the country, the most of them labourers. There is room for them all in the North-West, in the development of its resources, and there they should proceed at once.

Any but agricultural labourers are not needed in Canada. Business is booming, and the various occupations are inviting the attention of all who desire profitable service. But there is no scarcity of material among Canadians, for work in populous centres. Indeed the difficulty in the past has been to keep occupied the young men who have decided to enter the trades and callings and avoid the farms. Outside the cities and towns, however, there is an absolute scarcity of labour, and it may be in some degree met by the immigration that is now going on.

The settlement in the newer provinces is indicated by the fact that in April, 1,371 homestead entries were registered in Ottawa as against 2,228 a year ago.

Great as influx of people into Canada is, it is not to be compared with the influx into the United States. In one day recently, within twelve hours, there were 12,000 foreigners, all steerage passengers. They are the not-woods of Europe, and they expect to find in America the comfort they have been denied at home. They may seek the farms—if Uncle Sam has now any land to give them—and they may not.

Rights Of The People.

The legislature is becoming more thoughtful of the rights of the municipalities. Some evidence of this was given this week when Hamilton appealed to it on two matters.

The Hamilton Gas company in 1850 secured an act which protected it to the extent of forbidding the laying of any pipes nearer than six feet of them. This was regarded as a serious interference with competing companies, and especially with that which has received permission to enter the Ambitious City and prepare to serve its people. It was pointed out that the old gas company had really no greater powers than the general act conferred, but the legislature wanted to make sure of this by cancelling the act of 1850, and bringing the provisions of the general act into operation.

Then the Hamilton and Ancaster railway wanted to enter the city by a certain way, passing down a residential street, and marring its appearance. The people and property owners objected. The mayor and one of the aldermen appeared before the railway committee and supported the railway bill. The case was disposed of somewhat unexpectedly. Hon. Adam Beck, suggested that the bill be held over for a year, and that in the meantime a special commission look into the question of electric railways. The bill was, thereupon, withdrawn, but not before the committee had decided that the city should have the control of its streets.

This recognition of municipal rights has been tardy enough. The cities and towns have been defied by great corporations—chiefly by the electric light, electric car and telephone companies—in the matter of using the streets as they desired. It did not matter how much damage was done or what the appearance of the street might be, the companies insisted upon the conditions of their bond, granted to them without the consent or concurrence of the municipalities. It is a change and a welcome one, that guarantees a proper recognition of the rights and privileges of the councils acting for the people.

Editorial Notes.

The reputation of the government is at stake in West Kent. The revelations in connection with the license business have been very hurtful.

The Ottawa opposition has a keen scent for scandal these days. It thought it had one case, on the boundary line fence, well in hand, when the bottom fell out of it.

The writ for the London election will be out in a few days. The fight will be short, sharp, and decisive. Mr. Hyman is not acting like a man who is afraid to meet the people.

The Toronto Telegram is curious to know what Mr. Borden would do with Monk, Bergeron, et al, if he had of fee and power? It recalls that he broke Mr. Wallace's heart by not recognizing him as the financial critic when Mr. Easter stood aside.

The municipal committee gave municipal ownership a great knock when it laid over for one Ottawa's city for power to purchase the business of the Consumers' Electric company. In laying the matter over for a year the committee hurt the scheme.

No, the senators have not time now to go off diverting themselves. The divorce bills are now under consideration. In one case there is "the most engaging woman who has ever appeared as a respondent before the committee," and she is getting a lot of attention.

Peter Ryan of Toronto, has explained that he did get \$9,000 for auctioning the last timber berth, but he realized high prices for the government. He knows the country and he knows the men, and has a most eloquent tongue. The combination comes high, but it is worth all the money it is paid.

WILL RECEIVE PALLIUM.

Archbishop Glennon to Be Honored By Rome.



ARCHBISHOP GLENNON, Special to the Whig. St. Louis, Mo., May 13.—Distinguished prelates and members of the clergy of the Roman Catholic church are gathering here from all parts of the country in anticipation of to-morrow, when Archbishop John Joseph Glennon, the new metropolitan of St. Louis, will be invested with the pallium in mark of his high ecclesiastical office. Seldom in the history of the church in the west, has there been so distinguished an assemblage of Catholic prelates as is now here. They include more than a score of archbishops and bishops in addition to a host of clergy.

The sacred vestment will be placed on the shoulders of the archbishop by Cardinal Gibbons of Baltimore. Previous to the ceremony pontifical high mass will be said by one of the distinguished visitors, and Archbishop Ireland of St. Paul, will deliver the sermon. The ceremony will take place in the old cathedral and admission will be had by ticket. The pallium, meaning literally, a cloak or mantle, is a band of white lamb's wool, embroidered with purple crosses, and is worn about the neck by the pope and all prelates of archiepiscopal rank, including patriarchs and metropolitans. In former times it was made of purple embroidered linen and was worn by all bishops. It has two pendants, one hanging down the breast, and the other down the back of the wearer. The pallium is worn at all times by the pope, but only on solemn occasions by others. It can never be transferred to another person, and it is always buried with the body of the man who wore it during life.

Right Rev. John Joseph Glennon, who is to be the recipient of the distinguished honor to-morrow, was born in Kinross, County Meath, Ireland, June 14th, 1862, graduated from All Hallows College, Dublin, in 1883, and was ordained priest a year later. He came to America soon after his ordination, and became assistant pastor of St. Patrick's church, in Kansas City, from 1887 to 1892. He was pastor of the cathedral there under Bishop Hogan. In 1892 he became vicar-general of the diocese, and two years later administrator. He was appointed co-adjutor bishop of Kansas City, with the right of succession, and consecrated Titular Bishop of Pinará in 1896. Later he was appointed co-adjutor to Archbishop Kain of St. Louis, and succeeded to the archbishopric on the death of the latter two.
